The following summary reflects the results of the records search for the project area and a ½-mile radius. In addition, the California Points of Historical Interest (SPHI), the California Historical Landmarks (SHL), the California Register of Historical Resources (CAL REG), the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP), the California State Historic Properties Directory (HPD), and the City of Los Angeles Historic-Cultural Monuments (LAHCM) listings were reviewed for the above referenced project site. Due to the sensitive nature of cultural resources, archaeological site locations are not released.

HISTORIC MAP REVIEW - Pasadena, CA (1896, 1900) 1:62,500 and Santa Monica, CA (1902, 1921) 1:62,500 Quadrangle maps indicated that in 1896 there was a town called Gaston Present. Other place names include Three-mile House, Bennington, Ivanhoe, and Tropico. The Southern Pacific Railroad ran directly through the project area. The L.A. Terminal Railroad (Glendale Branch) also ran directly adjacent to the project area. The Los Angeles River ran directly south of the project area and an intermittent stream ran to the east of the project area. There were several buildings present and a half dozen paved roads, one of which ran directly through the project area. All these features were still present in 1900, 1902, and 1921.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The project area has not been previously surveyed for cultural resources. Due to its proximity to the Los Angeles River, and the project location's historical association with railroad activity, the project site is potentially sensitive for cultural resources. Therefore, a qualified cultural resources consultant should be retained to do a study. It is also recommended that any buildings, structures or objects (45 years and older and within the area of effect) be identified, recorded, and evaluated for significance as may be required by the lead agency. Finally, the Native American Heritage Commission should be consulted to identify if any additional traditional cultural properties or other sacred sites are known to be in the area.
