In accordance with our agreement, WSA has implemented an updated records search, Native American Heritage Commission correspondence, and a peer review of the proposed Circlepoint Hyatt House Hotel Project in the City of Half Moon Bay, San Mateo County (Appendix A: Figure 1).

A records search was completed by staff at the California Historical Resources Information System, Northwest Information Center at Sonoma State University on July 28, 2017 (File Number 17-0118). No cultural resources have been recorded within the project area, one historic resource and one informal historic district have been recorded within ¹/₄ mile of the project area (P-41-000027, P-41-002180). Two cultural resource studies have been conducted within the project area (S-003062 and S-003082) and five additional cultural resource studies and supplemental studies have been conducted within ¹/₄-mile of the project area (S-009779, S-010761, S014431, S-033501, S-038202). An additional 14 overview reports also were conducted within a ¹/₄-mile of the project area. The results of the record search indicate that the likelihood of encountering potentially significant historic resources within the project area is low. The likelihood of encountering potentially significant prehistoric cultural resources within the project area is considered moderate due to the overall archaeological sensitivity of the Half Moon Bay area (Dyett & Bhatia 2014). While there is no direct impact to any known archaeological site within the project area, there could be the potential to impact unknown buried archaeological sites.

Project Description and Location

The Circlepoint Hyatt House Hotel Project proposes to develop a 3-story, 147 room hotel, a 2,250 square-foot standalone commercial building, a 3,830 square-foot conference space, and 198 parking spaces within the Downtown Neighborhood in the city of Half Moon Bay, California. The development would be located on a triangular shaped parcel (APN 065-012-030) between Seymour Street, Cabrillo Highway, and Main Street. The project area is currently mostly undeveloped with the exception of the northern portion, which is the location of the James Ford Car Dealership.

The proposed project site is situated in Township 5 South, Range 5 West in an unsectioned area, as depicted on the 1991 Half Moon Bay, California 7.5-minute USGS topographic quadrangle.

Results of the Record Search

A records search was completed by staff at the California Historical Resources Information System, Northwest Information Center at Sonoma State University on July 28, 2017 (File Number 17-0118). The record search included a review of all cultural resource and excavation reports and recorded archaeological sites within a ¹/₄-mile radius of the project area. The study included a review of archaeological, ethnographic, historical, and environmental literature as well as records and maps on file at the California Archaeological Inventory. Records included the Office of Historical Preservation Historic Properties Directory, the California Inventory of Historical Resources, and the Historical Resources Inventory of San Mateo County.

No cultural resources have been recorded within the project area, one historic resource and one informal historic district have been recorded within ¹/₄ mile of the project area (P-41-000027, P-41-002180).

WSA also examined the California Inventory of Historic Resources and the Office of Historic Preservation (OHP) Historic Properties Directory to determine if any buildings/structures within the project area were included in those inventories. The results were negative.

Native American Consultation

On July 20, 2017, WSA staff archaeologist Christina Alonso contacted the Native American Heritage Commission (NAHC) by email to request information on known Native American traditional or cultural properties within the project area, and to request a listing of individuals or groups with cultural affiliation to the project area (Appendix B). On July 31, 2017 WSA received a response from the NAHC stating that "A record search of the Native American Heritage Commission (NAHC) Sacred Lands File (SLF) was completed for the information you have submitted for the above referenced project. The results were negative." Included in the NAHC response was a list of Native American contacts that the NAHC recommended WSA contact for further information. On August 2, 2017, WSA sent letters via certified mail to the listed tribal members requesting information on traditional or cultural properties within the project area. Follow up phone calls were made to the Native American contacts on August 14, 2017 and August 25, 2017. Tony Cerda and Irene Zwierlein requested that a Native American monitor be present during earthmoving. Andy Galvan had no concerns at this point in the project. Messages were left for Anne Marie Sayers, and the message box for Rosemary Cambra was full. All correspondence can be found in Appendix B.

Peer Review

Holman and Associates completed a records search for the proposed James Ford property located in Half Moon Bay in 2014. The records search was in response to a request by the City and Caltrans that related to the permitting of a proposed project involving three parcels that included the James Ford dealership. The records search area consisted of the three parcels (APN-064-352-150, 065-012-020, and an undeveloped parcel south of the other parcels), and a one-eighth mile buffer per direction from Caltrans. The records search included all records and recorded/mapped historical resource studies within the records search area, as well as the OHP Historic Properties Directory, the OHP Archaeological Determinations of Eligibility listing, and the California Inventory of Historic Resources.

The previously recorded site, P-41-002180, the James Ford dealership was discussed in terms of general characteristics and eligibility. This site was recommended to be ineligible for the National Register of Historic Places (Supernowicz 2007). Four additional historic resource studies (Dietz and Jackson 1970, Clark 1988, Smith and Orlins 1992, and Psota 2012) were mentioned with no results located within the project area. While it was noted that numerous historic resources were listed within the City of Half Moon Bay, the informal historic district (P-41-000027), was not mentioned in the Holman report. The inclusion of a map indicating the project area, surrounding records search area, and cultural resources within and around the project area in the Holman report would be beneficial for assessing the potential archaeological and historical sensitivity near the project area.

Recommendations

The results of the record search, and information from Plan Half Moon Bay (Dyett & Bhatia 2014), indicate that the likelihood of encountering potentially significant historic resources within the project area is low. The closest historic resource, the James Ford dealership, lies outside of the current project area.

The likelihood of encountering potentially significant prehistoric cultural resources within the project area is considered moderate though the record search did not identify any previously recorded archaeological sites in the project area or within a surrounding ¹/₄-mile radius. The assessment that the project area is of moderate archaeological sensitivity is due to the overall archaeological sensitivity of the Half Moon Bay area as presented in Plan Half Moon Bay (Dyett & Bhatia 2014). The current project area falls within the Plan Half Moon Bay Planning Area. Sixty-one previously identified cultural resources are recorded within the Planning Area, including 15 prehistoric shell midden and lithic scatter sites.

Should any previously undiscovered historic or prehistoric cultural resources be found during project construction, work should stop, in accordance with CEQA regulations, until such time that the resource can be evaluated by a qualified archaeologist, and appropriate mitigative action taken as determined necessary by the City or County Lead Agency.

In the event that Native American human remains or funerary objects are discovered, the provisions of the California Health and Safety Code should be followed. Section 7050.5(b) of the California Health and Safety Code states:

In the event of discovery or recognition of any human remains in any location other than a dedicated cemetery, there shall be no further excavation or disturbance of the site or any nearby area reasonably suspected to overlie adjacent remains until the coroner of the county in which the human remains are discovered has determined, in accordance with Chapter 10 (commencing with Section 27460) of Part 3 of Division 2 of Title 3 of the Government Code, that the remains are not subject to the provisions of Section 27492 of the Government Code or any other related provisions of law concerning investigation of the circumstances, manner and cause of death, and the recommendations concerning treatment and disposition of the human remains have been made to the person responsible for the excavation, or to his or her authorized representative, in the manner provided in Section 5097.98 of the Public Resources Code.

The County Coroner, upon recognizing the remains as being of Native American origin, is responsible to contact the Native American Heritage Commission within 24 hours. The Commission has various powers and duties to provide for the ultimate disposition of any Native American remains, as does the assigned Most Likely Descendant. Sections 5097.98 and 5097.99 of the Public Resources Code also call for "protection to Native American human burials and skeletal remains from vandalism and inadvertent destruction."




