



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


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Figure 2: Vicinity Map Figure 3: Site Plan

MS. SHEARER-NGUYEN: Good evening and thank you for attending and welcome to the scoping meeting for the environment impact report for the 3 Roots project. I'm Elizabeth Shearer-Nguyen. I'm the environmental analyst for the project, and I'm with the City of San Diego's Development Services Department.

This meeting is referred to as a scoping meeting, and the purpose is to give the public and interested parties an opportunity to submit comments regarding the potential environmental impacts of the proposed project. The information gathered tonight will be used to guide the scope and content of the Environmental Impact Report. We are not here to respond to questions about the project but to gather input from the public on the issues you believe should be analyzed in the EIR.

Comments may be provided verbally or in writing. In order to facilitate written comments, there are comment forms provided. Please ensure you include your name, address, email, and ensure that it is legible so I can send it to the right individuals.

Additionally, comments can be emailed to the address indicated on the scoping meeting notice.

As previously mentioned, this meeting has been scheduled to gather input prior to preparing the project's Environmental Impact Report. The environmental review staff is required by the California Environmental Quality Act as well as the City's Municipal Code to provide the public and the decision-makers with independently prepared environmental documents which disclose impacts to the physical environment. Environmental documents are prepared in accordance with CEQA. CEQA requires analysis of a proposed project's environmental impacts in order to identify ways that those impacts can be avoided or significantly reduced.

The environmental document itself does not recommend approval or denial of the project, but rather this information is utilized by the City's decision-makers as part of the deliberating process in approving or denying a project.

A few comments about how the meeting will be conducted. First a brief description of the project provided by Allegra Parisi will take place, and then we will open the meeting to public comment. The meeting is designed to get as much public input as

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Thank you in advance for your patience. We will now begin. Allegra.

MS. PARISI: Good evening. My name is
Allegra Parisi, and I represent Mesa Canyon Community
Partners. The site in question that we will be
discussing tonight sits on the former Hanson Aggregate
land mine, about a 412-acre parcel located east of
Camino Santa Fe in between Mira Mesa Boulevard and
Miramar Road. The project fits the mining site, which
finished its mining activities in March of 2016.
Since then reclamation obligations have begun, meaning
the site is restoring any impacts that were brought
forth with the mining activity.

Hanson Aggregates transferred the parcel to
Mesa Canyon Community Partners in December of last
year, and we've been launching meetings with the City
in terms of presenting the documents that are
affiliated with both the EIR and corporate planning on
this site.

To the east is the active Vulcan mining operation. In addition to us to the west is the Fenton Technology Park built in 2007 and houses 600,000 square feet of business uses and industrial.

This site was currently conceived in 1994 as part of a master plan. The master plan is called Carroll Canyon Master Plan. It was embedded within the Mira Mesa Community Plan. What that conceived in 1994 was Phase 1, which is already built, the technology park, and it also conceived 1800 units of residential uses on the site, as well as a 52-acre industrial park and 20 acres of public park.

When we started to analyze the best uses for this site, we kept the 1800 units and -- we maintained the 1800 units, and we looked at the -- we maintained the 1800 units and continued Carroll Canyon Road throughout the site. But what we did decide to do is dedicated 25 acres to a public park land. The park that we're talking about will be Mira Mesa's third

community park. And so how our plan currently lays out it's rated medium-low residential density, medium-high residential density and a 40-acre community collective core, which will include apartment residential units as well as 160,000 square feet of retail use.

With the project will be the construction of Carroll Canyon Road through the site and will connect to the existing built section of Carroll Canyon Road to the east and connect to Camino Santa Fe at 2,000 linear feet west of Camino Santa Fe. So that would be the major road network that will be coming through the site, and I believe there would be more (inaudible) on the community.

Also as part of the land use plan is a concept called a mobility hub. It's one and a half acres dedicated to public and private partnerships in the future of mobility and transportation. So our site is currently 412 acres. The map that you're looking at represents 60 percent open space. The project will also include the restoration of Carroll Canyon Creek. It was a natural common watershed for Carroll Canyon Creek that passed through the site. It was disrupted during mining activity, and we will restore it to its natural condition. We will have a

protected section. We will have an enhanced section, and then we will have a rerouted section. That kind of covers the main components of the project.

MS. SHEARER-NGUYEN: Thank you. Great. So I have a few speaker slips here. Craig Jackson. Great. Can you just introduce yourself.

MR. JACKSON: Yes. Let me stand, which is the first challenge. I'm Craig Jackson. I'm a member of the Mira Mesa Community Planning Group, and I have a concern that was called to my attention by one of the candidates for District 6 city council in the future. It has to do with animal corridors in this area. There are a lot of obstructions now, and there's a lot of access, as well; although, it's different from any of the open-space type access that we have within the Mira Mesa community.

So my question is: Will there be access that will extend from the site that is the Fenton -- or I'm sorry, the Vulcan site to the east that would actually enable deer, coyotes, other animals to move all the way, say, up north to Rattlesnake Canyon or to the west so that ultimately they would make it down underneath I-805. That's the question to be answered in the EIR.

MS. SHEARER-NGUYEN: Perfect. Thank you.

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2 MR. MIYON: I'm also from the community 3 planning group. We are looking to see the highway road go through, and we want it to be completed before 4 5 any major construction. And then we have the part 6 going through the cemetery, which is going to be a 7 problem as we see forward. According to the recommended finding that was provided in the Public Notice for Preparation of an Environmental Impact (dated May 4, 2018), the potential for impacts to biological resources was not identified for analysis in the draft EIR (DEIR). The Wildlife Agencies (U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and California Department of Fish and Wildlife) met with the project applicant on May 19, 2017 to discuss steps for processing a Multi-Habitat Planning Area (MHPA) Boundary Line Adjustment (BLA), options for restoring the portion of Carrol Canyon Creek that extends through the project site, and increasing vernal pool buffers and fencing options to an existing City preserve. The meeting also included the steps for processing a wetland deviation under the City's biological superior option. The NOP does not identify whether these aforementioned issues are still part of the project proposal. If the project includes an MHPA BLA or would impact City defined wetlands (per the Environmentally Sensitive Lands regulations), then the DEIR should analyze these issues for conformance to section 5.4.2 of the Final Regional Plan for the Multiple Species Conservation Program (MSCP), Section 1.1.1 of the City's MSCP Subarea Plan, and section 143.0150(3) of the San Diego Municipal Code, respectively. Additionally, based on the proximity Carrol Canyon Creek to proposed development areas, the DEIR should include a thorough discussion on buffers provided to the creek, as well as conformance to section 143.0141 (b)(1)(2)(3)(4)(5) of the San Diego Municipal Code. Thank you for considering each of these issues.

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

The California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) appreciates the opportunity to review and comment on the Notice of Preparation (NOP) for the 3 Roots project, which will be located between Interstate 805 (I-805) and Interstate 15 (I-15) with the nearest major cross streets of Miramar Road and Mira Mesa Boulevard. Thank you for including Caltrans in the environmental review process for the project referenced above. The mission of Caltrans is to provide a safe, sustainable, integrated and efficient transportation system to enhance California's economy and livability. To ensure a safe, efficient, and reliable transportation system, we encourage early consultation and coordination with local jurisdictions and project proponents on all land development projects. Caltrans would like to submit the following comments:

A traffic impact study (TIS) is necessary to determine this proposed project's potential near-term and long-term impacts to the State facilities – existing and proposed – and to propose appropriate mitigation measures. The data used in the TIS should not be more than 2 years old. Please also provide the complete set of electronic Synchro version 10 files.

All freeway entrance and exit ramps where a proposed project will add a significant number of peak-hour trips that may cause any traffic queues to exceed storage capacities should be analyzed. If ramp metering is to occur, a ramp queue analysis for all nearby Caltrans metered on-ramps is required to identify the delay to motorists using the on-ramps and the storage necessary to accommodate the queuing. The effects of ramp metering should be analyzed in the traffic study. The ramps of most concern to Caltrans would be I-805 from Miramar Road to Mira Mesa Boulevard, and likewise for I-15 from Miramar Road to Mira Mesa Boulevard, or where significant trips are added.

Caltrans endeavors that any direct and cumulative impacts to the State Highway System be eliminated or reduced to a level of insignificance pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) standards.

Mitigation measures to State facilities should be included in TIS. Mitigation identified in the traffic study, subsequent environmental documents, and mitigation monitoring reports, should be coordinated with Caltrans to identify and implement the appropriate mitigation. This includes the actual

implementation and collection of any "fair share" monies, as well as the appropriate timing of the mitigation. Mitigation improvements should be compatible with Caltrans concepts.

Mitigation measures for proposed intersection modifications are subject to the Caltrans Intersection Control Evaluation (ICE) policy (Traffic Operation Policy Directive 13-02). Alternative intersection design(s) will need to be considered in accordance with the ICE policy. Please refer to the policy for more information and requirements. http://www.dot.ca.gov/trafficops/ice.html

Any work performed within Caltrans right-of-way (R/W) will require discretionary review and approval by Caltrans and an encroachment permit will be required for any work within the Caltrans R/W prior to construction.

According to the recommended finding that was provided in the Public Notice for Preparation of an Environmental Impact (dated May 4, 2018), the potential for impacts to biological resources was not identified for analysis in the draft EIR (DEIR). The Wildlife Agencies (U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and California Department of Fish and Wildlife) met with the project applicant on May 19, 2017 to discuss steps for processing a Multi-Habitat Planning Area (MHPA) Boundary Line Adjustment (BLA), options for restoring the portion of Carrol Canyon Creek that extends through the project site, and increasing vernal pool buffers and fencing options to an existing City preserve. The meeting also included the steps for processing a wetland deviation under the City's biological superior option. The NOP does not identify whether these aforementioned issues are still part of the project proposal. If the project includes an MHPA BLA or would impact City defined wetlands (per the Environmentally Sensitive Lands regulations), then the DEIR should analyze these issues for conformance to section 5.4.2 of the Final Regional Plan for the Multiple Species Conservation Program (MSCP), Section 1.1.1 of the City's MSCP Subarea Plan, and section 143.0150(3) of the San Diego Municipal Code. respectively. Additionally, based on the proximity Carrol Canyon Creek to proposed development areas, the DEIR should include a thorough discussion on buffers provided to the creek, as well as conformance to section 143.0141 (b)(1)(2)(3)(4)(5) of the San Diego Municipal Code. Thank you for considering each of these issues.

Dear Ms. Shearer-Nguyen:

The Native American Heritage Commission has received the Notice of Preparation (NOP) for Draft Environmental Impact Report for the project referenced above. The California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) (Pub. Resources Code § 21000 et seq.), specifically Public Resources Code section 21084.1, states that a project that may cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of an historical resource is a project that may have a significant effect on the environment. (Pub. Resources Code § 21084.1; Cal. Code Regs., tit.14, § 15064.5 (b) (CEQA Guidelines Section 15064.5 (b)). If there is substantial evidence, in light of the whole record before a lead agency, that a project may have a significant effect on the environment, an environmental impact report (EIR) shall be prepared. (Pub. Resources Code § 21080 (d); Cal. Code Regs., tit. 14, § 15064 subd. (a)(1) (CEQA Guidelines § 15064 (a)(1)). In order to determine whether a project will cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historical resource, a lead agency will need to determine whether there are historical resources with the area of project effect (APE).

CEQA was amended significantly in 2014. Assembly Bill 52 (Gatto, Chapter 532, Statutes of 2014) (AB 52) amended CEQA to create a separate category of cultural resources, "tribal cultural resources" (Pub. Resources Code § 21074) and provides that a project with an effect that may cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a tribal cultural resource is a project that may have a significant effect on the environment (Pub. Resources Code § 21084.2). Please reference California Natural Resources Agency (2016) "Final Text for tribal cultural resources update to Appendix G: Environmental Checklist Form," http://resources.ca.gov/ceqa/docs/ab52/Clean-final-AB-52-App-G-text-Submitted.pdf. Public agencies shall, when feasible, avoid damaging effects to any tribal cultural resource. (Pub. Resources Code § 21084.3 (a)). AB 52 applies to any project for which a notice of preparation or a notice of negative declaration or mitigated negative declaration is filed on or after July 1, 2015. If your project involves the adoption of or amendment to a general plan or a specific plan, or the designation or proposed designation of open space, on or after March 1, 2005, it may also be subject to Senate Bill 18 (Burton, Chapter 905, Statutes of 2004) (SB 18). Both SB 18 and AB 52 have tribal consultation requirements. If your project is also subject to the federal National Environmental Policy Act (42 U.S.C. § 4321 et seq.) (NEPA), the tribal consultation requirements of Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 (154 U.S.C. 300101, 36 C.F.R. § 800 et seq.) may also apply.

The NAHC recommends lead agencies consult with all California Native American tribes that are traditionally and culturally affiliated with the geographic area of your proposed project as early as possible in order to avoid inadvertent discoveries of Native American human remains and best protect tribal cultural resources. Below is a brief summary of portions of AB 52 and SB 18 as well as the NAHC's recommendations for conducting cultural resources assessments. Consult your legal counsel about compliance with AB 52 and SB 18 as well as compliance with any other applicable laws.

AB 52

AB 52 has added to CEQA the additional requirements listed below, along with many other requirements:

- 1. Fourteen Day Period to Provide Notice of Completion of an Application/Decision to Undertake a Project: Within fourteen (14) days of determining that an application for a project is complete or of a decision by a public agency to undertake a project, a lead agency shall provide formal notification to a designated contact of, or tribal representative of, traditionally and culturally affiliated California Native American tribes that have requested notice, to be accomplished by at least one written notice that includes:
 - a. A brief description of the project.
 - b. The lead agency contact information.
 - c. Notification that the California Native American tribe has 30 days to request consultation. (Pub. Resources Code § 21080.3.1 (d)).
 - d. A "California Native American tribe" is defined as a Native American tribe located in California that is on the contact list maintained by the NAHC for the purposes of Chapter 905 of Statutes of 2004 (SB 18). (Pub. Resources Code § 21073).
- 2. Begin Consultation Within 30 Days of Receiving a Tribe's Request for Consultation and Before Releasing a Negative Declaration, Mitigated Negative Declaration, or Environmental Impact Report: A lead agency shall begin the consultation process within 30 days of receiving a request for consultation from a California Native American tribe that is traditionally and culturally affiliated with the geographic area of the proposed project. (Pub. Resources Code § 21080.3.1, subds. (d) and (e)) and prior to the release of a negative declaration, mitigated negative declaration or environmental impact report. (Pub. Resources Code § 21080.3.1(b)).
 - a. For purposes of AB 52, "consultation shall have the same meaning as provided in Gov. Code § 65352.4 (SB 18). (Pub. Resources Code § 21080.3.1 (b)).
- 3. <u>Mandatory Topics of Consultation If Requested by a Tribe</u>: The following topics of consultation, if a tribe requests to discuss them, are mandatory topics of consultation:
 - a. Alternatives to the project.
 - b. Recommended mitigation measures.
 - c. Significant effects. (Pub. Resources Code § 21080.3.2 (a)).
- 4. <u>Discretionary Topics of Consultation</u>: The following topics are discretionary topics of consultation:
 - a. Type of environmental review necessary.
 - b. Significance of the tribal cultural resources.
 - c. Significance of the project's impacts on tribal cultural resources.
 - **d.** If necessary, project alternatives or appropriate measures for preservation or mitigation that the tribe may recommend to the lead agency. (Pub. Resources Code § 21080.3.2 (a)).
- 5. Confidentiality of Information Submitted by a Tribe During the Environmental Review Process: With some exceptions, any information, including but not limited to, the location, description, and use of tribal cultural resources submitted by a California Native American tribe during the environmental review process shall not be included in the environmental document or otherwise disclosed by the lead agency or any other public agency to the public, consistent with Government Code sections 6254 (r) and 6254.10. Any information submitted by a California Native American tribe during the consultation or environmental review process shall be published in a confidential appendix to the environmental document unless the tribe that provided the information consents, in writing, to the disclosure of some or all of the information to the public. (Pub. Resources Code § 21082.3 (c)(1)).
- 6. <u>Discussion of Impacts to Tribal Cultural Resources in the Environmental Document:</u> If a project may have a significant impact on a tribal cultural resource, the lead agency's environmental document shall discuss both of the following:
 - a. Whether the proposed project has a significant impact on an identified tribal cultural resource.
 - b. Whether feasible alternatives or mitigation measures, including those measures that may be agreed to pursuant to Public Resources Code section 21082.3, subdivision (a), avoid or substantially lessen the impact on the identified tribal cultural resource. (Pub. Resources Code § 21082.3 (b)).

- 7. <u>Conclusion of Consultation</u>: Consultation with a tribe shall be considered concluded when either of the following occurs:
 - a. The parties agree to measures to mitigate or avoid a significant effect, if a significant effect exists, on a tribal cultural resource; or
 - **b.** A party, acting in good faith and after reasonable effort, concludes that mutual agreement cannot be reached. (Pub. Resources Code § 21080.3.2 (b)).
- 8. Recommending Mitigation Measures Agreed Upon in Consultation in the Environmental Document: Any mitigation measures agreed upon in the consultation conducted pursuant to Public Resources Code section 21080.3.2 shall be recommended for inclusion in the environmental document and in an adopted mitigation monitoring and reporting program, if determined to avoid or lessen the impact pursuant to Public Resources Code section 21082.3, subdivision (b), paragraph 2, and shall be fully enforceable. (Pub. Resources Code § 21082.3 (a)).
- 9. Required Consideration of Feasible Mitigation: If mitigation measures recommended by the staff of the lead agency as a result of the consultation process are not included in the environmental document or if there are no agreed upon mitigation measures at the conclusion of consultation, or if consultation does not occur, and if substantial evidence demonstrates that a project will cause a significant effect to a tribal cultural resource, the lead agency shall consider feasible mitigation pursuant to Public Resources Code section 21084.3 (b). (Pub. Resources Code § 21082.3 (e)).
- 10. Examples of Mitigation Measures That, If Feasible, May Be Considered to Avoid or Minimize Significant Adverse Impacts to Tribal Cultural Resources:
 - a. Avoidance and preservation of the resources in place, including, but not limited to:
 - i. Planning and construction to avoid the resources and protect the cultural and natural context.
 - ii. Planning greenspace, parks, or other open space, to incorporate the resources with culturally appropriate protection and management criteria.
 - b. Treating the resource with culturally appropriate dignity, taking into account the tribal cultural values and meaning of the resource, including, but not limited to, the following:
 - i. Protecting the cultural character and integrity of the resource.
 - ii. Protecting the traditional use of the resource.
 - iii. Protecting the confidentiality of the resource.
 - **c.** Permanent conservation easements or other interests in real property, with culturally appropriate management criteria for the purposes of preserving or utilizing the resources or places.
 - d. Protecting the resource. (Pub. Resource Code § 21084.3 (b)).
 - e. Please note that a federally recognized California Native American tribe or a nonfederally recognized California Native American tribe that is on the contact list maintained by the NAHC to protect a California prehistoric, archaeological, cultural, spiritual, or ceremonial place may acquire and hold conservation easements if the conservation easement is voluntarily conveyed. (Civ. Code § 815.3 (c)).
 - f. Please note that it is the policy of the state that Native American remains and associated grave artifacts shall be repatriated. (Pub. Resources Code § 5097.991).
- 11. Prerequisites for Certifying an Environmental Impact Report or Adopting a Mitigated Negative Declaration or Negative Declaration with a Significant Impact on an Identified Tribal Cultural Resource: An environmental impact report may not be certified, nor may a mitigated negative declaration or a negative declaration be adopted unless one of the following occurs:
 - a. The consultation process between the tribes and the lead agency has occurred as provided in Public Resources Code sections 21080.3.1 and 21080.3.2 and concluded pursuant to Public Resources Code section 21080.3.2.
 - **b.** The tribe that requested consultation failed to provide comments to the lead agency or otherwise failed to engage in the consultation process.
 - c. The lead agency provided notice of the project to the tribe in compliance with Public Resources Code section 21080.3.1 (d) and the tribe failed to request consultation within 30 days. (Pub. Resources Code § 21082.3 (d)).

This process should be documented in the Cultural Resources section of your environmental document.

SB 18

SB 18 applies to local governments and requires **local governments** to contact, provide notice to, refer plans to, and consult with tribes prior to the adoption or amendment of a general plan or a specific plan, or the designation of open space. (Gov. Code § 65352.3). Local governments should consult the Governor's Office of Planning and Research's "Tribal Consultation Guidelines," which can be found online at: https://www.opr.ca.gov/docs/09_14_05_Updated_Guidelines_922.pdf

Some of SB 18's provisions include:

- 1. <u>Tribal Consultation</u>: If a local government considers a proposal to adopt or amend a general plan or a specific plan, or to designate open space it is required to contact the appropriate tribes identified by the NAHC by requesting a "Tribal Consultation List." If a tribe, once contacted, requests consultation the local government must consult with the tribe on the plan proposal. A tribe has 90 days from the date of receipt of notification to request consultation unless a shorter timeframe has been agreed to by the tribe. (Gov. Code § 65352.3 (a)(2)).
- 2. No Statutory Time Limit on SB 18 Tribal Consultation. There is no statutory time limit on SB 18 tribal consultation.
- 3. Confidentiality: Consistent with the guidelines developed and adopted by the Office of Planning and Research pursuant to Gov. Code section 65040.2, the city or county shall protect the confidentiality of the information concerning the specific identity, location, character, and use of places, features and objects described in Public Resources Code sections 5097.9 and 5097.993 that are within the city's or county's jurisdiction. (Gov. Code § 65352.3 (b)).
- 4. Conclusion of SB 18 Tribal Consultation: Consultation should be concluded at the point in which:
 - The parties to the consultation come to a mutual agreement concerning the appropriate measures for preservation or mitigation; or
 - b. Either the local government or the tribe, acting in good faith and after reasonable effort, concludes that mutual agreement cannot be reached concerning the appropriate measures of preservation or mitigation. (Tribal Consultation Guidelines, Governor's Office of Planning and Research (2005) at p. 18).

Agencies should be aware that neither AB 52 nor SB 18 precludes agencies from initiating tribal consultation with tribes that are traditionally and culturally affiliated with their jurisdictions before the timeframes provided in AB 52 and SB 18. For that reason, we urge you to continue to request Native American Tribal Contact Lists and "Sacred Lands File" searches from the NAHC. The request forms can be found online at: http://nahc.ca.gov/resources/forms/

NAHC Recommendations for Cultural Resources Assessments

To adequately assess the existence and significance of tribal cultural resources and plan for avoidance, preservation in place, or barring both, mitigation of project-related impacts to tribal cultural resources, the NAHC recommends the following actions:

- Contact the appropriate regional California Historical Research Information System (CHRIS) Center (http://ohp.parks.ca.gov/?page_id=1068) for an archaeological records search. The records search will determine:
 - a. If part or all of the APE has been previously surveyed for cultural resources.
 - b. If any known cultural resources have been already been recorded on or adjacent to the APE.
 - c. If the probability is low, moderate, or high that cultural resources are located in the APE.
 - d. If a survey is required to determine whether previously unrecorded cultural resources are present.
- 2. If an archaeological inventory survey is required, the final stage is the preparation of a professional report detailing the findings and recommendations of the records search and field survey.
 - a. The final report containing site forms, site significance, and mitigation measures should be submitted immediately to the planning department. All information regarding site locations, Native American human remains, and associated funerary objects should be in a separate confidential addendum and not be made available for public disclosure.

- **b.** The final written report should be submitted within 3 months after work has been completed to the appropriate regional CHRIS center.
- 3. Contact the NAHC for:
 - a. A Sacred Lands File search. Remember that tribes do not always record their sacred sites in the Sacred Lands File, nor are they required to do so. A Sacred Lands File search is not a substitute for consultation with tribes that are traditionally and culturally affiliated with the geographic area of the project's APE.
 - **b.** A Native American Tribal Consultation List of appropriate tribes for consultation concerning the project site and to assist in planning for avoidance, preservation in place, or, failing both, mitigation measures.
- 4. Remember that the lack of surface evidence of archaeological resources (including tribal cultural resources) does not preclude their subsurface existence.
 - a. Lead agencies should include in their mitigation and monitoring reporting program plan provisions for the identification and evaluation of inadvertently discovered archaeological resources per Cal. Code Regs., tit. 14, section 15064.5(f) (CEQA Guidelines section 15064.5(f)). In areas of identified archaeological sensitivity, a certified archaeologist and a culturally affiliated Native American with knowledge of cultural resources should monitor all ground-disturbing activities.
 - b. Lead agencies should include in their mitigation and monitoring reporting program plans provisions for the disposition of recovered cultural items that are not burial associated in consultation with culturally affiliated Native Americans.
 - c. Lead agencies should include in their mitigation and monitoring reporting program plans provisions for the treatment and disposition of inadvertently discovered Native American human remains. Health and Safety Code section 7050.5, Public Resources Code section 5097.98, and Cal. Code Regs., tit. 14, section 15064.5, subdivisions (d) and (e) (CEQA Guidelines section 15064.5, subds. (d) and (e)) address the processes to be followed in the event of an inadvertent discovery of any Native American human remains and associated grave goods in a location other than a dedicated cemetery.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the City of San Diego's 3 Roots Notice of Preparation (NOP). The San Diego Association of Governments (SANDAG) appreciates the City of San Diego's efforts to implement the policies included in San Diego Forward: The Regional Plan (Regional Plan) that emphasize the need for better land use and transportation coordination. These policies will help provide people with more travel and housing choices, protect the environment, create healthy communities, and stimulate economic growth. SANDAG comments are based on policies included in the Regional Plan and are submitted from a regional perspective.

Smart Growth

Part of this project is located in a Potential Community Center (SD-MM-8), a Smart Growth Opportunity Area (SGOA) identified on the Smart Growth Concept Map. Potential smart growth areas are locations where smart growth development could occur if local land use plans are changed to include minimum levels of planned transit service. To become an existing/planned SGOA in the future, the minimum residential target would be 20 dwelling units per acre and a high frequency local bus or streetcar/shuttle would be needed to meet the minimum transit service characteristics.

SANDAG appreciates that the City of San Diego has prioritized transit-oriented development and land use changes that support the Smart Growth Concept Map and Regional Plan. A key goal of the Regional Plan is to focus growth in SGOAs. Development in these areas supports a sustainable and healthy region, a vibrant economy, and an outstanding quality of life for all. Since Community Centers require high-frequency local transit, please continue to support the plans for Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) within the project area.

Transportation Demand Management

Transportation demand management (TDM) strategies encourage transportation alternatives to the private automobile and can help mitigate traffic impacts and parking demand within and around the development. Mobility hubs integrate TDM programs and services to improve access to high-frequency transit and expand mobility choices. We appreciate the inclusion of a proposed mobility hub within the project and encourage the incorporation of TDM strategies that support the mobility hub concept, such as:

- Provide and promote subsidized transit passes for residents and employees.
- Consider pursuing partnerships with shared mobility service providers (on-demand rideshare, microtransit, scootershare, and bikeshare providers) that can serve the mobility needs within the community and enhance connections to other major destinations like employment sites, commercial centers, and major recreational destinations. These partnerships could provide dedicated fleets for the development to help fill the mobility gap for residents and employees as the proposed BRT route is established.
- Given the proximity to the Interstate 15 (I-15) Express Lanes, promote ridesharing to residents.
 The SANDAG Vanpool Program provides a \$400 per month subsidy for eligible vanpools. SANDAG
 also provides tools and incentives for carpooling. Consider dedicated parking for carpools and
 vanpools at employment sites and the transit station to encourage ridesharing.
- Given the potential for BRT and the opportunity for shared parking among commercial and
 residential uses, consider unbundling parking and implementing reduced parking requirements.
 Additional parking management strategies could include priced parking, parking cash-out, and
 priority parking for shared mobility options. Also, consider maximizing parking investments
 through smart parking solutions that indicate real-time space availability, and facilitate payment
 and parking reservations.
- Neighborhood electric vehicles (NEVs), including electric microtransit, provide a zero-emissions solution for short trips around the community and connecting to transit and nearby destinations. NEVs require fast charging points to support operations. Consider incorporating a shared fleet of NEVs as a transportation solution for the development and site charging infrastructure at the mobility hub to ensure a connected charging network. This infrastructure could be leveraged to also support operations of electric, shared mobility services that require fast charging points.
- Ensure that shared mobility services have dedicated curb space near commercial areas and at the proposed mobility hub to help facilitate safe and convenient rideshare pick-up and drop-off.
- Provision of secure and convenient group bike parking facilities and amenities, such as bicycle repair stands, at destinations throughout the development and at the proposed mobility hub.
- Where feasible, identify opportunities within the proposed mobility hub to site package delivery stations and other mobile services that are not duplicative of retail offerings provided by proximate commercial uses.

- Consider providing wayfinding kiosks that provide real-time travel and trip planning information for regional transit services, shared mobility services, parking, and other available transportation options.
- Consider establishing a designated transportation coordinator to manage and monitor TDM programs for employees and residents.

The iCommute Program can assist with promoting regional TDM programs that encourage the use of transportation alternatives and reduce traffic congestion. More information on regional TDM programs is available at iCommuteSD.com. For more detailed information on mobility hub services and amenities, please refer to the Mobility Hub Features Catalog. The Catalog and additional information on the Regional Mobility Hub Implementation Strategy are available at sdforward.com/mobility-planning/regionalMobilityHub.

Active Transportation

SANDAG encourages the inclusion of the following active transportation elements in the 3 Roots NOP:

- Cul de sacs and other dead-end streets should have bike/pedestrian easements that allow nonmotorized users convenient ingress and egress to neighborhood clusters and open space areas.
- Mid-block crossings on arterial and collector roadways should be provided for the safety of pedestrians and bicyclists, and to encourage more biking and walking trips instead of driving.
- Class 4 bikeways or shared-use paths are recommended on new arterial and collector roadways.
 Shared-use paths should have a separate space dedicated for people to walk and to bike to alleviate potential conflicts between the two.
