DRAFT ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT REPORT FOR AMÁRE APARTMENT HOMES PROJECT – DATED JULY 2022 (STATE CLEARINGHOUSE NUMBER: 2018052045)

Dear Mr. Rojas:

The Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC) received a Draft Environmental Impact Report (EIR) for the Amáre Apartment Homes Project (Project). The Lead Agency is receiving this notice from DTSC because the Project includes one or more of the following: groundbreaking activities, work in close proximity to a roadway, importation of backfill soil, and/or work on or in close proximity to an agricultural or former agricultural site.

DTSC recommends that the following issues be evaluated in the Hazards and Hazardous Materials section of the EIR:

1. The Initial Study included as an appendix to the EIR states that a Phase I Environmental Site Assessment (ESA) was performed for the proposed Project location. However, the Initial Study does not indicate that any Phase I activities were performed under the oversight of a qualified regulatory agency, or that a qualified regulatory agency concurs with the conclusions and recommendations of the Phase I ESA. A regulatory agency such as DTSC or Regional Water Quality Control Board (RWQCB), or a qualified local agency that meets the requirements of <a href="Assembly Bill 304 (AB304)">Assembly Bill 304 (AB304)</a>, should provide regulatory concurrence that the Phase I ESA was conducted in accordance with industry standards and the site is safe for construction and the proposed use. This includes ESA's and concerns described in the following comments.

- 2. The EIR should acknowledge the potential for historic activities on or near the project site to result in the release of hazardous wastes/substances on the project site. In instances in which releases have occurred or may occur, further studies should be carried out to delineate the nature and extent of the contamination, and the potential threat to public health and/or the environment should be evaluated. The EIR should also identify the mechanism(s) to initiate any required investigation and/or remediation and the government agency who will be responsible for providing appropriate regulatory oversight.
- 3. Refiners in the United States started adding lead compounds to gasoline in the 1920s in order to boost octane levels and improve engine performance. This practice did not officially end until 1992 when lead was banned as a fuel additive in California. Tailpipe emissions from automobiles using leaded gasoline contained lead and resulted in aerially deposited lead (ADL) being deposited in and along roadways throughout the state. ADL-contaminated soils still exist along roadsides and medians and can also be found underneath some existing road surfaces due to past construction activities. Due to the potential for ADL-contaminated soil DTSC, recommends collecting soil samples for lead analysis prior to performing any intrusive activities for the project described in the EIR.
- 4. If any projects initiated as part of the proposed project require the importation of soil to backfill any excavated areas, proper sampling should be conducted to ensure that the imported soil is free of contamination. DTSC recommends the imported materials be characterized according to <u>DTSC's 2001 Information</u> Advisory Clean Imported Fill Material.
- 5. If any sites included as part of the proposed project have been used for agricultural, weed abatement or related activities, proper investigation for organochlorinated pesticides should be discussed in the EIR. DTSC recommends the current and former agricultural lands be evaluated in accordance with DTSC's 2008 <u>Interim Guidance for Sampling Agricultural Properties (Third Revision)</u>.
