MITIGATED NEGATIVE DECLARATION FOR GENERAL PLAN AMENDMENT NO. 19-03 & REZONE NO. 19-02 COMMERCIAL CONVERSION FROM SPECIAL PLAN SUBURBAN RESIDENTIAL/NATURAL RESOURCE ZONING TO COMMERCIAL AND COMMERCIAL DEVELOPMENT – DATED DECEMBER 2019

Dear Mr. Timboe:

The Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC) received a Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND) for General Plan Amendment No. 19-03 & Rezone No. 19-02 Commercial Conversion from Special Plan Suburban Residential/Natural Resource Zoning to Commercial and Commercial Development.

The proposed project consists of rezoning an unincorporated area within Tehama County from suburban residential to general commercial GPLU designation and a second area from natural resource lands/recreation to a general commercial zoning district. The applicant intends to develop approximately 8 to 10 acres of the 22-acres as a self-storage facility with retail sales, professional offices and a self-service vehicle wash facility. The potential development would include 11 buildings along the northern portion of the project site adjacent to the equestrian facility.

DTSC recommends that the following issues be evaluated in the MND, Hazards and Hazardous Materials section:

1. The MND should acknowledge the potential for project site activities to result in the release of hazardous wastes/substances. In instances in which releases may occur, further studies should be carried out to delineate the nature and extent of the contamination, and the potential threat to public health and/or the environment should be evaluated. The MND should also identify the mechanism(s) to initiate any required investigation and/or remediation and the

government agency who will be responsible for providing appropriate regulatory oversight.

2. If any sites within the project area or sites located within the vicinity of the project have been used or are suspected of having been used for mining activities, proper investigation for mine waste should be discussed in the MND. DTSC recommends that any project sites with current and/or former mining operations onsite or in the project site area should be evaluated for mine waste according to DTSC's 1998 Abandoned Mine Land Mines Preliminary Assessment Handbook (https://dtsc.ca.gov/wp-content/uploads/sites/31/2018/11/aml_handbook.pdf).
3. If buildings or other structures are to be demolished on any project sites included in the proposed project, surveys should be conducted for the presence of lead-based paints or products, mercury, asbestos containing materials, and polychlorinated biphenyl caulk. Removal, demolition and disposal of any of the above-mentioned chemicals should be conducted in compliance with California environmental regulations and policies. In addition, sampling near current and/or former buildings should be conducted in accordance with DTSC's 2006 *Interim Guidance Evaluation of School Sites with Potential Contamination from Lead Based Paint, Termiticides, and Electrical Transformers* (https://dtsc.ca.gov/wpcontent/uploads/sites/31/2018/09/Guidance_Lead Contamination_050118.pdf).
4. If any projects initiated as part of the proposed project require the importation of soil to backfill any excavated areas, proper sampling should be conducted to ensure that the imported soil is free of contamination. DTSC recommends the imported materials be characterized according to DTSC's 2001 *Information Advisory Clean Imported Fill Material* (https://dtsc.ca.gov/wp-content/uploads/sites/31/2018/09/SMP_FS_Cleanfill-Schools.pdf).
5. If any sites included as part of the proposed project have been used for agricultural, weed abatement or related activities, proper investigation for organochlorinated pesticides should be discussed in the MND. DTSC recommends the current and former agricultural lands be evaluated in accordance with DTSC's 2008 *Interim Guidance for Sampling Agricultural Properties (Third Revision)* (<https://dtsc.ca.gov/wp-content/uploads/sites/31/2018/09/Ag-Guidance-Rev-3-August-7-2008-2.pdf>).
