Project Title: Zimmerman Reservoir Removal and Spring Restoration Project (Lake or Streambed Alteration Agreement No. EPIMS-05514-R1)

Project Location: The project to be completed is located within the Jacoby Creek watershed, approximately 10.7 miles east of the town of Eureka, County of Humboldt, State of California. The project is located in Section 4, T04N, R02E, Humboldt Base and Meridian; in the Korbel U.S. Geological Survey 7.5-minute quadrangle; Assessor's Parcel Number 314-131-033; latitude/longitude: 40.7635, -123.9582 at the spring and water impoundment.

Project Description: The project is limited to one encroachment for the removal of a water impoundment and restoration of a spring and the flow to Jacoby Creek. Permittee excavated a spring and created a reservoir without permits. Water from the spring and reservoir was then diverted for cannabis cultivation on the parcel. Subsequently, a water well that was drilled in 2016 has taken the place of the surface water diversion from the spring/reservoir, and the well provides all water needs for the property. The reservoir showed signs of potential leakage during a CDFW site inspection on August 7, 2019, with saturated conditions observed on the dam wall and extending downslope where runoff was intercepted by an old skid trail on its course to Jacoby Creek. The Permittee has chosen to remove the reservoir and restore the site.
