Project Location:

Project is located within the Sierra National Forest along Forest Service Rd 5S206. The project area is bordered by Highway 41 on the east, FS Rd 5S43 on the west, Mt Raymond Rd on the north and White Chief Mountain Rd on the south. It is adjacent to the town of Fish Camp. Fuels reduction is conducted within a 200-foot distance of the road. Staging and storage will take place near the intersection of FS Rd 5S06 and Grizzly Rd in the Sierra National Forest.

Description of Nature, Purpose and Beneficiaries of Project:

The primary goal of the project is to remove hazard trees and biomass up to 200' from the road corridor. Small diameter green trees (<20"DBH) or hazard trees will be fallen. The work is critical to meet the public safety needs and tree disposal needs stemming from widespread tree mortality in the Sierra Nevada. The project increases public safety by removing hazard trees and thinning fuels on critical corridors. It also protects communities the community of Fish Camp in the Wildland Urban Interface and creates a fuel break in the event of wildland fire or if a prescribed fire is to be conducted.

RE: Self-Certification of Limited Suspension of Requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act

The following certifies that the "Yosemite Area Forest Restoration Project-#2019250, which is funded by a Wildlife Conservation Board grant, qualifies for the limited suspension of the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to the Governor's October 30, 2015 Proclamation of a State of Emergency

(https://www.gov.ca.gov/docs/10.30.15 Tree Mortality State of Emergency.pdf). The emergency proclamation suspends the requirements of CEQA for purposes of carrying out, among other things, Directive 2 of the October 30, 2015 Proclamation of a State of Emergency, where the state agency with primary responsibility for implementing the directive concurs that local action is required. The following criteria apply:

- The Yosemite Area Forest Restoration Project-2019250 is located in a high hazard zone as designated pursuant to Directive 1 of the October 30, 2015 Proclamation of a State of Emergency.
- 2. The project is necessary to protect the public health and safety. The project will protect the public health and safety as follows:
  - The Fish Camp Ecological Restoration Project EIS/Decision Notice included treatment of hazardous fuels and thinning of forest vegetation to reduce the threat of wildfire to associated Wildland Urban Intermix within the project area. As part of this decision, the forest has implemented the thinning of excess vegetation (thinning of understory fuels) as part of the proposed action listed for the project. Since this time, widespread tree mortality across the Southern Sierra Nevada (including area within this project) has rendered this a High Hazard Fire Area. Public safety would be addressed by removal of hazard trees and complete hazard fuels reduction in and around infrastructure that is both inside and outside of communities; Fish Camp, Wawona and Yosemite West as well as both inside and outside of high visitor use areas such as Mariposa Grove of Giant Sequoias, FS campgrounds, road systems and recreational sites. Included as part of this project is the reduction of additional fuels to create fuel breaks to be utilized in the event of wildland fire and/or as control line for prescribed fire implementation.
- 3. The project involves the removal of dead or dying trees that threaten residences, critical community infrastructure, roads and other evacuation corridors. List of these are included in item (2).
- 4. The work will be conducted in accordance with the most current draft Guidelines for High Hazard Zone Tree Removal



#### NOTICE

Each project applicant shall remit to the county clerk the environmental filing fee before or at the time of filing a Notice of Determination (Pub. Resources Code, § 21152; Fish & G. Code, § 711.4, subdivision (d); Cal. Code Regs., tit. 14, § 753.5). Without the appropriate fee, statutory or categorical exemption, or a valid No Effect Determination issued by the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW), the Notice of Determination is not operative, vested, or final, and shall not be accepted by the county clerk.

# COUNTY DOCUMENTARY HANDLING FEE

The county clerk may charge a documentary handling fee of fifty dollars (\$50) per filing in addition to the environmental filing fee (Fish & G. Code, § 711.4, subd. (e); Cal. Code Regs., tit. 14, § 753.5, subd. (g)(1)). A county board of supervisors shall have the authority to increase or decrease the fee or charge, that is otherwise authorized to be levied by another provision of law, in the amount reasonably necessary to recover the cost of providing any product or service or the cost of enforcing any regulation for which the fee or charge is levied (Gov. Code, § 54985, subd. (a)).

Attach copy of cash receipt and, if applicable, previously issued cash receipt, to NOD. Mail filing fees for CRP document to CDFW prior to filing the NOD or equivalent final approval (Cal. Code Regs. Tit. 14, § 753.5 (b)(5)). The CRP should request receipt from CDFW to show proof of payment for filing the NOD or equivalent approval. Please mail payment to address below made attention to the Cash Receipts Unit of the Accounting Services Branch.

Within 30 days after the end of each month in which the environmental filing fees are collected, each county shall summarize and record the amount collected on the monthly State of California Form No. CA25 (TC31) and remit the amount collected to the State Treasurer. Identify the remittance on Form No. CA25 as "Environmental Document Filing Fees" per Fish and Game Code section 711.4.

The county clerk shall mail the following documents to CDFW on a monthly basis:

- ✓ A photocopy of the monthly State of California Form No. CA25 (TC31)
- ✓ CDFW/ASB copies of all cash receipts (including all voided receipts)
- ✓ A copy of all CDFW No Effect Determinations filed in lieu of fee payment
- ✓ A copy of all NODs filed with the county during the preceding month
- A list of the name, address and telephone number of all project applicants for which an NOD has been filed. If this information is contained on the cash receipt filed with CDFW under California Code of Regulations, title 14, section 753.5, subdivision (e)(6), no additional information is required.

#### DOCUMENT RETENTION

The county shall retain two copies of the cash receipt (for lead agency and county clerk) and a copy of all documents described above for at least 12 months.

### RECEIPT NUMBER

- # The first two digits automatically populate by making the appropriate selection in the County/State Agency of Filing drop down menu.
- # The next eight digits automatically populate when a date is entered.
- # The last three digits correspond with the sequential order of issuance for each calendar year. For example, the first receipt number issued on January 1 should end in 001. If a county issued 252 receipts for the year ending on December 31, the last receipt number should end in 252. CDFW recommends that counties and state agencies 1) save a local copy of this form, and 2) track receipt numbers on a spreadsheet tabbed by month to ensure accuracy.
