Project Title: Bear Creek Lower Meadow Restoration (Streambed Alteration Agreement No. 1600-2020-0168-R2)

Project Location: The project is located on Bear Creek, a tributary to the Truckee River, on the eastern side of the Sierra Nevada Mountains in Placer County, CA. The project is entirely on parcels managed by the Tahoe National Forest.

Project Description: The California Department of Fish and Wildlife has extended Lake and Streambed Alteration Agreement number 1600-2020-0168-R2, pursuant to Section 1602 of the Fish and Game Code to the project Applicant, Truckee River Watershed Council.

Routine maintenance work, as described in this Agreement includes the following: removing debris, vegetation, rubbish, downed trees, and other material that could obstruct the natural flow; controlling weeds, grasses, emergent vegetation, and woody vegetation; repairing and maintaining culverts, bridges, and small structures; making repairs to control erosion and stabilize banks; and other work necessary to maintain the functional and structural integrity of waterways.
