PROJECT DESCRIPTION: A Site Approval application for an auction sales facility to be developed on a 139.8-acre parcel in the General Industrial Zone (I-G). The project includes the construction of a 9,750 square foot office building and a 5,088 square foot warehouse building. The operation will take place 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday with fifty (50) employees. Deliveries of vehicles will take place 5:00 p.m. to 8:00 a.m. seven (7) days per week. The parcel will be served by public sewer by the City of Stockton, public water by the California Water Service, and public storm drainage by San Joaquin County. Access to the parcel will be off of Cherokee Lane and Newton Road. This parcel is not under a Williamson Act contract. (Use Type: Auction Sales - Indoor & Outdoor).

The project is located on the northwest corner of Newton Road and Cherokee Road, east of Stockton.

Impact Discussion:

- a-c) The proposed project is a Site Approval application for an auction sales facility. The proposed structures and all improvements will be required to meet all building setbacks and Development Title requirements. This project will be conditioned with requirements for landscaping along roadways bordering the project parcel. The project site is not located along a designated scenic route pursuant to 2035 General Plan Figure 12-2, and the surrounding area is a mixture of industrial and commercial uses. As a result, the proposed project is not anticipated to have an impact on aesthetics.
- d) The proposed project will be subject to the regulations outlined in Development Title Section 9-1015.5(g) that pertain to lighting for commercial development. As a result, the effects of light and glare for daytime or nighttime views in the area are expected to be less than significant.

Impact Discussion:

a-e) The project parcel's General Plan and zoning designations were changed from an agricultural designation to an industrial designation as a result of General Plan Map Amendment and Zone Reclassification applications in 2014. The San Joaquin County Development Title requires Agricultural Mitigation when a parcel goes from an agricultural to non-agricultural use. Pursuant to Development Title Section 9-1080.3(c), agricultural mitigation shall be satisfied by granting a farmland conservation easement or other farmland conservation mechanism set forth in San Joaquin County Development Title Section 9-1080.3(d) to or for the benefit of a Qualifying Entity. The number of acres of agricultural mitigation land shall be at least equal to the number of acres that will be changed to a nonagricultural use (1:1 ratio). As a result, compliance with the Agricultural Mitigation ordinance will be included in the project's Conditions of Approval, and required prior to issuance of a grading or building permit. Therefore, the impact to agriculture and forestry resources will be reduced to less than significant.

a-d) The proposed project is A Site Approval application for an auction sales facility to be developed on a 139.8-acre parcel in the General Industrial Zone (I-G). The project includes the construction of a 9,750 square foot office building and a 5,088 square foot warehouse building. The project site is located in the San Joaquin Valley Air Basin, which is regulated by the San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution Control District (SJVAPCD). SJVAPCD is the lead air quality regulatory agency for San Joaquin. This project was referred to the SJVAPCD for review on November 22, 2019. In a letter dated December 18, 2019, SJVAPCD responded that the project as proposed will not exceed the District's significant thresholds of pollutant. The applicant will be required to meet existing requirements for emissions and dust control as established by SJVAPCD. As a result, any impacts to air quality are expected to be less than significant.

a) The California Department of Fish and Wildlife Natural Diversity Database lists Swainson's hawk (Buteo swainsoni) and Giant Garter Snake (*Thamnophis gigsa*) as rare, endangered, or threatened species or habitat located on or near the site for the proposed project. Referrals have been sent to the San Joaquin Council of Governments (SJCOG), the agency responsible for verifying the correct implementation of the *San Joaquin County Multi-Species Habitat Conservation and Open Space Plan* (SJMSCP), which provides compensation for the conversion of Open Space to non-Open Space uses which affect the plant, fish and wildlife species covered by the Plan. Pursuant to the Final EIR/EIS for SJMSCP, dated November 15, 2000, and certified by SJCOG on December 7, 2000, implementation of the SJMSCP is expected to reduce impacts to biological resources resulting from the proposed project to a level of less-than-significant. Additionally, the project site is not within a riparian area depicted in the General Plan, is approximately fifty (50) feet from the Stockton Diverting Canal waterway, and is not within a wetland area.

SJCOG responded in a letter dated November 25, 2019, that the project site is subject to the SJMSCP. The applicant has confirmed that they will participate in SJMSCP. With the applicant's participation, the proposed project is consistent with the SJMSCP and any impacts to biological resources resulting from the proposed project will be reduced to a level of less-than-significant.

- b-c) The southern property line of the project site abuts the Stockton Diverting Canal. Pursuant to DT 9-1510.5, a 100 foot natural open space will be required from the mean high water mark will be required as a condition of approval. Therefore, the impacts of the proposed project will have on riparian habitat or wetlands will be reduced to less than significant.
 - d) The project's impact on resident or migratory wildlife corridors will be reduced to less than significant because the project applicant will participate in the San Joaquin Multi-Species Habitat Conservation and Open Space Plan (SJMSCP). Implementation of the SJMSCP is expected to reduce impacts to biological resources resulting from the proposed project to a level of less-than-significant.
 - e) The projects impact on protected biological resources will be reduced to less than significant because the project applicant will participate in the San Joaquin Multi-Species Habitat Conservation and Open Space Plan (SJMSCP). Implementation of the SJMSCP is expected to reduce impacts to biological resources resulting from the proposed project to a level of less-than-significant.

The project site is not expected to interfere with local policies protecting biological resources because the applicant will be required to comply with the County's policy, under Development Title Section 9-1505.3, regarding protecting Native Oak Trees, Heritage Oak Trees, or Historical Trees. There are currently 47 Oak Trees on the property, the project will be conditioned to protect and/or provide for replacement of all trees. In this way, any impact to protected biological resources will be reduced to less than significant.

f) The project will not conflict with the provisions of an adopted Habitat Conservation Plan, natural Community Conservation Plan, or other approved local, regional, or state habitat conservation plan, because the project applicant will participate in the San Joaquin Multi-Species Habitat Conservation and Open Space Plan (SJMSCP). Implementation of the SJMSCP is expected to reduce impacts to biological resources resulting from the proposed project to a level of less-than-significant.

- a-b) The proposed project will have no impact on Cultural Resources as there are no resources on the project site that are listed or are eligible for listing on a local register, the California Register of Historic Places, or National Register of Historic Places.
 - c) The North Valley Yokuts Tribe and the United Auburn Indian Community were sent a referral for the project on November 22, 2019 and a response was not received. In the event human remains are encountered during any portion of the project, California state law requires that there shall be no further excavation or disturbance of the site or any nearby area reasonably suspected to overlie adjacent remains until the coroner of the county has determined manner and cause of death, and the recommendations concerning the treatment and disposition of the human remains have been made to the person responsible for the excavation (California Health and Safety Code Section 7050.5). This will be added to the final Conditional of Approval.

- a) The geology of San Joaquin County is composed of high organic alluvium, which is susceptible to earthquake movement. The project will have to comply with the California Building Code (CBC) which includes provisions for soils reports for grading and foundations as well as design criteria for seismic loading and other geologic hazards based on fault and seismic hazard mapping. All recommendations from a soils report must be incorporated into the construction plans.
- b) The project will not result in substantial soil erosion or the loss of topsoil because the project will require a grading permit. Therefore, the grading will be done under permit and inspection by the San Joaquin County Community Development Department's Building Division. As a result, impacts to soil erosion or loss of topsoil will be less than significant.

c-d)	The project site is relatively flat terrain where landslides have not historically been an issue. A soils report will be required
	for grading and foundations and all recommendations from a soils report must be incorporated into the construction
	plans. Therefore, any risks resulting from being located on an unstable unit will be reduced to less than significant.

e) The project will be served by City of Stockton Sewer District and California Water Service. There are no wells with in the project site.

a-b) Emissions of GHGs contributing to global climate change are attributable in large part to human activities associated with the industrial/manufacturing, utility, transportation, residential, and agricultural sectors. Therefore, the cumulative global emissions of GHGs contributing to global climate change can be attributed to every nation, region, and city, and virtually every individual on earth. An individual project's GHG emissions are at a micro-scale level relative to global emissions and effects to global climate change; however, an individual project could result in a cumulatively considerable incremental contribution to a significant cumulative macro-scale impact. As such, impacts related to emissions of GHG are inherently considered cumulative impacts.

Implementation of the proposed project would cumulatively contribute to increases of GHG emissions. Estimated GHG emissions attributable to future development would be primarily associated with increases of carbon dioxide (CO_2) and, to a lesser extent, other GHG pollutants, such as methane (CH_4) and nitrous oxide (N_2O) associated with area sources, mobile sources or vehicles, utilities (electricity and natural gas), water usage, wastewater generation, and the generation of solid waste. The primary source of GHG emissions for the project would be mobile source emissions. The common unit of measurement for GHG is expressed in terms of annual metric tons of CO_2 equivalents $(MTCO_2e/yr)$.

As noted previously, the proposed project will be subject to the rules and regulations of the SJVAPCD. The SJVAPCD has adopted the Guidance for Valley Land- use Agencies in Addressing GHG Emission Impacts for New Projects under CEQA and the District Policy - Addressing GHG Emission Impacts for Stationary Source Projects Under CEQA When Serving as the Lead Agency. (I) The guidance and policy rely on the use of performance-based standards, otherwise known as Best Performance Standards (BPS) to assess significance of project specific greenhouse gas emissions on global climate change during the environmental review process, as required by CEQA. To be determined to have a less-than-significant individual and cumulative impact with regard to GHG emissions, projects must include BPS sufficient to reduce GHG emissions by 29 percent when compared to Business As Usual (BAU) GHG emissions. Per the SJVAPCD, BAU is defined as projected emissions for the 2002-2004 baseline period. Projects which do not achieve a 29 percent reduction from BAU levels with BPS alone are required to quantify additional project-specific reductions demonstrating a combined reduction of 29 percent. Potential mitigation measures may include, but not limited to: on-site renewable energy (e.g. solar photovoltaic systems), electric vehicle charging stations, the use of alternative-fueled vehicles, exceeding Title 24 energy efficiency standards, the installation of energy-efficient lighting and control systems, the installation of energyefficient mechanical systems, the installation of drought-tolerant landscaping, efficient irrigation systems, and the use of low-flow plumbing fixtures.

It should be noted that neither the SJVAPCD nor the County provide project-level thresholds for construction-related GHG emissions. Construction GHG emissions are a one-time release and are, therefore, not typically expected to generate a significant contribution to global climate change. As such, the analysis herein is limited to discussion of long-term operational GHG emissions.

 - (3) CFC, Section 503 Fire Apparatus Access Roads Shall be provided as required by this section.
 - (4) CFC, Section 906 Portable Fire Extinguishers Provide portable fire extinguishers as required by this section.
 - (5) CFC, Section 506 Key Box A Knox® Box shall be installed according to the local fire department's instructions. Make application for the key box at the fire district having jurisdiction of this project. If there is an electronically controlled access gate at this site a Knox® key switch will also be required.
 - (6) CFC, Section 5001.3.3.1 Properties of Hazardous Materials A complete list of hazardous materials used and or stored at this site shall be provided.
 - (7) A complete review, at building permit submittal, will require compliance with applicable codes and ordinances.
