PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The Watershed Research and Training Center (WRTC) plans to implement fuels reduction and prescribed burning activities on the Bar 717 Ranch, near Hyampom, CA. Hazardous fuel reduction and prescribed fire is the primary treatment proposed throughout the project area. Using CCI Forest Health Grant funds, the WRTC plans to implement prescribed burning treatments on approximately 179 acres over the next 3-5 years. The primary goal of this project is to return a natural fire regime back to this fire adapted landscape. Pre-burn fuel treatments that help to minimize fire intensities, especially adjacent to critical infrastructure and control lines, will occur where necessary on the property. Pre-fire treatments will include fuels reduction in the form of hand thinning (with chainsaws) to remove suppressed trees (less than 8" DBH) and brush/shrubs in strategic locations to reduce fire intensities and protect residual trees. All prescribed burning will be completed under a prescribed fire burn plan approved by the State Fire Management Officer. Burn units are subdivided by natural features on the landscape utilizing, roads, trails, ditches, and watercourses to facilitate control efforts, and manage smoke impacts based on burn day smoke dispersion. By utilizing existing features on the property, no new dozer lines or hand lines are needed keeping ground disturbance to a minimum. Broadcast burning will be implemented during appropriate environmental conditions that will allow us to meet our resource objectives as per the prescribed fire burn plan. Burns will be conducted using hand ignition and other standard prescribed fire methods. Burn prescriptions would aim to reduce surface fuel loading 25-85% and understory woody vegetative cover by 15-65% from pre-burn levels

The Department has concluded that no significant environmental impact would occur to aesthetics, agriculture and forestland/timberland, air quality, biological resources, cultural resources, geology and soils, greenhouse gas emissions, hazards and hazardous materials, hydrology and water quality, land use planning, mineral resources, noise, population and housing, public services, recreation, transportation/traffic, utilities and service systems, or to wildfire.
