Dear Oscar Martinez:

Thank you for including the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) in the environmental review process for the above referenced MND. The project consists of the demolition of an approximately 160,000 square-foot vacant office building and the construction of an industrial warehouse building totaling 305,550 square feet on a 13.29-acre site. The City of Torrance is the Lead Agency under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA).

The project is located approximately .7 miles west of Interstate 405. Caltrans concurs with the following statement from the MND: "...the proposed Project does not exceed a level of 15% below existing City of Torrance VMT/Employee and thus does not have a significant transportation impact." Thus, the following information is included for your consideration.

The mission of Caltrans is to provide a safe and reliable transportation network that serves all people and respects the environment. Furthermore, Caltrans encourages Lead Agencies to implement Transportation Demand Management (TDM) strategies that reduce VMT and Greenhouse Gas (GHG) emissions. For TDM strategies that the City can consider integrating into this project to further reduce VMT, refer to:

Also, any transportation of heavy construction equipment and/or materials which requires use of oversized-transport vehicles on State highways will need a Caltrans transportation permit. Caltrans recommends that the project limit construction traffic to off-peak periods to minimize the potential impact on State facilities. If construction traffic is expected to cause delays on any State facilities, please submit a construction traffic control plan detailing these delays for Caltrans' review.
