



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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (Metropolitan) retained Dudek to complete a historical resource significance evaluation of the Stickleback Movie Ranch property, located in unincorporated Los Angeles County near Santa Clarita, California. The study includes a California Historical Resources Information System (CHRIS) records search of the Stickleback Movie Ranch property and a 0.25-mile radius; a pedestrian survey of the project site for cultural resources; building development and archival research; recordation and evaluation of cultural resources identified within and around the Stickleback Movie Ranch portion of the project area; and an assessment of project-related impacts to historical resources in conformance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), and all applicable local municipal code and planning documents.

The former Stickleback Movie Ranch and all associated buildings and structures were found not eligible under all National Register of Historic Places (NRHP), California Register of Historical Resources (CRHR), and Los Angeles County designation criteria. Therefore, the property is not considered an historical resource for the purposes of CEQA.

No archaeological resources were identified within the property as a result of the CHRIS records search or survey. However, two previously recorded archaeological sites (P-19-001857 and P-19-001858) were identified directly north of the Stickleback Movie Ranch as a result of the records search. These resources were re-visited during the archaeological survey, and the site records were updated to reflect existing conditions. Because it is always possible that intact archaeological deposits are present at subsurface levels, the subject property should be treated as potentially sensitive for archaeological resources. Management recommendations to reduce potential impacts to unanticipated archaeological resources and human remains during restoration activities are provided in Section 6.2.

The study includes a California Historical Resources Information System (CHRIS) records search of the Stickleback Movie Ranch property and a 0.25-mile radius; a pedestrian survey of the subject property for cultural resources; building development and archival research; recordation and evaluation of cultural resources identified within and around the Stickleback Movie Ranch portion of the study area; and an assessment of potential impacts to historical resources in conformance with CEQA and all applicable local municipal code and planning documents.

1.1 Site Location and Description

Stickleback Movie Ranch is a approximately 41.1-acre property located in rural northern Los Angeles County in the Soledad Canyon portion of the Santa Clara River watershed, approximately 4.7 miles west of Ravenna, 6.5 miles south of Agua Dulce, and 4.9 miles from CA Highway 14 (see Figure 1, Regional Map). The area around the river is a wide, flat streambed, thickly vegetated with cottonwoods, willows, and brush. The hills north of the main built environment area is steep scree and bare soil hills, with sparse Mojave desert vegetation groups. There is a very steep and rocky slope south of Soledad Canyon Road interspersed with steeply pitched drainages. The subject property is located on the Agua Dulce U.S. Geological Survey 7.5-minute Quadrangle, Township 4N, Range 14W, Sections 12 and 13 (See Figure 2, Stickleback Movie Ranch Vicinity).

1.2 Personnel

This study was prepared in accordance with the requirements of CEQA and in consideration of all Los Angeles County ordinances and regulations. The report and built environment evaluation was prepared by Dudek Architectural Historians Kate Kaiser, MSHP, and Sarah Corder, MFA, both of whom meet the Secretary of the Interior's Professional Qualification Standards (PQS) for architectural history. The records search, archaeological survey, and site record updates were prepared by Dudek Archaeologist Adriane Dorrler, BA. This report was reviewed for quality assurance/quality control by Samantha Murray, MA, RPA (Registered Professional Archaeologist), who meets the Secretary of the Interior's PQS for both architectural history and archaeology.

1.3 Regulatory Setting

Federal

While there is no federal nexus for this project, the subject property was evaluated in consideration of the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) designation criteria and integrity requirements.

National Register of Historic Places


The NRHP is the United States' official list of districts, sites, buildings, structures, and objects worthy of preservation. Overseen by the National Park Service, under the U.S. Department of the Interior, the NRHP was authorized under the National Historic Preservation Act, as amended. Its listings encompass all National Historic Landmarks, as well as historic areas administered by the National Park Service.

NRHP guidelines for the evaluation of historic significance were developed to be flexible and to recognize the accomplishments of all who have made significant contributions to the nation's history and heritage. Its criteria are designed to guide state and local governments, federal agencies, and others in evaluating potential entries in the NRHP. For a property to be listed in or determined eligible for listing, it must be demonstrated to possess integrity and to meet at least one of the following criteria:


The quality of significance in American history, architecture, archaeology, engineering, and culture is present in districts, sites, buildings, structures, and objects that possess integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association, and:

- A. That are associated with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of our history; or
- B. That are associated with the lives of persons significant in our past; or
- C. That embody the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, or method of construction, or that represent the work of a master, or that possess high artistic values, or that represent a significant and distinguishable entity whose components may lack individual distinction; or
- D. That have yielded, or may be likely to yield, information important in prehistory or history.

Integrity is defined in NRHP guidance, "How to Apply the National Register Criteria," as "the ability of a property to convey its significance. To be listed in the NRHP, a property must not only be shown to be significant under the NRHP criteria, but it also must have integrity" (NPS 1990). NRHP guidance further asserts that properties be completed at least 50 years ago to be considered for eligibility. Properties completed fewer than 50 years before evaluation must be proven to be "exceptionally important" (criteria consideration G) to be considered for listing.



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State

California Register of Historical Resources

In California, the term "historical resource" includes but is not limited to "any object, building, structure, site, area, place, record, or manuscript which is historically or archaeologically significant, or is significant in the architectural, engineering, scientific, economic, agricultural, educational, social, political, military, or cultural annals of California" (California Public Resources Code Section 5020.1(j)). In 1992, the California legislature established the California Register of Historical Resources (CRHR) "to be used by state and local agencies, private groups, and citizens to identify the state's historical resources and to indicate what properties are to be protected, to the extent prudent and feasible, from substantial adverse change" (California Public Resources Code Section 5024.1(a)). The criteria for listing resources on the CRHR were expressly developed to be in accordance with previously established criteria developed for listing in the NRHP, enumerated below. According to California Public Resources Code Section 5024.1(c)(1–4), a resource is considered historically significant if it (i) retains "substantial integrity," and (ii) meets at least one of the following criteria:

- (1) Is associated with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of California's history and cultural heritage.
- (2) Is associated with the lives of persons important in our past.
- (3) Embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, region, or method of construction, or represents the work of an important creative individual, or possesses high artistic values.
- (4) Has yielded, or may be likely to yield, information important in prehistory or history.

In order to understand the historic importance of a resource, sufficient time must have passed to obtain a scholarly perspective on the events or individuals associated with the resource. A resource less than 50 years old may be considered for listing in the CRHR if it can be demonstrated that sufficient time has passed to understand its historical importance (see 14 CCR 4852(d)(2)).

The CRHR protects cultural resources by requiring evaluations of the significance of prehistoric and historic resources. The criteria for the CRHR are nearly identical to those for the NRHP, and properties listed or formally designated as eligible for listing in the NRHP are automatically listed in the CRHR, as are the state landmarks and points of interest. The CRHR also includes properties designated under local ordinances or identified through local historical resource surveys.

California Environmental Quality Act

As described further below, the following CEQA statutes and CEQA Guidelines are of relevance to the analysis of archaeological, historic, and tribal cultural resources:

California Public Resources Code Section 21083.2(g) defines "unique archaeological resource."

- California Public Resources Code Section 21084.1 and CEQA Guidelines Section 15064.5(a) define
 "historical resources." In addition, CEQA Guidelines Section 15064.5(b) defines the phrase
 "substantial adverse change in the significance of an historical resource." It also defines the
 circumstances when a project would materially impair the significance of an historical resource.
- California Public Resources Code Section 21074(a) defines "tribal cultural resources."
- California Public Resources Code Section 5097.98 and CEQA Guidelines Section 15064.5(e) set forth standards and steps to be employed following the accidental discovery of human remains in any location other than a dedicated ceremony.
- California Public Resources Code Sections 21083.2(b)-(c) and CEQA Guidelines Section 15126.4 provide information regarding the mitigation framework for archaeological and historic resources, including examples of preservation-in-place mitigation measures; preservation-in-place is the preferred manner of mitigating impacts to significant archaeological sites because it maintains the relationship between artifacts and the archaeological context and may also help avoid conflict with religious or cultural values of groups associated with the archaeological site(s).

More specifically, under CEQA, a project may have a significant effect on the environment if it may cause "a substantial adverse change in the significance of an historical resource" (California Public Resources Code Section 21084.1; CEQA Guidelines Section 15064.5(b).) If a site is either listed or eligible for listing in the CRHR, or if it is included in a local register of historic resources or identified as significant in a historical resources survey (meeting the requirements of California Public Resources Code Section 5024.1(q)), it is a "historical resource" and is presumed to be historically or culturally significant for purposes of CEQA (California Public Resources Code Section 21084.1; CEQA Guidelines Section 15064.5(a)). The lead agency is not precluded from determining that a resource is a historical resource even if it does not fall within this presumption (California Public Resources Code Section 21084.1; CEQA Guidelines Section 15064.5(a)).

A "substantial adverse change in the significance of an historical resource" reflecting a significant effect under CEQA means "physical demolition, destruction, relocation, or alteration of the resource or its immediate surroundings such that the significance of an historical resource would be materially impaired" (CEQA Guidelines Section 15064.5(b)(1); California Public Resources Code Section 5020.1(q)). In turn, CEQA Guidelines section 15064.5(b)(2) states the significance of an historical resource is materially impaired when a project:

- 1. Demolishes or materially alters in an adverse manner those physical characteristics of an historical resource that convey its historical significance and that justify its inclusion in, or eligibility for, inclusion in the California Register of Historical Resources; or
- 2. Demolishes or materially alters in an adverse manner those physical characteristics that account for its inclusion in a local register of historical resources pursuant to section 5020.1(k) of the Public Resources Code or its identification in an historical resources survey meeting the

requirements of section 5024.1(g) of the Public Resources Code, unless the public agency reviewing the effects of the project establishes by a preponderance of evidence that the resource is not historically or culturally significant; or

3. Demolishes or materially alters in an adverse manner those physical characteristics of a historical resource that convey its historical significance and that justify its eligibility for inclusion in the California Register of Historical Resources as determined by a lead agency for purposes of CEQA.

Pursuant to these sections, the CEQA inquiry begins with evaluating whether a project site contains any "historical resources," then evaluates whether that project will cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historical resource such that the resource's historical significance is materially impaired.

If it can be demonstrated that a project will cause damage to a unique archaeological resource, the lead agency may require reasonable efforts be made to permit any or all of these resources to be preserved in place or left in an undisturbed state. To the extent that they cannot be left undisturbed, mitigation measures are required (California Public Resources Code Section 21083.2[a], [b], and [c]).

California Public Resources Code Section 21083.2(g) defines a unique archaeological resource as an archaeological artifact, object, or site about which it can be clearly demonstrated that without merely adding to the current body of knowledge, there is a high probability that it meets any of the following criteria:

- 1. Contains information needed to answer important scientific research questions and that there is a demonstrable public interest in that information.
- 2. Has a special and particular quality such as being the oldest of its type or the best available example of its type.
- 3. Is directly associated with a scientifically recognized important prehistoric or historic event or person.

Impacts to non-unique archaeological resources are generally not considered a significant environmental impact (California Public Resources Code section 21083.2(a); CEQA Guidelines Section 15064.5(c)(4)). However, if a non-unique archaeological resource qualifies as tribal cultural resource (California Public Resources Code Section 21074(c), 21083.2(h)), further consideration of significant impacts is required.

CEQA Guidelines Section 15064.5 assigns special importance to human remains and specifies procedures to be used when Native American remains are discovered. As described below, these procedures are detailed in California Public Resources Code Section 5097.98.

Local

Los Angeles County Historic Preservation Program

Los Angeles County's Historic Preservation Program is comprised of the County's Historic Preservation Ordinance, which establishes criteria and procedures for the designation, preservation, and maintenance of landmarks and historic districts, and the County's Mills Act Historical Property Contract Program, which provides property tax relief to owners of historic properties who are willing to restore and maintain their properties. The Program applies only to properties located in unincorporated areas of Los Angeles County.

Historic Preservation Ordinance

On September 1, 2015, the Board of Supervisors recognized the importance of preserving the County's distinctive architectural and cultural history by adopting the Historic Preservation Ordinance ("HPO"), which:

- Specifies criteria and procedures for the designation of landmarks and historic districts;
- Prohibits work, including demolition, on property nominated but not yet designated as a landmark or historic district;
- Encourages adaptive reuse of landmarks and historic district contributors by providing relief from parking requirements;
- Provides for the enhancement of historic districts by the establishment of development guidelines and standards, and by allowing streetscape improvements that are compatible with the area's historic character:
- Specifies criteria and procedures for reviewing proposed work on designated landmarks or on property within historic districts;
- Requires maintenance of landmarks and historic district contributors to prevent deterioration; and
- Establishes penalties for unauthorized work, including demolition, on landmarks or historic district contributors.

22.52.3060 - Criteria for Designation of Landmarks and Historic Districts.

- A. A structure, site, object, tree, landscape, or natural land feature may be designated as a landmark if it is 50 years of age or older and satisfies one or more of the following criteria:
 - 1. It is associated with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of the history of the nation, State, County, or community in which it is located;
 - 2. It is associated with the lives of persons who are significant in the history of the nation, State, County, or community in which it is located;

- 3. It embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type, architectural style, period, or method of construction, or represents the work of an architect, designer, engineer, or builder whose work is of significance to the nation, State, County, or community in which it is located; or possesses artistic values of significance to the nation, State, County, or community in which it is located;
- 4. It has yielded, or may be likely to yield, significant and important information regarding the prehistory or history of the nation, State, County, or community in which it is located;
- 5. It is listed, or has been formally determined eligible by the United States National Park Service for listing, in the National Register of Historic Places, or is listed, or has been formally determined eligible by the State Historical Resources Commission for listing, on the California Register of Historical Resources;
- 6. If it is a tree, it is one of the largest or oldest trees of the species located in the County; or
- 7. If it is a tree, landscape, or other natural land feature, it has historical significance due to an association with an historic event, person, site, street, or structure, or because it is a defining or significant outstanding feature of a neighborhood.
- B. Property less than 50 years of age may be designated as a landmark if it meets one or more of the criteria set forth in subsection A of this Section, and exhibits exceptional importance.
- C. The interior space of a property, or other space held open to the general public, including but not limited to a lobby, may be designated as a landmark or included in the landmark designation of a property if the space qualifies for designation as a landmark under subsections A or B of this Section.
- D. Historic districts. A geographic area, including a noncontiguous grouping of related properties, may be designated as an historic district if all of the following requirements are met:
 - 1. More than 50 percent of owners in the proposed district consent to the designation;
 - 2. The proposed district satisfies one or more of the criteria set forth in subsections A.1 through A.5, inclusive, of this Section; and
 - 3. The proposed district exhibits either a concentration of historic, scenic, or sites containing common character-defining features, which contribute to each other and are unified aesthetically by plan, physical development, or architectural quality; or significant geographical patterns, associated with different eras of settlement and growth, particular transportation modes, or distinctive examples of parks or community planning.

(Ord. 2015-0033 § 3, 2015.)

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2 HISTORIC CONTEXT

2.1 Historical Overview of the Soledad Canyon Area

The Tatavium (or Alliklik or Fernandeño Band of Mission Indians) people lived in the greater Santa Clarita region from 450 CE through European contact in 1769 CE and persist through present to become a federally recognized tribe. The Tatavium were both linguistically and ethnically distinct from the Los Angeles area Chumash and Serrano. Soledad Pass at the eastern end of Soledad Canyon was the southeastern extent of the group's territory. West of the site vicinity, nearer the Acton area of Soledad Canyon, was a large Tatavium settlement, and the Santa Clara River Basin was an important transportation route between the Mojave Desert and coastal California for the Tatavium and neighboring groups (Fernandeño Tatavium 2009; Johnson and Earle 1990; Kroeber 1976).

The Spanish entered the Santa Clara River Valley during the 1769-1770 Portolá expedition, ordered by Visitor General of New Spain, Don José de Gálvez. The land expedition was prompted by the alarm felt by policymakers that Russia would press south from their Pacific Northwest holdings into California that had been claimed by New Spain, but not thoroughly explored beyond the coast. In August 1769, Franciscan missionary and official expedition diarist Fray Juan Crespí described descending into the Santa Clara River drainage from the San Fernando Valley. Crespí described a biologically diverse area with cottonwoods and oaks, and an "arroyo with a great deal of water that runs into a valley well grown with willows and cottonwoods." Crespí named the river for Saint Clare of Assisi. The expedition was well-received by the Tatavium, however the area and Tatavium would later come under the control of the San Fernando Rey de España Mission (est. 1797). Along with three other local tribal groups, by 1810, the Tatavium would become neophytes for the mission, forced into Christianity and hard labor on the nearby estancia, Estancia de San Francisco Xavier (Fernandeño Tatavium 2009; King and Blackburn 1978; Stephens et. al. 2014; Treutlein 1968).

Following the Mexican War of Independence in 1821, missions in New Spain were inventoried and the land was taken by the Mexican government. In 1834, Lieutenant Antonio Del Valle was assigned to the property of Mission San Fernando and estancia. The lands were supposed to be returned to the Tatavium, but instead were given as a land grant to Del Valle in 1839 and renamed Rancho San Francisco. In 1842, Francisco Lopez, a relative of Del Valle, discovered gold in Placerita Canyon, at the Oak of the Golden Dream (CHL 2017; Perkins 1957; Worden 1996).

Both the gold strike in Northern California and the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo in 1848 brought an influx of American settlers to California in the latter half of the nineteenth century. In 1860, Colonel Thomas F. Mitchell became the first white American settler in Soledad Canyon. Just a year later, James O'Reilly made a gold strike in Soledad Canyon and set off a mining boom. In 1862, C.H. Brinley established a large copper mining claim, which led to the formation of the Soledad Copper Mining District. Henry Newhall of Massachusetts came to California for the Gold Rush, and like many, was unsuccessful and found a different

trade. He arrived at the Port of San Francisco in 1850, too late to join the rush, and opened a successful auction house. Newhall invested in railroads and eventually sat on the board of the Southern Pacific Railroad (SPRR), which acquired smaller railroads between 1869 and 1876 to connect northern and southern California. To further the SPRR's business, Newhall purchased Rancho San Francisco in 1875 and used his land to connect the existing SPRR line to Los Angeles. Near the subject property, a railroad stop named Russ Station was in operation from circa 1890 to circa 1940. After his death in 1882, Newhall's children formed the Newhall Land and Farming Company and managed their father's 140,000+ acres, keeping the company afloat through ranching, agriculture, and eventually land sales (Earle 2003; Pollack 2010; SFB 1862; Stephens et. al. 2014; Worden 2017).

Mining, ranching, and freighting dominated land uses for the Soledad Canyon area in the late nineteenth century. Soledad Canyon was also a major freighting route from Los Angeles to the Mojave Desert and mines in Owens Valley. Remi Nadeau opened a road in Soledad Canyon in 1872, and formed the Cerro Gordo Freighting Company in 1874. Sheep ranching operations did well in the rocky, xeric landscapes of the canyon but may have contributed to increased wildfire danger. In 1884, a large and destructive fire was blamed on shepherding practices and the introduction of invasive grasses, and in turn, restrictions on shepherding led to the formation of the San Gabriel Forest Reserve (Angeles National Forest) in 1892. Notable only for its close proximity to the subject property, a short-lived magnetite mining operation in 1902, and an unprofitable titaniferous iron mine known as Russ Siding Mine in 1915, the area immediately near the subject property was devoid of mining. Though the mines quickly went out of business, the site retained the name Russ (Day 1902; Earle 2003; Hamilton 1922; LAH 1874; Stephens et. al. 2014).

With access to the area established and extractive industries in decline, recreation in the newly formed San Gabriel Forest Reserve became the area's new attraction in the twentieth century. Alongside the forest boundaries grew hospitality-based industries: restaurants, hotels, auto camps, gas and automobile service stations, and campgrounds (Figure 3). The picturesque area attracted vacationers, motorists, and outdoor recreation enthusiasts from nearby Los Angeles. The Angeles National Forest offered hiking and campgrounds immediately south of and accessed through Soledad Canyon. Because the National Forest land was composed mostly of chaparral, the timber industry has not played a significant role in the development of the area or on the Angeles National Forest as a whole. Instead, the Reserve, and later the National Forest lands, were used mostly for recreational purposes. After the reserve was set aside, in 1925 President Coolidge set aside an additional 80 acres in Soledad Canyon. It is unclear whether this land was intended as a National Park (as one newspaper alleged) or as future Forest Service sites for campgrounds, but the area included the portion of the canyon between Saugus and Acton and the area near Russ Siding Mine. The Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) built a public campground in Soledad Canyon in 1934, as well as nine other camps in the greater Santa Clarita vicinity. Private campgrounds, mobile home parks, a mineral springs resort, and Forest Service-owned campgrounds were also built in Soledad Canyon in the twentieth century (Doelle 1923a, 1923b; Hamra 1963; The Newhall Signal 1925; 1933a, 1933b, 1934; USFS 2017).

The previously quiet Soledad Canyon and the surrounding area did not experience significant growth in the early twentieth century. However, the World War II military base locations in California brought hundreds of thousands of new citizens to California, many of which settled in the area after the war. Westward migration to California increased during the 1950s, due in large part to affordable suburban residential developments. The Los Angeles County Board seized the opportunity of explosive population growth to change property taxation structure in a way that would encourage such developments. This was problematic for landowners who owned larger tracts of land such as the ranches in the Santa Clarita Valley and Soledad Canyon area. As a result, landowners, such as the Newhall Land and Farming Company, subdivided their ranch lands and sold them to real estate developers rather than accept the higher tax rate. The towns of Newhall, Saugus, and Canyon Country became, by proximity, "bedroom communities" for baby boomers who commuted from rural locations into the ever-growing City of Los Angeles. Growth in the Santa Clarita Valley region would continue in this manner for decades (Cameron 1965; Worden 1997).

Soledad Canyon, part of Canyon Country, was incorporated into the city of Santa Clarita in 1987, unifying previously existing communities including Canyon Country, Newhall, Saugus, and Valencia. Incorporation brought better county services and local services (Boyer 2015).

2.2 9777 Soledad Canyon Road

The Stickleback Movie Ranch portion of the study area is located north of Soledad Canyon Road and south of the former Southern Pacific Railroad (now the Metrolink), at the intersection of Briggs Road and Soledad Canyon Road. In 1953, the address of 9777 Soledad Canyon Road was first attributed to an establishment called Bill's Place, owned by William H. Borhman. Bill's Place functioned as a picnicking area and summer camp, and hosted meetings for the community groups such as the Lions, the local Homeowners Association, and a local "20s & 30s Club." As of 1955, there was a pool present at the location, and Borhman intended to plant trees at his property to add to the attractiveness of the already popular picnicking spot. Bohrman and wife Leila ran Bill's Place until 1964, when they were foreclosed upon by the San Fernando Valley Bank (Newhall Signal 1953, 1955a, 1955b, 1964).

In 1966, the property's new owner, Universal Park Corporation, re-opened the campground as Oasis Park, intending it to be used primarily for recreational vehicles (RVs; Figure 4). While the subject property operated as Oasis Park, the campground hosted numerous cookouts, a country and western music awards show, the annual Canyon Country Frontier Days Celebration, and concerts (The Desert Sun 1998; LAT 1971; Newhall Signal 1966a, 1966b, 1980).

In 1974, Universal Park Corporation petitioned for a conditional use permit to increase their number of campsites. At nearly the same time, the Oasis Park transitioned from being primarily a vacation destination to being a mobile home park for year-round residents. Several inhabitants operated their own businesses from inside the mobile home park. Other than some small-scale theft, wildfires, floods, and railroad-related issues mentioned in the newspapers, Oasis Park operated without interruption or notable events until it came under new ownership in 2004 (Newhall Signal and Saugus Enterprise 1974, 1984, 1987).

In 2004, new owners Rancho Agua Dulce LLC closed access to a road across to their property in anticipation of making the mobile home park into a recreational park again. The residents of Briggs Road had been using the private road to reach their properties, which were north of the railroad tracks, and the disputed closure sparked a years-long legal battle. The new owners no longer wished to allow public access, and the Metrolink railroad opposed the easement because of the danger of an at-grade railroad crossing. The argument became violent in 2007, when a Briggs Road resident allegedly assaulted a caretaker of Oasis Park, escalating the dispute outside the courtroom. The issue was resolved later in 2007, when a Los Angeles County court upheld a conditional road easement from 1955 (Santa Clarita Valley Signal 2004, 2006, 2007a, 2007b).

After losing the legal battle, Rancho Agua Dulce LLC continued as owners of the property, and in 2010, converted the property from a mobile home park to a filming location called Stickleback River Movie Ranch. The movie ranch was advertised as having a "country store," "old buildings," a pool, and a 1950s era playground (Figure 5). Only a few films were made using this movie ranch location, including: *Bennington Gothique* (2013), *Camp Takota* (2014), *The Bus Driver* (2016), *Deep Undercover* (2016), and *Tonight Its You* (2016) (Adkins 2015, 2016; SCFO 2017; Yelp 2017).

In July 2016, the Sand Fire Complex burned over 40,000 acres in the Angeles National Forest near the Santa Clarita Valley. In addition to destroying homes and causing the evacuation of 20,000 people from Santa Clarita Valley, the fire burned several filming properties in Soledad Canyon, including Koch Movie Ranch, Sable Ranch, and A Rancho Deluxe. Nearly all of the buildings on Stickleback Movie Ranch were consumed by the fire (Adkins 2016; City News Service 2016).

3 BACKGROUND RESEARCH

3.1 CHRIS Records Search

Staff at the South Central Coastal Information Center (SCCIC) conducted a California Historical Resources Information System records search on April 24, 2017, for the subject property and surrounding 0.25-mile radius. This search included collections of mapped prehistoric, historic, and built-environment resources; Department of Parks and Recreation site records; technical reports; and ethnographic references. Additional consulted sources included historical maps of the subject property; the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP); the California Register of Historical Resources (CRHR); the California Historic Property Data File; and the lists of California State Historical Landmarks, California Points of Historical Interest, and the Archaeological Determinations of Eligibility. Confidential Appendix A provides the confidential results of the records search and a bibliography of prior cultural resources studies.

Confidential Appendix A provides the complete records search results, including all results maps, previously conducted studies, and previously recorded sites within 0.25-mile of the Stickleback Movie Ranch. The following paragraphs discuss the previously conducted cultural resources studies and previously recorded resources as they relate to the Stickleback Movie Ranch site only.

Previously Conducted Cultural Resources Studies

Overall, 15 cultural resources studies have been conducted within 0.25 miles of the Stickleback Movie Ranch. Of these, two studies overlap at least a portion of the property. Table 1 provides the details of these previous cultural resources studies that overlap the Stickleback Movie Ranch site.

Previously Recorded Cultural Resources

The Stickleback Movie Ranch site is composed of waste dump sites interspersed with invasive wetland species and multiple abandoned vehicles, equipment, dwellings, and facilities; parts of the property were burned in the 2016 Sand Fire. There are no previously recorded resources directly within the Stickleback Movie Ranch site. The property is adjacent to California State Historic Landmark No. 717 – Angeles

National Forest (P-19-186535), a historical resource, located south of Soledad Canyon Road. However, the Angeles National Forest is not within the Stickleback Movie Ranch property. Additionally, a single grave marker (P 19-001857) is mapped as being within the northern Stickleback Movie Ranch property boundary and approximately 450 feet from the closest (northernmost) portion of the area of potential effect. The grave is outside the confines of a dedicated cemetery. Multicomponent site P-19-001858 is mapped as being within the northeastern property boundary of the Stickleback Movie Ranch site and approximately 660 feet upslope from the closest (northeastern) portion of the area of potential effect. This resource consists of a prehistoric lithic scatter and a historic-age refuse scatter consisting of wagon parts, bottle glass, and food tins dating from the late nineteenth to early twentieth century. According to the site record, the historic component of the multicomponent site may be associated with the historic-age grave. Table 2 provides further details about these resources.

3.2 Building Development Research

Archival research was conducted in support of the historical significance evaluation of Stickleback Movie Ranch. Short descriptions of all research efforts are provided as follows.

City of Santa Clarita Building and Safety Services

Dudek used the City of Santa Clarita's online database to review building permits filed for the property on December 29, 2017. No building permits were filed for the property listed at the subject property's address, nor was associated with the owner, Rancho Agua Dulce LLC, or previous owners.

Santa Clarita Valley Historical Society

Dudek contacted Leon Worden through email on December 20, 2017. Mr. Worden indicated that the physical archives and museum did not have any materials relating to the Stickleback Movie Ranch site or its predecessors, but the online digital collection might have some relevant newspaper articles and photographs, which were all used in the preparation of the historic context (Section 2).

Acton-Agua Dulce Historical Society

Dudek contacted the Acton-Agua Dulce Historical Society through email on December 20, 2017 and again on January 2, 2018. As of the date of this report, Dudek has not received a response from Acton-Agua Dulce Historical Society.

Los Angeles Public Library

Dudek used the LAPL's online archive of Los Angele Times and Sentinel articles to assemble data on movie ranches and general history of Soledad Canyon used in the preparation of the historic context (Section 2).

Aerial Photograph and Historic Map Review

Sanborn Fire Insurance Company maps for Stickleback Movie Ranch were not available. This is likely due to the rural nature of the property and inability to be insured. Historic aerial photographs for the vicinity of the subject property were available for the following years: 1954, 1959, 1977, 1994, 2002, 2005, 2009, 2010, 2012. Due to the tree cover and vegetation at the site, few features and buildings could be discerned, with the exception of the pool and RV pad features. The earliest photograph, from 1954 shows the area as undeveloped and the 1959 aerial photograph as having roads and RV campsite features that have persisted through present. Another strong development period occurred between the 1959 and 1974 aerial photographs when the pool, planted vegetation, and other buildings and features appear. There are no major changes to the buildings or site layout after 1974. The aerial imagery has not been updated to indicate the extent of the Sand Fire damage from 2016 (NETR 2017).

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4 CULTURAL RESOURCES SURVEY

Dudek archaeologists conducted the required intensive-level pedestrian survey for archaeological and historic built environment resources of the Stickleback Movie Ranch. The methods and results of these survey efforts are presented below.

4.1 Archaeological Survey

On August 9, 2017, Dudek Archaeologists Adriane Dorrler, BA and Michael Williams, PhD conducted an intensive pedestrian survey of the Stickleback Movie Ranch site. The survey involved walking transects spaced no more than 15 m apart across the entire site, except in areas that were too steep or brushy. The Stickleback Movie Ranch is a comprised of two parcels of agricultural land used as a movie ranch and filming site, and it includes residential and working buildings, outbuildings, and trailer campsites in a rural, undeveloped area along the Santa Clara River. The property was used as a film location and campsite, before it burned in the 2016 Sand Fire. The property is bounded on all sides by other rural properties.

The two previously recorded sites (P-19-001857 and P-19-001858) within the Stickleback Movie Ranch were visited on August 9, 2017. The areas where these resources are located were intensively surveyed during the site visit.

P-19-001857 (historic headstone)

This resource was first recorded in 1990 by Simon and Whitley (W&S Consultants) as a single historic headstone inscribed with the following epitaph:

Rose Bailey Died Mar. 18, 1890 Aged 28 Years

Simon and Whitley noted the possibility of other historic graves in the area and the possible association with the nearby multi-component site P-19-001858. P-19-001858, recorded by Simon and Whitley in 1990 consists of a historic refuse scatter of early twentieth century domestic refuse, along with hand-forged wagon parts and a prehistoric lithic scatter. Dudek relocated the headstone in August 2017, and it appeared to be in the same condition as previously documented—the granite headstone is set in concrete with native cobbles placed around the concrete.

Dudek expanded the site boundary to include newly identified historic-age domestic refuse scattered around the headstone (see DPR form provided in Appendix B). Additionally, in the immediate vicinity of the documented grave marker were four rock clusters arranged in the same fashion as the documented grave marker, yet without headstones or cement. Ground surface visibility was poor due to dense grass cover. However, observable diagnostic artifacts included church key open flat top beverage cans (date 1935-1970s), sun colored amethyst glass fragments (date ~1870s-1920), and aqua-colored "bell" glass insulator fragment (1875-1930s). A round shovel without a handle was also observed at the site. Site P-19-001857 is not located within the subject property will not be impacted by any potential restoration activities, and therefore, it was not evaluated.

P-19-001858 (multicomponent site)

P-19-001858 was first recorded in 1990 by Simon and Whitley as a multi-component site consisting of a low-density prehistoric lithic scatter and a historic-age refuse scatter. The prehistoric artifacts included two handstones and approximately six flakes composed of chalcedony, basalt, and quartzite material. The historic component consisted of early twentieth century material, including hand forged wagon parts, sun colored amethyst glass, glass insulator, mouth-blown bottle, baking soda tins, and miscellaneous metal objects. Simon and Whitley noted the potential for buried deposits within the site and the possible association with nearby P-19-001857 (historic-age headstone).

Dudek revisited a small portion of P-19-001858 in August 2017. Only the southwestern edge of P-19-001858 overlapped the study area. As a result, only the southwestern edge of P-19-001858, or approximately 10 percent of the original site, was revisited. One prehistoric artifact, a chert interior flake, was observed within the confines of the permitted survey area at P-19-001858. The flake was just north of Briggs Road at the southwestern edge of the site. No historic artifacts were observed in this area of the site. Site P-19-001858 is not located within the subject property and will not be impacted by any potential restoration activities, and therefore, it was not evaluated.

4.2 Built Environment Survey

On December 12, 2017, Dudek Architectural Historian Kate Kaiser, MSHP, and Archaeologist Michelle Wilcox conducted a pedestrian survey of all of the extant built environment within the Stickleback Movie Ranch. All buildings on the site were photographed, researched, and evaluated in consideration of NRHP, CRHR, and Los Angeles County designation criteria and integrity requirements. The survey entailed walking all sides of the buildings and structures, as well as the surrounding site.

A concrete culvert headwall stamped "1922" was also newly identified at the railroad crossing at Briggs Road, within the Southern Pacific Railroad right-of-way.

Dudek documented built environment resources using field notes, digital photography, and close-scale field maps. Photographs were taken with a Canon Power Shot ELPH180 digital camera with 20 megapixels and 8x optical zoom. All field notes, photographs, and records related to the current study are on file at Dudek's Pasadena, California, office.

Stickleback Movie Ranch Site

The Stickleback Movie Ranch Site contains a mix of residential and camping-related buildings and structures. There are 5 intact buildings on the site, 3 buildings that can be classified as ruins, and several structures relating to the property's history as an RV campground, that were constructed more than 45 years ago. All buildings were numbered and are referred to by number in the property descriptions that follow and in Figure 6, Site Map.

Building 1

Building 1 is a Ranch-style building of unknown use facing south toward rows of trailer parking spaces and a pool (Figure 7). The original date of construction could not be confirmed for this building. However, a review of historic aerial photographs dates the building to between 1959 and 1974. The one-story building has a rectangular plan with a side gabled roof sheathed in composition shingles, and a large gabled dormer over the front porch. Exterior walls are composed of concrete masonry units (CMUs) on all four elevations and exhibit plaster cladding in the gable ends. The main entrance to the house is located on the south elevation and is sheltered beneath a low-pitched, front-gabled overhanging awning that projects from the side-gabled roof. Entry to the front elevation requires accessing a concrete and brick trimmed porch and steps from the south. This porch wraps the southwest and southeast corners and continues a few feet onto those elevations. Fenestration is consistent in type across all the elevations: all windows are 2-lite, sliding metal windows, with a brick sill, no header, and trimmed with plastic, non-functional shutters attached to the exterior of the CMU wall.

On the main (south) elevation, from left to right there is a metal door with a single glass pane in the upper half, a sliding 2-lite window, a second identical door, and a second identical window. There is a large porch on this elevation that curves outward toward a centrally oriented set of stairs that lead onto the porch. According to a date scratched into the cement of the porch, it was added in 1990. There are two mature cottonwood trees planted near to the southwest and southeast corners of the building. The porch was constructed of CMUs, poured concrete, and red brick trim. On the west elevation, from left to right, there is a metal door with no windowpane, and a sliding 2-lite window. There is a vent in the gable. On the north elevation, there are no windows or doors. At the east side of the north elevation is a gas meter. On the east elevation, from left to right, there is a sliding, 2-lite window and a metal door with no windowpane. There is a vent in the gable and a wood panel with a stylized image of a house inset into the plaster.

A review of historic maps and aerial photographs was conducted as part of the archival research effort for this property. Sanborn maps were not available for this site. Historic aerial photographs were reviewed for the property from the following years: 1954, 1959, 1974, 1994, 2002, 2005, 2009, 2010, and 2012. Due to the dense vegetation cover, an approximate build date for the building could not be ascertained; however, the cottonwood trees planted at the southeast and southwest corners of Building 1 first appear between the 1959 and 1974 aerial photographs. These particular cottonwoods can be distinguished from the naturally growing cottonwoods in the river because they were planted in an east-west trending allèe that lead from the access road in the northeast part of the site, along the railroad tracks, to this building. Other cottonwoods in this allèe are visible in historical aerial photographs (NETR 2017).

Building 2

Building 2 is a simple, vernacular building of unknown use in the southwest portion of the property (Figure 8). The original date of construction could not be confirmed for this building. The one-story building has a rectangular plan with a side gabled, low-pitched roof sheathed in composition shingles. There is a small, rectangular addition on the west elevation that seems to have housed utilities and is accessed only from the building exterior. Exterior wall cladding is painted stucco except in the gables, which are clad in horizontally

oriented, V-joint boards. The main entrance to the house is located on the south elevation. Due to the poor condition of the building, the original fenestration could not be determined on all elevations. Two windows remain intact enough to determine type, both along the main elevation. They are each vinyl, 2-lite sliding windows. All other fenestration, both windows and doors, has been destroyed beyond recognition or removed entirely, leaving only the wall openings.

A review of historic maps and aerial photographs was conducted as part of the archival research effort for this property. Sanborn maps were not available for this site. Historic aerial photographs were reviewed for the property from the following years: 1954, 1959, 1974, 1994, 2002, 2005, 2009, 2010, and 2012. Due to the dense vegetation cover, an approximate build date for the building could not be ascertained (NETR 2017).

Building 3

Building 3 is a Contemporary-style building originally used as a bathhouse with restrooms and showers (Figure 9). The original date of construction could not be confirmed for this building. The one-story building has an irregular plan with a rectangular main volume that contain the restrooms and a smaller rectangular volume attached to the west elevation for individual showers. The building has a flat roof

sheathed in composition shingles, with a slight overhang. Exterior walls are clad in stucco on all four elevations. Because of the dual nature of the restrooms, there is no primary or "main" elevation—access is delineated by gender, with women's access to the north side of the building and men's access to the south side of the building. Access is further indicated by L-shaped privacy walls around the entrances. Fenestration is limited, with no windows on any elevation. There are two doors, on the north and south elevations, providing discrete access to the restrooms or showers. Doors are simple wood doors with no windows or decoration. There is a water fountain attached to the "Ladies" privacy wall along the north elevation. The building appears relatively unharmed by the recent fire and retains its paint job which indicate it was a "Tennis Center." No tennis or sport-related use is otherwise indicated at the restroom.

A review of historic maps and aerial photographs was conducted as part of the archival research effort for this property. Sanborn maps were not available for this site. Historic aerial photographs were reviewed for the property from the following years: 1954, 1959, 1974, 1994, 2002, 2005, 2009, 2010, and 2012. Due to the dense vegetation cover, an approximate build date for the building could not be ascertained (NETR 2017).

Building 4

Building 4 is the ruined remnant of an RV dump station and possibly another restroom at the western boundary of the property (Figure 10). The original date of construction could not be confirmed for this building. The fire destroyed the roof and interiors, leaving only the walls intact. Based solely on what remains of the building, Building 4 appears to have been a one-story, Contemporary-style building with a flat roof and irregular plan. Exterior walls are clad in stucco on all four elevations. Fenestration is limited: there are no windows on any elevation. There is one door opening per elevation on the north, west, and south elevations; there are no door openings on the east elevation. Each door has a short, L-shaped privacy wall around it. The privacy walls are constructed of CMUs. Burnt signage at the entrance to the building indicates its use.

A review of historic maps and aerial photographs was conducted as part of the archival research effort for this property. Sanborn maps were not available for this site. Historic aerial photographs were reviewed for the property from the following years: 1954, 1959, 1974, 1994, 2002, 2005, 2009, 2010, and 2012. Due to the dense vegetation cover, an approximate build date for the building could not be ascertained (NETR 2017).

Building 5

Building 5 is the pump house immediately west of the pool feature (Figure 11). The original date of construction could not be confirmed for this building. However, a review of historic aerial photographs dates the building to between 1959 and 1974. Building 5 was a utilitarian building that housed water pump machinery. It appears to be a partially subterranean building constructed of CMUs, and has a low-pitched, gabled roof, set only a few feet above the cement patio surface surrounding the pool. Along its rear (west) elevation, the building is open to the pond, which is several feet below the ground surface at the pool. The north, east, and south elevations are all closed, with no doors or fenestration. The gables are clad in T1-11 plywood siding and the roof in composite shingles. The T1-11 plywood siding is damaged along the east elevation.

A review of historic maps and aerial photographs was conducted as part of the archival research effort for this property. Sanborn maps were not available for this site. Historic aerial photographs were reviewed for the property from the following years: 1954, 1959, 1974, 1977, 1994, 2002, 2005, 2009, 2010, and 2012. Due to the aerial image quality, an approximate build date for the building could not be ascertained, however, the

building's function is strongly tied to the pool, which first appears to have been constructed between the 1959 aerial and the 1974 aerial photograph (NETR 2017).

Building 6

Building 6 is the pump house with two attached cisterns at the northeast portion of the property (Figure 12). The original date of construction could not be confirmed for this building. However, a review of historic aerial photographs dates the construction of the building to between 1977 and 1994. Building 6 is a utilitarian building with a square plan and flat roof. Each elevation wall is constructed of CMUs, void of windows and vents. A single plywood door on the main (south) elevation provides the only building access. The door is accessed by a cement stoop, and the flat roof projects outward slightly to shade the door. Along the building's rear (north) elevation, several pipes exit the wall and run to the cisterns.

A review of historic maps and aerial photographs was conducted as part of the archival research effort for this property. Sanborn maps were not available for this site. Historic aerial photographs were reviewed for the property from the following years: 1954, 1959, 1974, 1977, 1994, 2002, 2005, 2009, 2010, and 2012. According to aerial imagery, the building and its cisterns appears between the 1977 and 1994 aerial photographs (NETR 2017).

Site Features

Several non-building features were also present at the Stickleback Movie Ranch site. These include:

- **Feature 1:** Pool, built between 1959 and 1974 (NETR 2017)
- **Feature 2:** grilling station east of pool area, unknown date. Constructed of CMUs, roughly 3 feet tall, with open basins for grills arranged three grills long by two wide.
- **Feature 3:** grilling station west of pool area, unknown date. Constructed of CMUs, roughly 3 feet tall, with open basins for grills arranged three grills long by two wide.
- Feature 4: metal structure at pool, unknown date. Use could not be determined.
- Features 5: 50+ RV campsites, most damaged and overgrown, but arranged in orderly rows, each with a concrete pad, electric and water hookup, and a small indicator sign, built between 1959 and 1974. All features had identical format and layout (NETR 2017).

Buildings No Longer Extant

Due to the 2016 Sand Fire, several buildings at the subject property were destroyed, leaving behind only foundation footprints. These building footprints appear to be contemporaneously constructed with Buildings 1, 3, 4, and the Pool Feature. These buildings are briefly described as follows:

Ruin 1

The footprint for this building is immediately east of Building 1. The original date of construction could not be confirmed for this building. It had an irregular plan, poured concrete foundation, and CMU stem-wall. It also had several porches on each elevation. The main elevation could not be determined from the building footprint; however, the building footprint is substantially larger than that of Building 1. The use of this building is unknown.

Ruin 2

This building is immediately north and west of the pool, and southwest of Building 1. The original date of construction could not be confirmed for this building. It appears to have had a rambling footprint, with both enclosed buildings and paved interior surfaces. Its main elevation appears to have been on the east or north side, as the west side opens into a curved, stepped amphitheater, which has subsequently flooded with a densely vegetated pond. Several of the enclosed rooms appear to have served as a kitchen, a storage closet for paints and flammables, and a gathering room with a fireplace. These uses were concluded based on the burnt artifacts and structural features remaining inside the rooms.

SPRR Culvert

This structure is a circular, concrete pipe culvert with a rectangular endwall with "1922" inscribed above the culvert opening, indicating it was built in 1922 (Figure 13). Southern Pacific Railroad (SPRR) constructed this segment of railroad in Soledad Canyon between 1875 and 1876, with periodic additions for repair and replacement of features due to fire, flooding, or other damages. The culvert is of utilitarian construction and has no decoration or distinctive features other than the "1922" inscription. Stress fractures and spalling areas in the concrete endwall have been spray-painted white and marked with numbers 4867. Other than the cosmetic painting, the culvert appears to be unaltered from its original construction. The culvert runs approximately northeast-southwest beneath railroad tracks. The condition and appearance of the northeast face of the culvert was not viewed at the time of the field visit.

5 SIGNIFICANCE EVALUATION

5.1 Stickleback Movie Ranch, 9777 Soledad Canyon Road

NRHP/CRHR Statement of Significance

In consideration of the site's history and requisite integrity, Dudek finds the subject property not eligible for listing in the NRHP or CRHR, based on the following significance evaluation and in consideration of national and state eligibility criteria.

Criterion A/1: Associated with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of our history.

Archival research did not find any associations with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of local or regional history. The subject property is one of many movie ranches, recreational areas, and mobile home campgrounds in Soledad Canyon from approximately the same period of construction (1950s). Recreation on Forest Service lands and in Canyon Country had been promoted in the area since the creation of the San Gabriel Forest Reserve in 1892, later the Angeles National Forest in 1908. The establishment of the Reserve brought in tourists, outdoor enthusiasts, and automobile travelers, which led to a demand for campgrounds, resorts, trailheads, and eventually RV campgrounds, like the first iteration of the subject property: Bill's Place (1953-1964). This pattern of recreational campgrounds on the boundaries of national forests, national parks, battlefields, and historical landmarks developed commonly across the United States, especially in Western States where large tracts of national forests are concentrated. The subject property is not within the Angeles National Forest, which is a State Historical Landmark (No. 717), and only provided camping and recreation at the edge of the forest for a limited period (1953-1974) before transitioning to use as a mobile home park for permanent residents (1975-2010). Stickleback Movie Ranch transitioned from a mobile home park to a movie ranch for on-location filming in 2010. However, as a movie ranch, the subject property falls outside the period of significance (1920-1949) for movie ranches in the region, and it holds no relationship to the development of the film industry, the development of the western film genre, or to large, Hollywood-based, movie production studios that pioneered location shooting in the Santa Clarita Valley (e.g., Paramount, Monogram, or Republic Pictures) (Fitzgerald and Warner 2005; Hale 2014; Hamra 1963; USFS 2017). Due to a lack of significant associations with events important to history, the subject property does not appear eligible under NRHP/CRHR Criterion A/1.

Criterion B/2: Associated with the lives of persons significant in our past.

All owner and occupant names identified with the subject property were researched for possible significance. Archival research failed to indicate any associations with significant persons. For these reasons, the subject property does not appear eligible under NRHP/CRHR Criterion B/2.

Criterion C/3: Embody the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, or method of construction, or that represent the work of a master, or that possess high artistic values, or that represent a significant and distinguishable entity whose components may lack individual distinction.

The subject property is not a unique or intact example of either an early twentieth century campground or a mid-century RV park. The setting and grounds of the RV campground have lost significant integrity through removal, disrepair, and destruction—concrete RV pads, signs, and utility posts are broken and overgrown, camp amenities such as the playground and grilling stations are in disrepair or destroyed, and buildings have sustained significant damage through both neglect and wildfire. With respect to the buildings on site, Ranch style homes were primarily built in urban areas, to support a rapidly growing population in the years after World War II. Contemporary-style buildings also gained popularity in tandem with Ranch style homes for their more avant-garde designs and rejection of traditional exterior details. The greater Los Angeles area was experiencing a residential boom in response to local industrial and military-related postwar growth, and popular styles reached outside of the areas of urban influence to rural areas as well. Although the buildings on the subject property express a few basic elements of the Ranch style (i.e., one story in height, asymmetrical entry points, focus on informality), and few elements of Contemporary style (irregular plan, flat roof, wide overhanging eaves), the buildings are overall poor examples of either style; most, such as Buildings 2, 4, and 5, affected no style at all. Further, the buildings exhibit substantial damage from the 2016 Sand Fire that has compromised the existing buildings' integrity and accounted for the loss of the larger buildings on the site. Other buildings were completely destroyed by the Sand Fire, and Ruin 2 has been partially submerged into the pond and overgrown with vegetation. No outstanding examples of architectural styles or the work of notable architects or master craftspeople are present at the site today. Archival building permit research did not identify the name(s) of the original builder or architect, but the building is not likely to be the work of a master architect or important creative individual. Finally, the subject property does not appear eligible as a contributor to a historic district, or to the nearby CRHR site Angeles National Forest (No. 717). For all of these reasons, the subject property does not appear eligible under NRHP/CRHR Criterion C/3.

Criterion D/4: Have yielded, or may be likely to yield, information important in prehistory or history.

There are previously recorded archaeological resources located outside the subject property, north of the SPRR tracks; however there is no evidence to suggest that the Stickleback Movie Ranch property has the potential to yield information important to state or local history. Further, the entire area has been heavily disturbed by both natural and manmade impacts. Therefore, the property is recommended not eligible under NRHP/CRHR Criterion D/4.

Integrity Discussion

Integrity is the authenticity of a historical resource's physical identity as evidenced by the survival of characteristics that existed during the resource's period of significance, and the historical resource's ability to

convey that significance. To be listed in the NRHP, a property must not only be shown to be significant under the NRHP criteria, but it also must have integrity. Similar stipulations apply to listing at the state level, but the threshold is lower for the CRHR, particularly if the site has potential to yield significant scientific or historic information. The evaluation of integrity is sometimes a subjective judgment, but it must always be grounded in an understanding of a property's physical features and how they relate to its significance. In consideration of the NRHP, historic properties either retain integrity or they do not. Seven aspects or qualities, in various combinations, define integrity: location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association (NPS 1990). To retain historic integrity, a property generally possesses several, if not most, of the aspects. The retention of specific aspects of integrity is paramount for a property to convey its significance.

Location: The subject property and its buildings are sited on the original location of construction in its original orientation. Therefore, the subject property retains integrity of location.

Design: The subject property was affected by the 2016 Sand Fire, destroying two buildings completely and severely damaging others. Additionally, the remaining buildings were subjected to periodic damage over time that significantly compromised their integrity of design, including removal of windows and removal of doors, and addition of a porch in front of Building 1. Therefore, the buildings at the property do not maintain integrity of design.

Setting: The area surrounding the property remains relatively unaltered, maintaining the spatial relationship with neighbors to the east, south, and west. However, the setting within the Santa Clara River basin was severely altered by the 2016 Sand Fire. Although the subject property maintains its original property boundaries, the site's interior changed significantly. The fire destroyed several buildings, extant mobile trailers, extant vehicles, and the wooded riparian setting along the Santa Clara River. The riparian setting within the surrounding canyon and desert region, and access to water, provided the main motivation for establishing a campground on the Angeles National Forest boundary in the first place. Therefore, the property does not maintain integrity of setting.

Materials: Alterations to Buildings 1 and 2 have compromised the property's material integrity. At Building 1, original windows have been replaced with vinyl sliding windows. At Building 2, all windows and doors have been removed or destroyed. Building 4 has completely lost its roof and doors due to the impact of the fire. Only Buildings 3, 5, and 6 retain most of their original components, with disuse and disrepair accounting for their material shortfalls. Overall, the subject property does not maintain integrity of materials.

Workmanship: Similar to the issue with materials, the physical evidence of craftsman's skills in constructing the original building was compromised by the alterations, component removal, disuse, and significant fire damage to the buildings. Therefore, the subject property no longer retains its integrity of workmanship.

Feeling: The subject property has changed its role over its lifespan from a 1950s-era Recreational Vehicle (RV) campground and recreation area on the Angeles National Forest boundary, to a mobile home/trailer park, and finally to a movie ranch. Minor alterations made to the subject property layout impact the building's ability to correlate to a mid-century campground. The 2016 Sand Fire has impacted the riparian area surrounding the site, further diminishing the feeling of isolation from the Soledad Canyon Road vehicle traffic and the cottonwood forest setting. Therefore, the property no longer conveys integrity of feeling.

Association: The property has no direct links with important events or people. Therefore, the building does not have integrity of association.

Los Angeles County Designation Criteria

Los Angeles County historic resource designation criteria closely follow those of the NRHP and CRHR with regard to consideration of important events, people, and architectural merit. Based on the NRHP/CRHR criteria discussion above, the subject property is recommended not eligible for listing under County designation criteria A.1-A.4. Additionally, the County also recognizes three more criteria (A.5-A.7). This resource has not been "formally determined eligible by the United States National Park Service for listing, in the National Register of Historic Places, or is listed, or has been formally determined eligible by the State Historical Resources Commission for listing, on the California Register of Historical Resources" (A.5). The subject property also does not contain the oldest trees of their species in the County (A.6), and does not contain trees, landscapes, or landscape features associated with historical events, persons, sites, streets, or structures, or because it is a defining or significant outstanding feature of a neighborhood (A.7). Based on the criteria discussion above, the subject property is recommended as not eligible for listing under all Los Angeles County designation criteria.

In summary, the Stickleback Movie Ranch property appears not eligible under all NRHP, CRHR, and Los Angeles County designation criteria due to a lack of important historical associations and significantly compromised integrity.

6 FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The current study included a CHRIS records search, building development and archival research, an intensive-level archaeological survey, a built environment survey, and evaluation of the Stickleback Movie Ranch site at 9777 Soledad Canyon Road (see complete DPR form in Appendix B).

6.1 Summary of Findings

Built Environment

The Stickleback Movie Ranch and all associated buildings, features, and ruins were found not eligible under all NRHP, CRHR, and County of Los Angeles designation criteria. Therefore, the property is not considered an historical resource for the purposes of CEQA.

Archaeology

No archaeological resources were identified within the Stickleback Movie Ranch property as a result of the CHRIS records search or survey. Two previously recorded archaeological sites (P-19-001857 and P-19-001858) were identified directly north of the Stickleback Movie Ranch as a result of the records search. These resources were re-visited during the archaeological survey and the site records were updated to reflect existing conditions. Because it is always possible that intact archaeological deposits are present at subsurface levels, the subject property should be treated as potentially sensitive for archaeological resources. Management recommendations to reduce potential impacts to unanticipated archaeological resources and human remains during restoration activities are provided below.

6.2 Management Recommendations

Unanticipated Discovery of Archaeological Resources

In the event that archaeological resources (sites, features, or artifacts) are exposed during restoration activities on the subject property, all work activities occurring within 100 feet of the find shall immediately stop until a qualified archaeologist, meeting the Secretary of the Interior's Professional Qualification Standards, can evaluate the significance of the find and determine whether or not additional study is warranted. Depending upon the significance of the find under CEQA (14 CCR 15064.5(f); California Public Resources Code Section 21082), the archaeologist may simply record the find and allow work to continue. If the discovery proves significant under CEQA, additional work, such as preparation of an archaeological treatment plan, testing, or data recovery, may be warranted.

Unanticipated Discovery of Human Remains

In accordance with Section 7050.5 of the California Health and Safety Code, if human remains are found, the County Coroner shall be immediately notified of the discovery. No further excavation or disturbance of the site or any nearby area reasonably suspected to overlie adjacent remains shall occur until the County Coroner has determined, within 2 working days of notification of the discovery, the appropriate treatment and disposition of the human remains. If the County Coroner determines that the remains are, or are believed to be, Native American, he or she shall notify the NAHC in Sacramento within 24 hours. In accordance with California Public Resources Code, Section 5097.98, the NAHC must immediately notify those persons it believes to be the most likely descendant from the deceased Native American. The most likely descendant shall complete their inspection within 48 hours of being granted access to the site. The designated Native American representative would then determine, in consultation with the property owner, the disposition of the human remains.

P-19-001857 was first recorded in 1990 by Simon and Whitley (W&S Consultants) as a single historic headstone inscribed with the following epitaph:

Rose Bailey Died Mar. 18, 1890 Aged 28 Years

Simon and Whitley noted the possibility of other historic graves in the area and the possible association with the nearby multi-component site P-19-001858. P-19-001858, recorded by Simon and Whitley (1990) consists of a historic refuse scatter of early twentieth century domestic refuse along with hand-forged wagon parts and a prehistoric lithic scatter.

Dudek revisited P-19-001857 in August 2017 in support of the Metropolitan Water District's proposed Foothill Feeder Repair and Future Inspections Project. The headstone was relocated and appeared to be in the same condition as previously documented – the granite headstone is set in concrete with native cobbles placed around the concrete.

Dudek expanded the site boundary to include newly identified historic-age domestic refuse scattered around the headstone (see **Location Map** on pg 2). Additionally, in the immediate vicinity of the documented grave marker, were four rock clusters arranged in the same fashion as the documented grave marker, yet without headstones or cement. Ground surface visibility was considered poor due to dense grass cover. However, observable diagnostic artifacts included church key open flat top beverage cans (date 1935-1970s), sun colored amethyst glass fragments (date ~1870s-1920); and aqua-colored "bell" glass insulator fragment (1875-1930s) (see **Sketch Map** on pg. 3). A round shovel without a handle was also observed at the site.




LOCATION MAP



P-19-001857 was first recorded in 1990 by Simon and Whitley (W&S Consultants) as a multi-component site consisting of a low-density prehistoric lithic scatter and a historic-age refuse scatter. The prehistoric artifacts included two handstones and approximately six flakes composed of chalcedony, basalt, and quartzite material. The historic component consisted of early twentieth century material including hand forged wagon parts, sun colored amethyst glass, glass insulator, mouth-blown bottle, baking soda tins, and miscellaneous metal objects. Simon and Whitley noted the potential for buried deposits within the site and the possible association with nearby P-19-001857 (historic-age headstone).

Dudek revisited a small portion of P-19-001858 in August 2017 in support of the Metropolitan Water District's (MWD) proposed Foothill Feeder Repair and Future Inspections Project. MWD instructed Dudek to stay within the defined project area and to not encroach on land outside project boundaries. Only the southwestern edge of P-19-001858 overlapped the project area. As a result, only the southwestern edge of P-19-001858 was revisited, or approximately 10 percent of the original site.

One prehistoric artifact, a chert interior flake, was observed within the confines of the permitted survey area at P-19-001858. The flake was just north of Briggs Road at the southwestern edge of the site. No historic artifacts were observed in this area of the site.







hills north of the main built environment area is steep scree and bare soil hills, with sparse Mojave desert vegetation groups. There is a very steep and rocky slope south of Soledad Canyon Road interspersed with steeply pitched drainages.

P3a. Description (Continued):

The project site contains a mix of residential and camping-related buildings and structures. There are 5 intact buildings on the site, 3 buildings that should be classified as ruins, and several structures relating to its history as an RV campground, that were constructed more than 45 years ago.

- Building 1: residential, built circa 1959-1974
- Building 2: residential, no date (n.d.)
- Building 3: ancillary, n.d.
- Building 4: RV dump station partial ruin, n.d.
- Building 5: pool pump house, built circa 1959-1974

The following buildings were photographed and reviewed during the field survey, but were found to be constructed within the last 45 years. Because of their more recent construction dates, they were not evaluated as historic resources for the purposes of this study.

• Building 6: pump house and cisterns, built circa 1977-1994

Several non-building features were present at the site. These include:

- Feature 1: Pool, built between 1959 and 1974 (NETR 2017)
- Feature 2: grilling station east of pool area, unknown date. Constructed of CMUs, roughly 3 feet tall, with open basins for grills arranged three grills long by two wide.
- Feature 3: grilling station west of pool area, unknown date. Constructed of CMUs, roughly 3 feet tall, with open basins for grills arranged three long grills by two wide.
- Feature 4: metal structure at pool, unknown date. Use could not be determined.
- Features 5: 50+ RV campsites, most damaged and overgrown, but arranged in orderly rows, each with a concrete pad, electric and water hookup, and a small indicator sign, built between 1959-1974. All features had identical format and layout. (NETR 2017)

Due to the 2016 Sand Canyon Fire, several buildings at the subject property were destroyed, leaving behind only foundation footprints. These building footprints appear to be contemporaneously constructed with Building 1, 3, 4, and the Pool Feature. These buildings are briefly described as follows:

- Ruin 1, n.d.: The footprint for this building is immediately east of Building 1. It had an irregular plan, poured concrete foundation and CMU stem-wall. It also had several porches on each elevation. The main elevation could not be determined from the building footprint, however, the building footprint is substantially larger than that of Building 1. The use of this building is unknown.
- Ruin 2, n.d.: This building was immediately north and west of the pool, and southwest of Building 1. It appears to have had a rambling footprint with both enclosed buildings and paved interior surfaces. Its main elevation appears to have been on the east or north side as the west side opens into a curved, stepped amphitheater, which has subsequently flooded with a densely vegetated pond. Several of the enclosed rooms appear to have served as a kitchen, a storage closet for paints and flammables, and a gathering room with a fireplace. These uses were concluded based on the burnt artifacts and structural features remaining inside the rooms.

B6. Construction History (Continued):

add to the attractiveness of the already popular picnicking spot. Bohrman, and wife Leila, ran Bill's Place until 1964 when they were foreclosed upon by the San Fernando Valley Bank (Newhall Signal 1953, 1955a, 1955b, 1964).

In 1966, the property's new owner, Universal Park Corporation re-opened the campground as Oasis Park, intending it to be used primarily for RVs (Figure 6). While the subject property operated as Oasis Park, the campground hosted numerous cookouts, a country western music awards show, the annual Canyon Country Frontier Days Celebration, and concerts. (The Desert 1998; LAT 1971; Newhall Signal 1966a, 1966b, 1980)

In 1974, Universal Park Corporation petitioned for a conditional use permit to increase their number of campsites. At nearly the same time, the Oasis Park transitioned from being primarily a vacation destination to being a mobile home park for year-round residents. Several inhabitants operated their own businesses from inside the mobile home park. Other than some small-scale theft, wildfires, floods, and railroad related issues mentioned in the newspapers, Oasis Park operated without interruption or notable events until it came under new ownership in 2004 (Newhall Signal and Saugus Enterprise 1974, 1984, 1987).

In 2004, new owners Rancho Agua Dulce LLC closed access to a road across their property in anticipation of making the mobile home park into a recreational park again. The residents of Briggs Road had been using the private road to reach their properties, which are north of the railroad tracks, and the disputed closure sparked a years-long legal battle. The new owners no longer wished to allow public access and the Metrolink railroad opposed the easement because of the danger of an at-grade railroad crossing. The argument became violent in 2007 when a Briggs Road resident allegedly assaulted a caretaker of Oasis Park, escalating the dispute outside the courtroom. The issue was resolved later in 2007 when a Los Angeles County upheld a conditional road easement from 1955. (Santa Clarita Signal 2004, 2006, 2007a, 2007b)

After losing the legal battle, Rancho Agua Dulce LLC continued as owners of the property and in 2010, converted the property from a mobile home park to a filming location called Stickleback River Movie Ranch. The movie ranch was advertised as having a "country store," "old buildings," a pool, and a 1950s era playground (Figure 7). Only a few films were made using this movie ranch location, including: Bennington Gothique (2013), Camp

Takota (2014), The Bus Driver (2016), Deep Undercover (2016), and Tonight Its You (2016) (Adkins 2015, 2016; SCFO 2017; Yelp 2017).

In July 2016, the Sand Fire Complex burned over 40,000 acres in the Angeles National Forest near the Santa Clarita Valley. In addition to destroying homes and causing the evacuation of 20,000 people from Santa Clarita Valley, the fire burned several filming properties in Soledad Canyon including Koch Movie Ranch, and other movie ranches Sable Ranch, and A Rancho Deluxe. Nearly all of the buildings on Stickleback River Movie Ranch were consumed by the fire (Adkins 2016; City News Service 2016).

B10. Significance (Continued):

the broad patterns of our history.

Archival research did not find any associations with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of local or regional history. The subject property is one of many movie ranches, recreational areas, and mobile home campgrounds in Soledad Canyon from approximately the same period of construction (1950s). Recreation on Forest Service lands and in Canyon Country had been promoted in the area since the creation of the San Gabriel Forest Reserve in 1892, later the Angeles National Forest in 1908. The establishment of the Reserve brought in tourists, outdoor enthusiasts, and automobile travelers, which led to a demand for campgrounds, resorts, trailheads, and eventually Recreational Vehicle (RV) campgrounds, like the first iteration of the subject property: Bill's Place (1953-1964). This pattern of recreational campgrounds on the boundaries of National Forests, National Parks, battlefields, and historical landmarks developed across the United States, especially in Western States where large tracts of National Forests are concentrated. This is a common pattern seen across the country. The project is not within the Angeles National Forest, which is a State Historical Landmark (No. 717), and only provided camping and recreation at the edge of the forest for a limited period $(19\overline{5}3-1974)$ before transitioning to us as a mobile home park for permanent residents (1975-2010). Stickleback River Movie Ranch transitioned from a mobile home park to a movie ranch for on-location filming in 2010. However, as a movie ranch, the subject property falls outside the period of significance (1920-1949) for movie ranches in the region, and holds no relationship to the development of the film industry, the development of the western film genre, or to large, Hollywood-based, movie production studios that pioneered location shooting in the Santa Clarita Valley (e.g. Paramount, Monogram or Republic Pictures) (Fitzgerald and Warner 2005; Hale 2014; Hamra 1963; USFS 2017). Due to a lack of significant associations with events important to history, the subject property does not appear eligible under NRHP/CRHR Criteria A/1.

Criterion B/2: Associated with the lives of persons significant in our past.

All owner and occupant names identified with the subject property were researched for possible significance. Archival research failed to indicate any associations with significant persons. For these reasons, the subject property does not appear eligible under NRHP/CRHR Criteria B/2.

Criterion C/3: Embody the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, or method of construction, or that represent the work of a master, or that possess high artistic values, or that represent a significant and distinguishable entity whose components may lack individual distinction.

The subject property is not a unique or intact example of either an early twentieth century campground or a mid-century RV park. Ranch style homes were primarily built in

urban areas, to support a rapidly growing population in the years after World War II. Contemporary-style buildings also gained popularity in tandem with Ranch style homes for their more avant-garde designs and rejection of traditional exterior details. The greater Los Angeles area was experiencing a residential boom in response to post-war growth local industrial and military-related growth, and popular styles reached outside of the areas of urban influence to rural areas as well. Although the buildings on the subject property express a few basic elements of the Ranch style (i.e., one story in height, asymmetrical entry points, focus on informality) and similarly few Contemporary style elements (irregular plan, flat roof, wide overhanging eaves), the buildings are an overall poor example of either style, and some affected no style at all, such as Buildings 2, 4, and 5. Further, the buildings exhibit substantial damage from the 2016 Sand Fire that has compromised the existing buildings' integrity and accounted for the loss of the larger buildings on the site. The remaining buildings are unremarkable examples of the Ranch style. Archival building permit research did not identify the name(s) of the original builder or architect, but the building is not likely to be the work of a master architect or important creative individual. Finally, the subject property does not appear eligible as a contributor to a historic district, or to the nearby CRHR site Angeles National Forest (No. 717). For all of these reasons, the subject property does not appear eligible under NRHP/CRHR Criteria C/3.

Criterion D/4: Have yielded, or may be likely to yield, information important in prehistory or history.

There are previously recorded archaeological resources located outside the proposed project area, north of the SPRR tracks, however there is no evidence to suggest that the Stickleback River Movie Ranch property has the potential to yield information important to state or local history. Further, the entire area has been heavily disturbed by both natural and manmade impacts. Therefore, the property is recommended not eligible under NRHP/CRHR Criterion D/4.

Integrity Discussion

Integrity is the authenticity of a historical resource's physical identity as evidenced by the survival of characteristics that existed during the resource's period of significance, and the historical resource's ability to convey that significance. To be listed in the NRHP, a property must not only be shown to be significant under the NRHP criteria, but it also must have integrity. Similar stipulations apply to listing at the state level, but the threshold is lower for the CRHR, particularly if the site has potential to yield significant scientific or historic information. The evaluation of integrity is sometimes a subjective judgment, but it must always be grounded in an understanding of a property's physical features and how they relate to its significance. In consideration of the NRHP, historic properties either retain integrity or they do not. Seven aspects or qualities, in various combinations, define integrity: location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association (NPS 1990). To retain historic integrity, a property generally possesses several, if not most, of the aspects. The retention of specific aspects of integrity is paramount for a property to convey its significance.

Location: The subject property and its buildings are sited on the original location of construction in its original orientation. Therefore, the subject property retains integrity of location.

Design: The subject property was affected by the 2016 Sand Fire, destroying two buildings completely and severely damaging others. Additionally, the remaining buildings were

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subjected to periodic damage over time that significantly compromised its integrity of design, including removal of windows and removal of doors, and addition of a porch in front of Building 1. Therefore, the buildings at the property do not maintain integrity of design.

Setting: The area surrounding the property remains relatively unaltered, maintaining the spatial relationship with neighbors to the east, south, and west. However, the setting within the Santa Clara River basin was severely altered by the 2016 Sand Fire. Although the subject property maintains its original property boundaries, the site's interior changed significantly. The fire destroyed several buildings, extant mobile trailers, extant vehicles, and destroyed the wooded riparian setting along the Santa Clara River. The riparian setting within the surrounding canyon and desert region, and access to water, provided the main motivation for establishing a campground on the Angeles National Forest Boundary in the first place. Therefore, the property does not maintain integrity of setting.

Materials: Alterations to Buildings 1 and 2 have compromised the property's material integrity. At Building 1, original windows have been replaced with vinyl sliding windows. At Building 2, all windows and doors have been removed or destroyed. Building 4 has completely lost its roof and doors due to the impact of the fire. Only Building 3, 5, and 6 retain most of their original components, with disuse and disrepair accounting for their material shortfalls. Overall, the subject property does not maintain integrity of materials.

Workmanship: Similar to the issue with materials, the physical evidence of craftsman's skills in constructing the original building was compromised by the alterations, component removal, disuse and significant fire damage to the buildings. Therefore, the subject property no longer retains its integrity of workmanship.

Feeling: The subject property has changed its role over time from a 1950s-era Recreational Vehicle (RV) campground and recreation area on the boundary of the Angeles National Forest boundary, to a mobile home/trailer park, and finally to a movie ranch over its lifespan. Minor alterations made to the subject property layout impact the building's ability to correlate to a mid-century campground. The 2016 Sand Fire has impacted the riparian area surrounding the site, further diminishing the feeling of isolation from the Soledad Canyon Road vehicle traffic and the cottonwood forest setting. Therefore, the property no longer conveys integrity of feeling.

Association: The property has no direct links with important events or people. Therefore, the building does not have integrity of association.



The subject culvert has no association or linkage to important events (Criterion A/1), nor has it been demonstrated to have been directly associated with persons significant in our past (Criterion B/2). It does not embody the distinctive characteristic of a type, period, or method of construction, represent the work of a master, and does not represent a significant and distinguishable entity whose components lack individual distinction (Criterion C/3). There is no reason to believe that the property may yield important information about prehistory or history (Criterion D/4). The property is not eligible for listing in the National or California Registers, nor is it a contributor to a larger National Register-eligible historic district.
