Encroachment Permit #11-20-NUT-1180 On Interstate 805 (I-805) in the County of San Diego, in the City of Chula Vista, the Sweetwater Authority proposes to install a 36-inch transmission main pipeline along Bonita Road under I-805 using open trenching within Caltrans right of way. Hazardous Waste

Aerially Deposited Lead (ADL): Work within Caltrans' right-of-way will require an encroachment permit. Excavation of this soil will result in excess soil that cannot be reused within the work limits and therefore requires transport off the project site for disposal. The attached 'Hazardous Materials and Hazardous Waste Management' special provisions must be included in all permits and all provisions followed by the Lead Agency.

Work outside of Caltrans' right-of-way must follow all applicable laws, rules, and regulations including those of the following agencies:

NPDES/Stormwater

If the disturbed soil area within Caltrans R/W is less than one acre then a Water Pollution Control Program (WPCP) will be required, if it is greater than or equal to one acre within Caltrans R/W then a Storm Water Pollution Prevention Program (SWPPP) will be required.

The construction site storm water pollution control should be addressed in SWPPP or WPCP.
