MITIGATED NEGATIVE DECLARATION FOR PG&E L-130 SACRAMENTO RIVER CROSSING PIPELINE REPLACEMENT PROJECT – DATED APRIL 2022 (STATE CLEARINGHOUSE NUMBER: 2022040570)

Dear Ms. Borack:

The Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC) received a Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND) for the PG&E L-130 Sacramento River Crossing Pipeline Replacement Project (Project). The Lead Agency is receiving this notice from DTSC because the Project includes one or more of the following: groundbreaking activities, importation of backfill soil, and/or work on or in close proximity to an agricultural or former agricultural site. Additionally, the Rio Vista Army Reserve Center site (Reserve Center) was identified at the approximate location on the west side of the Sacramento River where a portion of the Project will occur. Although remedial activities at the Reserve Center have been performed, there is still potential for Project activities to come into contact with contaminants. Potential contaminants of concern that may remain at the Site include arsenic, lead, chlordane, dioxin, polychlorinated biphenyls, gasoline, and motor oil.

DTSC recommends that the following issues be evaluated in the Hazards and Hazardous Materials section of the MND:

1. The MND should acknowledge the potential for historic or future activities on or near the project site to result in the release of hazardous wastes/substances on the project site. In instances in which releases have occurred or may occur, further studies should be carried out to delineate the nature and extent of the contamination, and the potential threat to public health and/or the environment should be evaluated. The MND should also identify the mechanism(s) to initiate









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> any required investigation and/or remediation and the government agency who will be responsible for providing appropriate regulatory oversight.

- If any projects initiated as part of the proposed project require the importation of soil to backfill any excavated areas, proper sampling should be conducted to ensure that the imported soil is free of contamination. DTSC recommends the imported materials be characterized according to <u>DTSC's 2001 Information</u> Advisory Clean Imported Fill Material.
- 3. If any sites included as part of the proposed project have been used for agricultural, weed abatement or related activities, proper investigation for organochlorinated pesticides should be discussed in the MND. DTSC recommends the current and former agricultural lands be evaluated in accordance with DTSC's 2008 <u>Interim Guidance for Sampling Agricultural Properties (Third Revision)</u>.
