## **PROJECT DESCRIPTION**

CAL FIRE would provide funding to The Watershed Research & Training Center in areas that burned to conduct reforestation/tree planting, site prep for planting and biomass removal and utilization. Pre-planting site prep work includes hand thinning, mastication, lop and scatter, hand piling, pile burning, and biomass removal of competing vegetation (mostly brush and dead standing trees). In one area, fuels reduction will occur to establish a shaded fuelbreak. These treatments will reduce wildfire risks to local resources and community members, promote native plant and wildlife species, and improve forest resiliency.

The proposed project was reviewed in its entirety under three separate NEPA documents: the Pettijohn Late-successional Reserve Habitat Improvement and Fuels Reduction Project Final Environmental Impact Statement and Record of Decision signed in March 2013; the August Fire Restoration Project Phase 1 Environmental Assessment and Decision Notice signed in September 2021; and the Trough Fire Recovery Project Decision Memo signed in August 2009.
