RE: Archaeological and Paleontological Resources Records Search Results for the 12300 Lakeland Project, Santa Fe Springs, California

Dear Norah:

An archaeological records search has been completed for the 12300 Lakeland Project located southeast of the intersection of Norwalk Boulevard and Lakeland Road in the city of Santa Fe Springs, Los Angeles County, California (Assessor's Parcel Number 8025-002-026). As part of the environmental review process, Brian F. Smith and Associates, Inc. (BFSA) conducted a records search at the South Central Coastal Information Center (SCCIC) at California State University, Fullerton and the Natural History Museum of Los Angeles County (LACM). In addition, BFSA requested a Sacred Lands File Search (SLF) of the Native American Heritage Commission (NAHC).

Archaeological Records Search Results

The cultural resources records search, which was completed at the SCCIC on June 17, 2022, encompassed an area of one mile surrounding the project. Based upon the records search results, no resources have been recorded within the project; however, the search did identify nine resources within one mile of the project. The previously recorded resources consist of one prehistoric lithic scatter, the historic remains of the Patricio Ontiveros Adobe, the historic Slusher Estate, which also includes the Patricio Ontiveros Adobe, the historic Metropolitan State Hospital (Norwalk State Hospital) District, a historic railroad alignment, the historic Little Lake School and Auditorium, two historic single-family residences, and one historic industrial building. The records search also identified 22 previous studies within a one-mile radius of the project, none of which include the subject property. Based upon the results of the records search, the 12300 Lakeland Project has never been formally studied.

Paleontological Review Results

The project is located within the Central Basin of the larger Los Angeles Basin, a large structural sedimentary basin bounded and cut through by several active fault systems in the Los Angeles metropolitan area (Hillhouse et al. 2002). The San Gabriel River is approximately two miles west of the project. As mapped by Saucedo (1999), the project is underlain by undivided Pleistocene silty, old alluvial fan and valley deposits. Yerkes (1972) assigned an age of upper Pleistocene and questionably Holocene to these alluvial deposits, describing them as reddish-brown consolidated gravel, sand, and silt.

Pleistocene (more than 11,700 years old) alluvial and alluvial fan deposits in the Los Angeles Basin often yield important Ice Age terrestrial vertebrate fossils, such as extinct mammoths, mastodons, giant ground sloths, extinct species of horse, bison, and camel, sabertoothed cats, and others (Jefferson 1991). Therefore, these Pleistocene sediments are accorded a High paleontological resource sensitivity.

A paleontological locality and records search was performed for the project by LACM (Bell 2022, attached). The records search indicates that no fossil localities were identified within the project boundaries or near the project. The closest known fossil locality is located approximately three and a half miles east of the project, consisting of Pleistocene-aged horse remains from lacustrine (lake) deposits of the La Habra Formation (LACM loc. VP 3347). The nearest locality from unnamed alluvial deposits, possibly similar to those at the project, is identified in Commerce, about seven miles to the northwest, consisting of Pleistocene-aged fish, snake, rodent, and rabbit remains, from a depth of 30 feet (LACM loc. VP 7702). Other more distant nearby localities are summarized in the records search in Attachment C.

A review of published and unpublished literature was conducted for potential paleontological resources that are known in the vicinity of the project. Miller (1971) and Jefferson (1991) report on a locality between four and five miles east of the project along the Imperial Highway, yielding turkey, mastodon, ground sloth, deer, and horse remains of Pleistocene age (LACM loc. VP 1052). This locality, just southeast of LACM loc. VP 3347, is positioned within the Pleistocene La Habra Formation (Jefferson 1991), as mapped by Yerkes (1972).

Based upon the high paleontological sensitivity of the Pleistocene old alluvial fan deposits mapped at the project and nearby fossil localities, earth disturbance activities have a potential to impact significant paleontological resources. Therefore, prior to grading and excavation work, a Paleontological Resource Impact Mitigation Program to reduce potential impacts to paleontological resources to less than significant is recommended for the project.

NAHC SLF Search Results

BFSA also requested a SLF search from the NAHC to identify any sacred sites or locations of religious or ceremonial importance within the project. The NAHC SLF results did <u>not</u> identify any previously documented sacred sites or locations of religious or ceremonial importance within or near the subject property.

The full results of the completed archaeological and paleontological records searches are attached to this letter report (Attachments A to C). Please contact us should you have any questions or require additional study for this project.







Historic Structures, Metropolitan State Hospital (Public Resources Code Sections 5024/5024.5)

This is to confirm that all 21 of the Metropolitan State Hospital structures submitted in 1983 for the state inventory are included on the Master List of State-Owned Historic Structures. They are subject to the review provisions of Public Resources Code Sections 5024/5024.5 (copy attached) whenever any projects are proposed that would affect their historic fabric, character, or environment.

As your survey update, that we discussed in July, is not yet complete, Metropolitan should also consider that any structures built as part of a planned complex, with coordinated design and site plan, may be included on this list, even if built in the 1940s. A historic district's contributing structures are those that contribute to the historic sense of time and place. If a 1940s building "completes the set," it may be eligible even if it is less than 50 years old. Projects that would affect those structures are also subject to 5024/5024.5 review.

Thank you for your attention to the historic resources at Metropolitan. It was a relief to hear that the earthquake damage was minor. As soon as the structural engineer has the necessary information for stabilization, please send us a copy for our required review. We will proceed swiftly on this emergency work.

Subject: Update of Survey of Historic Structures, Metropolitan State Hospital (Public Resources Code Section 5024)

As we discussed by phone this afternoon, when I called to make sure that "James Hall, Assembly, Hos. 19" was one building and not three, this office will be working with state agencies to update their surveys as prepared for the above state law in 1980.

We will base our request for a thorough update on an upcoming survey of all state-owned structures to be completed by next summer. Your proposed retirement at the end of 1987, and your willingness to prepare such information before you leave, resulted in our agreement to work with you as much as possible during the rest of this year.

The enclosed "Survey Workbook" was revised in August 1986. The discussion on historic districts may be useful in your assessment of the structures at Metropolitan. Frequently, buildings that are not yet 50 years old are included as contributing structures in a historic district because they clearly contribute to the historic sense of time and place. We recommend considering any structures built before World War II, since "about 50 years ago" extends to that date by now.

On your map of the entire facility, or on an accompanying list of structures, we would appreciate your including the dates of construction of <u>all</u> structures, so that we can tell over the next decade what may become included.

I have included a copy of each page of your survey, as requested, and a copy of our computer printout page with the properties at Norwalk that have been put into the computer.

Please feel free to contact me, or Don Napoli, our survey coordinator at (916) 322-9615, as you have questions on this process.

Thank you again for your interest in the history of Metropolitan State Hospital and its architectural heritage. We look forward to working with you.







Thank you for forwarding the above referenced project to my office for review and comment.

Metropolitan State Hospital is a property of the State of California, Department of Mental Health. Several years ago the property was inventoried and evaluated for historical significance by Metropolitan State Hospital staff pursuant to their responsibilities under California Public Resources Code 5024. The property was found to be a historic district eligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places. Building 303 is a contributor to that historic district. Public Resources Code 5024.5 does require state agencies to submit plans to alter such historic properties to the State Office of Historic Preservation for review and comment. However, the lack of state funding to cover the costs of review activities has caused us to temporarily suspend that program in our office.

You indicated in your letter that the work was being paid for primarily by finds from the Emergency Shelter Program, a federal grant administered by the State of California, Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD). Such federal activities are subject to review under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act and its implementing regulations, 36 CFR Part 800. However, the environmental office of the U. S. Dept. of Housing and Urban Development's San Francisco Regional Office has advised us that responsibility for submitting this project to our office for review belongs to HCD. While we have briefly reviewed the plans and specifications you submitted, we must hear from HCD as the agency with the federally delegated responsibility for Section 106 review.

The Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation and Guidelines for Rehabilitating Historic Buildings are used for all federal or federally assisted rehabilitation projects. The brief look that we have given the plans to date indicate they do not conform to those standards. There are

major problems, including dropped ceilings and blocked windows. The design for the seismic retro-fit seriously affects historic fabric.

This letter is to formally alert you that a non-profit organization called A Community of Friends (ACOF)has been conditionally awarded a grant from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development under the 1996 Supportive Housing Grant Program. ACOF are proposing to lease Building 3 & 4 from the State Department of Mental Health at the Metropolitan State Hospital in Norwalk, rehabilitate it and offer transitional housing and supportive services to homeless, dually diagnosed mentally ill individuals. Buildings 3 & 4 are located on the grounds of the Metropolitan State Hospital, Norwalk and have been identified on the California Register of Historic Places, as part of a district. We are considering the district as eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places and the Area of Potential Effect to be the district. The building is not entirely vacant; some units are being rented out to State Hospital employees but are aware of the impending project and are prepared to relocate.

It is my understanding that ACOF are negotiating the lease agreement with the State Department of Mental Health. As of this date, the project sponsor has not submitted site plans but have offered the following conceptual description of work. The project consists of two existing 20-unit apartment buildings, which are two stories in height. The apartments are single room occupancy (SRO) units with a private bathroom. Units which are 350-450 s.f. will be rehabilitated and will house 36 single homeless adults (one person per unit) and two on-site professionals (one per building). Two of the existing units will be reconfigured to provide a common kitchen and community space for residents. The rehabilitation would include the following activities:

- Structural reinforcement
- Compliance with disabled access codes, which will necessitate installing the appropriate ramping and widening doorways in units
- Resurfacing of building exterior re-painting of exterior and interior surfaces
- Upgrade of plumbing, electrical and heating systems
- Repair or replacement of several doors and windows
- Repair or replacement of the roof
- Installation of a common kitchen, laundry area and a community room

It is our intention to expedite approval of the grant agreement with ACOF and have chosen to enter into a four party Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) including A Community of Friends, HUD, SHPO and the Advisory Council. The site area is in the eastern portion of Los Angeles County in the San Gabriel Valley southwest of Puente Hills. The remains are on a bench above the flood channel, and the surface is presently covered by a mix of native and introduced flora including Caulanthus, filaree, shepherd's purse, fiddleneck, field mustard, black mustard, thistle, rye grasses, oats, barley, fox-tail and wild rhubarb. There are pepper, palm, carob, and other trees. Contained on the property are two distinct cultural resources, one definitely associated with early Hispanic period colonial settlement and related to the activities of Mission San Juan Capistrano. The other is an outstanding gardenranch developed in the 1880s. Each has physical remains existing and will be described separately.

ONTIVEROS ADOBE

The Ontiveros Adobe is presently represented by intact cobble and boulder foundations which outline a very large three-room structure 30.1 m long north-south and 7.0 m wide east-west. Interior dimensions of the rooms are $8.2 \times 5.2 \text{ m}$, $10.4 \times 5.0 \text{ m}$, and $6.9 \times 5.0 \text{ m}$ respectively, from north to south. The foundations average 1.1 m in width and are up to .8 m in depth, and include some dressed stones, particularly at the corners. The walls dividing the rooms are as thick as the exterior foundations and are interlocked with the outer walls, suggesting that they were load-bearing partitions, and that the structure was built all at one time, rather than growing by additions. In the middle and north rooms, a compacted surface was located at an elevation level with the partition wall; this was presumably the living floor, and fragments of pottery, metal, asphaltum and ladrillos (floor tiles) were found in contact with this surface. A hearth or cooking area was discovered near the southeast corner of the northern room. A stratum of burned soil and ash could be traced for 1.8 m along the inner wall, and forward into the room for 1.2 m, suggesting the original outline of this feature. Charcoal, burned animal bone and shell, and ceramic fragments were recovered from the ashy fill.

To build the foundations, trenches were dug in the desired outlines of both the perimeter and interior walls, and then filled with irregular courses of sandstone boulders, cobbles and adobe mud. Larger boulders up to $.8 \times .5 \times .4 \text{ m}$ were used at the corners, with smaller cobbles placed along the upper courses to establish a level foundation for the adobe bricks. There is some evidence for use of Roman cement on the upper courses. The absence of roof tile and abundance of asphaltum in the interior fill suggests that the building was roofed with brea.

Two features 20-35 m east of the foundation have already contributed important information for the interpretation of the building and one reason for Ontiveros' presence, plus new data about cattle species present in early California, methods

Major architectural features include a low pitched roof, eaves with rafter ends exposed, a raised and offset porch, and flat window and door openings.

Residence #2 consists of a relatively modern stucco building. It is not a significant part of the architectural or historical importance of the property.

The minor buildings on the property include a group of sheds and farm outbuildings. They are designed in a strictly utilitarian manner, built of various combinations of wood frame, wood siding, and metal sheathing. The condition of these buildings varies from good to deteriorated.

There are several building fragments on the property. These include the foundation of a conservatory, the foundation and substructure of the old house built by Hawkins about 1880, and a brick fireplace which was a portion of an addition to the original house. The fireplace is interesting in that the legend "Slusher 1875" is cast into the cement mantleplace. 1875 was the year of Silas Slusher's birth and does not represent the year of construction. The fireplace apparently opened into a billiard room area.

Structural remains consist of various building elements including bases of fountains, planters, urns, a trellis/gazebo, and a birdbath.

There are three brick and concrete fountain reservoirs on the property. Two of these are in line with the location of the main entrance to the original house. The third is located within the foundation walls of the conservatory. These fountain reservoirs date from the 1880s and are of architectural as well as historical interest, as they represent an early use of concrete in Southern California. The fountain retains has a portion of the original cast iron decorative base remaining; this is designed with a seashell motif.

The garden trellis/gazebo (with seating) also appears to date from the 1880s, and resembles both in design and construction one which is pictured in early photographs of the estate in its prime. The lattice, for example, is used in the same manner and the wooden framework is chamfered in identical fashion. A second similar trellis is in ruins under trees located in the southeast corner of the property.

The urns and planters and a birdbath, are all of a similar design and construction method. They are made of concrete and employ either a seashell or cupid design motif. The dating is not precise but attributes suggest that these structural features may also have originated about 1880. Like the fountains the planters, urns and birdbath appear to represent a very early use of decorative concrete in Southern California.

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A variety of farm associated pieces of machinery and hardware remain on the property. For example, a hand-cranked apparatus which appears to be a type of sheller. Several water troughs also remain, in addition to some gardening apparatus.

The estate once had an advanced and extensive water system. Remaining are the fountains, various hydrants, the tank house, and a small reservoir near the tank house. Portions of the system, including brass hydrant fittings and tank house apparatus appear to date from the late nineteenth century.

Various plantings, beds, and pathways are visible remains of the former landscape features. Of particular interest are the aged carob trees located in the northeast section of the estate area. Cuttings were taken from this estate as early as 1921, and the stock played a prominent role in the world-wide development of the commercial carob industry.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Hawkins-Nimocks Estate/Patricio Ontiveros Adobe is significant for the following major reasons: (1) The property contains rare illustrative remains showing the total sequence of settlement, land use, and development in the City of Santa Fe Springs from the days of the Missions through the Hispanic colonization, subdivision of a Mexican land grant, and the ultimate establishment of an estate renowned by the turn of the century for its orchards and botanical garden. (2) The Hispanic adobe is not only extremely large, but is one of the very few extant where the potential to yield data from subsurface deposits in the immediately surrounding area has not been encroached upon or destroyed by modern urban growth. The archaeological component of the site has the potential to yield information on important aspects of early Southern California life style, social and economic interactions, and Native American contacts of the Spanish-Mexican colonialist, and certain broader questions such as the manufacture, use, and distribution of diagnostic ceramic types. (3) The structures and features of the Hawkins-Nimocks Estate which superseded the Ontiveros occupation are also important to the history of Santa Fe Springs and of Southern California through the association of the property with J.E. Fulton, a prominent citizen instrumental in the founding of Fulton Wells (now Santa Fe Springs). The garden ranch complex begun by Hawkins and further developed by Nimocks was one of the first and most extensive in Los Angeles County. In addition, the carob trees in this garden were later to play a significant role in the establishment of the carob industry in Southern California. The remaining structural features of this garden, including a trellis and decorative concrete urns, etc., are perhaps the oldest structural remains of the American in the City of Santa Fe Springs. (4) In summary, the , property is of singular importance to the City of Santa Fe Springs, representing a unique assemblage of archaeological, historical, architectural, and botanical resources with a distinctive sense of time and place.

The establishment of the adobe foundation as the remains of the residence of Patricio Ontiveros is based upon a careful and balanced analysis of archival resources and interpretation of maps dating back to 1834.

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The most detailed historic map of the area is, however, an 1862 Plat of Los Nietos Township which notes the location of all roads, houses, names of occupants, zanjas, rivers, and property lines. The Plat also notes the approximate location of the site of the Patricio Ontiveros residence. Although the scale is rather innacurate, correlations can be made by comparing fixed reference points on this map with fixed reference points on more accurately scaled drawings such as an 1868 sectional map and later to a modern County map. The final result of this line of inquiry is that it is clear that the location of the Ontiveros residence is within a 1,000 feet of the structure identified as the Ontiveros Adobe. Given the relative degree of accuracy of early maps and the fact that there is no indication of any other early structure within the area it is reasonable to assume that the structure is indeed the Ontiveros residence.

The history of the Ontiveros Adobe has also been established through careful archival research. Briefly, the land upon which the adobe is built was originally owned by Jose Manuel Nieto as part of a 300,000 acre land grant authorized by Governor Fages in 1784. Nieto died in 1804 and the original grant was subsequently divided among the heirs in five separate rancchos. The Santa Gertrudes portion, upon which the adobe was later built, was granted to Josepha Cota Nieto.

Jose Manuel Nieto and Patricio Ontiveros were both soldiers at San Gabriel, and it is certain that they met during the period 1790 (the first year that Ontiveros was at San Gabriel) and 1795 (the year Nieto retired). No documented connection has been made between the building of the adobe and the acquaintance of Nieto and Ontiveros, but it is likely that prior to his death Nieto made provisions for Ontiveros to build upon his land, or that the Ontiveros family had by then known the heirs well enough to request land to build on.

Regardless, several significant facts regarding the Ontiveros family and the adobe are evident. The property was probably occupied by the Ontiveros family between 1811 and 1814. The earliest possible date is 1809, following Patricio's discharge from the army, but it is unlikely that he would have had the resources to build such a large structure at this time. He would, however, have had the resources at his disposal following his appointment as mayordomo of Mission San Juan Capistrano in 1811. Ontiveros maintained a relatively high status

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in society until his death in 1835. He is, for example, noted as serving as "encardo de justicio" at Los Nietos in 1825. His son, Pacifico Ontiveros, is also noted as working for Antonio Nieto, one of the heirs of Jose Manuel Nieto.

The occupation of the adobe continued until 1834-1835 when, after a serious dispute with the Nieto heirs, a petition was made by Patricio to Governor Figueroa for a land grant. He died before the petitioncould be granted, but the grant was subsequently made in the name of Pacifico Ontiveros and the family moved to Santa Ana.

Most important is the fact that the adobe represents the physical remains of an early and well documented site. The archaeological and historical evidence adds greatly to the history of Santa Fe Springs and to the better understanding of California history and archaeology as a whole. No documentation exists regarding the post-1835 history of the adobe but archaeological evidence indicates that the structure probably remained abandoned and gradually deteriorated.

The proven potential of the site to yield significant archaeological information is high. Briefly, the size of the foundation is clearly larger by far than the average residential adobe of the period. This is likely a product of its indirect association with Mission Capistrano. The adobe is therefore, not only of interest to the study of large residential architecture in early California, but also to the historian interested in the cultural history of the Missions in California. Secondly, information derived from an extensive collection of bone from the site has added greatly to local knowledge of butchering practice, trade and dietary habit. Finally, the ceramic collections from the site are of considerable importance in research directed towards a typology and chronology of native made Tizon Brown wares; trade patterns and origins of named styles of Majolica; and the importation of Chinese goods and ceramics. Very few residential sites have been excavated from this period, so the collection has unique relevance to test a number of theories advanced about the distribution of Majolica and introduction of other commodities. It is also a very tightly dated context within which to study certain types of Chinese ceramics of persistent form and technology.

In summary, the archaeology of the Ontiveros adobe is of

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considerable professional interest to historians and archaeologists alike. It is also of singular importance to the local historian as the only site of its magnitude in the City of Santa Fe Springs.

The American period occupation of the property is also of substantial interest to historians and archaeologists. The property is the location of one of the first Anglo settlers of the area, J.E. Fulton, the founder of Fulton Werls, now Santa Fe Springs. Fulton purchased the property c. 1871 and built a small residence for his own use. Fulton was an agent of the Santa Gertrudes Land Company which was principally owned by J. Downey, earlier Governor of California.

The next listed owner of the property is H. Hawkins who was a resident as early as 1884. Hawkins appears to have spent considerable time and money in developing and extensive garden-ranch complex on the property. Hawkins disposed of the ranch about 1890. It was purchased by Walter and Martha Nimocks, who both maintained and expanded the garden facility. The property was susequently sold to Eugene Overton and finally to Margaret Francis Slusher who maintained possession of the property until her death in 1971.

Ms. Slusher continued to operate the property as a ranch until 1922 when oil was discovered on the land (one of the first major finds of oil in the Santa Fe Springs area). The property also played a significant role in the establishment of the carob industry. Briefly, cuttings from trees (still extant) were used in tests made to establish the commercial viability of the carob.

The American period of occupation has therefore, considerable historical interest. It is also of archaeological significance as relating to the settlement of Los Angeles County during the nineteenth century. The extensive documentation of the site will also allow for a complete and future archaeological examination of data from Missions to Modern times. This point must be underscored as the site has great potential as an interpretive center for the City of Santa Fe Springs.

In conclusion, the Hawkins-Nimocks Estate/Ontiveros Adobe is of considerable local historical and archaeological interest to the City of Santa Fe Springs. It is also of significance to the broader study of California history through its ability to yield new and useful diagnostic material. Most importantly, however, it is the single most valuable historical/archaeologiacl landmark in the City of Santa Fe Springs.

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
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The boundaries of the site have been drawn to include all of the fenced grounds of the Hawkins-Nimocks estate and the adjacent area to the southwest which includes the foundation of the Ontiveros adobe, the brick foundation of the carriage house, and the flat lands immediately surrounding these remains to provide for the potential to discover subsurface features. The westerly boundary has been drawn roughly parallel to the bank of the slope above the flat lands which have been altered by the drainage channel and oil field activities. See also attached map.



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This site contains rare remains illustrative of the total sequence of settlement, land use, and development in Southern California from the days of the missions through the Hispanic colonization, subdivision of a Mexican land grant, and ultimate establishment of an estate renowned throughout the country by the turn of the century for its buildings, orchards, and botanical garden. The adobe is not only of almost unprecedented size, but is one of the very few extant where the potential to yield data from subsurface deposits in the immediately surrounding area has not been encroached upon or destroyed by modern urban growth. The importance of such information is enhanced because very few structures of the Hispanic colonial period have ever been investigated archaeologically, except for the missions or presidios. This element of the site thus has a unique potential to yield information on important aspects of early California which are not replicated at other sites: life style, social and economic interactions, and Native American contacts of the Spanish-Mexican colonialist, and certain broader questions such as the manufacture, use, and distribution of diagnostic ceramic types. The structures and features of the Hawkins-Nimocks estate which superseded the occupation of the adobe are also important to American history through the first association of the property to J. E. Fulton, the prominent citizen identified with the development of the City of Santa Fe Springs, the garden-ranch complex begun by Hawkins and further enhanced by Nimocks into one of the most extensive of its kind in Los Angeles County, relation of the plantings to the growth of the commercial carob industry worldwide, early utilization of decorative concrete in the garden features, and the identification of certain of the structures as perhaps the oldest Americanperiod features in Santa Fe Springs. The physical remains are of archaeological, historical, architectural and botanical interest, and the property retains a distinct sense of time and place.

Summary Significance

Ontiveros Adobe

The significance of the Ontiveros adobe is based upon the following considerations:

The intact foundations of a structure which is notably large, and documented as to owner and date, has unusual potential for public interpretation, education and enlightenment. The massive width of the foundation is related to the early date of construction, experience or training of the builders in mission building practises, or--less likely--the possibility of a two-story structure. The width of the foundation is exceeded, among those known, only by the Mission churches at San Francisco Soledad de

Sonoma and San Buenaventura, and is extraordinary for a residence. The size of the adobe is almost unprecedented; in comparison with other recorded houses, only the home of Bernardo Yorba built in the 1830s is two meters longer, although one meter less in width. The Ontiveros adobe thus exceeds many of the missions in size.

- 2. The potential to yield important information through archaeology has been confirmed by the two test excavations. Features reported include one hearth or cooking area inside the structure, and two pits which contain substantial discards of cattle butchering attributed to the years of the mission. These pits are intact, as demonstrated by articulated skeletal remains, whole skulls with attached horns, and evidence of as many as nine head of cattle within a single 1 x 1 m unit. The pits thus have the potential to contain the skeletal elements of literally hundreds of animals. Information to be derived from such an unusual sample includes species, age, sex, body weight, slaughter and butchering practises, implications for trade, and dietary analysis.
- 3. The ceramic collection already retrieved is an assemblage of crucial importance in research directed towards a typology and chronology of native-made Tizon Brown wares; trade patterns and origins of named styles of Majolica; and the importation of Chinese goods and ceramics. Very few residential, i.e., non-mission sites of this period have been excavated, so the collection has unique relevance to test a number of theories advanced about the distribution of Majolica and introduction of other commodities. It is also a very tightly dated context within which to study certain types of Chinese ceramics of very persistent form and technology, which cannot otherwise be dated. Examples of the Tizon Brown, Majolica and Chinese artifacts have been submitted to the University of California, Berkeley, for X-ray, fluorescence and neutron activation studies.

Summary Significance

Hawkins-Nimocks Estate

The significance of the Hawkins-Nimocks Estate is based on the following considerations:

 The property is the location of one of the first Anglo settlers of the area (J. Fulton) and the founder of Fulton Wells, now Santa Fe Springs.

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- It is associated with prominent individuals in the history of Southern California, including Manuel Nieto, L. Carpenter, and J. Downey.
- The physical remains of the site represent one of the largest private botanical gardens in Southern California.
- The site has tremendous potential use as an interpretive center and garden/park, illustrating the history and growth of Santa Fe Springs.
- 5. The site has great archaeological potential for yielding new information relating to the settlement of southern California during the nineteenth century. This point must be underscored, as the site has been extensively documented, providing the background necessary for a future and complete archaeological examination of data. For example, the collection of artifacts related to the estate includes earthenware typical of the turn of the century, an unusually high percentage of porcelains among the ceramics (18.5%), and bottle glass indicative of the period from the late 1880s until after the advent of the automatic bottle making machine, with the majority being machine-made after 1906. Marble fragments, figurines, and 25 fragments of decorative tile may be related to Mrs. Slusher's collection of art objects.
- The estate is of singular importance to the City of Santa Fe Springs.
 It (and the Ontiveros Adobe) is undoubtedly the most significant archaeological/historical resource within the tity.

The historical background of events relating to the Ontiveros Adobe and Hawkins-Nimocks Estate are described in detail in the following Time Line and Historical summaries.

It must again be noted that the two resources represent a total sequence of settlement from missions to modern times, and are a unique and valuable assemblage of documentary and material data.

OVERVIEW AND TIME LINE

<u>Indian Background</u> - The Los Nietos region is a location of considerable importance to Native American culture. This area is known under various place names, including Sejat and Suka, as an ancestral village in the "neighborhood" of Mission San Juan Capistrano. "The first, or earliest people who populated this section of the country emigrated from a place called Sejat, distant northeast from the mission seven or eight leagues and in the middle of a valley now

known by the name of el Rancho de Los Nietos." It is one of the earliest documented Indian settlements in the region and is associated with the cultural tradition and migration patterns of the Gabrielino.

- 1769 Portola passes through the region while traveling from San Diego to the Bay of Monterey. Possible mission sites are recorded by Father Juan Crespi, missionary and expedition diarist.
- 1771 The first structure of Mission San Gabriel is erected in a temporary location.
- 1775 The Mission is moved northward the distance of one league.
- 1776 Mission San Juan Capistrano is founded.
- The Ontiveros family arrives at Mission San Gabriel. Patricio, age 9, is reportedly left by his parents to be raised by the priests at San Gabriel. Patricio's father had earlier served as an escort for the second group of colonists to settle at Los Angeles.
- 1783 A report is written by Fathers Cruzado and Sanchez of San Gabriel which details all building activity since 1775. No reference is made to any building near the structure under investigation.

- 1796- Continuing controversy over the Los Nietos grant.
- The original grant of 300,000 acres is reduced to about 150,000 acres.
- 1804 Manuel Nieto dies.

ONTIVEROS ADOBE/HISTORICAL SUMMARY

Jose Manuel Perez Nieto was the original owner of the Los Nietos grant encompassing some 300,000 acres of land "between what is now the Rio Hondo River and the Santa Ana River east and west; and from the mission highway on the north to the Pacific Ocean on the south," granted by Governor Fages in November, 1784. In answer to a petition by Nieto earlier in the same year, the grant was the "third great Spanish concession, preceded by San Pedro and San Rafael."

Nieto was a soldier of the San Diego Presidio. He is listed in the 1790 census of the San Diego Company as "Manuel Nieto, mulato, from Villa Sinaloa age 56; married to Maria Teresa Morillo, coyota, from Loreto, Baja California, age 34; two children, Juan Jose, 11; Jose Antonio, 5; Nieto's mother, Manuela Perez, espanola, age 70."

The soldiers were permitted to have herds of cattle, and it was for this reason that Nieto sought land of his own. He also apparently had help with stock-raising or domestic chores:

Jose Manuel Nieto evidently had Indian servants on the ranch, for Mr. Rhodes recalls that he found in one document that there was objection made to Indians from Los Nietos ranch coming to Los Angeles and raising disturbances from drinking.

A letter from Governor Fages describing the ranch in 1784 reads:

The cattle are augmenting, for that reason it is necessary to give some extension to several people, some people have asked for sites which I have granted temporarily. One is Juan Dominguez, formerly a soldier of the Presidio of San Diego. He has at this date four herds of horses or mares and about two hundred head of cattle in the San Gabriel River (downstream): Granted to Manuel Nieto for the same reason on that of La Sanja, Camino Real from said mission.

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The dispute was apparently resolved by a restatement of what Governor Borica had written in 1796, essentially, "I have already told Nieto that he was permitted the cultivation and use of those lands whilst the Mission does not need them. . . . I have given to Nieto possession of that place." The decision reduced the original size of the grant by approximately half.

Nieto died in 1804. His widow and five children continued to live at Rancho Los Nietos apparently in peaceful, although uneasy, coexistence with the neighboring Mission. Nieto's son, Juan Jose, notes in a letter dated January 23, 1827, that "we agreed with the Mission of San Gabriel. . . giving the Mission the right to graze their animals on our ranch just as we are doing at present and are on congenial terms." These remarks were actually a preface to a request for regranting individual parts of the original Los Nietos ranch to each of Manuel Nieto's heirs. Several individuals had applied for land on Los Nietos and the family sought to circumvent the possible loss of ownership through reconfirmation of the grant. On May 17, 1834, Governor Figueroa signed a document confirming the land to the heirs in five ranchos. Juan Jose Nieto was given Los Coyotes. Dona Catarina Ruiz, widow of Jose Antonia Nieto, was given the area known as Las Bolsas; Dona Manuel Nieto de Cota was granted Los Cerritos; and Josepha Cota Nieto, widow of Antonio Maria de los Santos Perez, was given Santa Gertrudes.

Each of the heirs would later dispose of his or her portion of the land. The site under investigation is located on the Santa Gertrudes portion of Los Nietos which Josepha Cota Nieto sold in 1843 to Lemuel Carpenter. The flood of 1867 was to destroy many buildings along the San Gabriel River. "Several thousand acres were washed away by the San Gabriel cutting a new channel to the sea. . . ," and the former Nieto adobe, then owned by Carpenter, was one of those carried away by the flood.

JUAN JOSE NIETO AND THE MISSION CONTROVERSY

Juan Jose Nieto became the acting head of the family in the years that followed the death of Manuel Nieto. He was, for example, the principal party involved in the application for the regranting of Los Nietos. In 1834, his representative wrote Governor Figueroa:

The citizen Juan Jose Nieto, for himself and for his three brothers . . . and for the retired Sargent Guillermo Cota . . . wish to bring to your attention that the land was granted to our father for his services . . . and we ask that the land be preserved.

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Fourteen witnesses testify over the suit between Juan Jose Nieto and San Juan Capistrano Mission. Several mention mayordomo Patricio Ontiveros as having participated in mission roundups. Ontiveros himself is witness #4, who testifies that he is a retired soldier of San Diego Company, second mayordomo of San Juan Capistrano since 1811. About three years after he became mayordomo there was an increase in the size of the herds. He rounded up many head at Parage de los Alisos, where there were some 2,000 head. While branding the mission cattle there, Nieto came up and branded two calves, though he was advised not to do so, in order to avoid trouble with the mission. Later on, he found about 1,000 cattle there, and so he branded the calves. Nieto came up, told him to leave, because it was his property. The next day there were some 2,000 cattle there. The padre told Nieto to remove his stock. He refused, saying the sitio was his. Nieto disagreed, stating that the place was certainly his, as everyone knew, and that the cattle were his, in any case. The padre ordered the cattle driven to the river, while Nieto remained, cutting and branding his. Again, a fourth time at El Aliso, there were about 500 cattle there, both branded and maverick. Nieto demanded cattle he said were his, but Ontiveros gave those cattle he owed to corporal Machado of San Luis Rey to take them to the mission. He found some 20 to 30 head for branding and marking. The fifth time there were 300 to 400 cattle, most of them branded and only 10 to 12 mavericks. When asked about the testimony of Cosme Olivas and the roundup at Paraje de la Salina, he said to cross-reference with Olivas' and Luz Garcia's testimony. He says he is 49, signs with an X.

There is no record of how the suit was settled, but it is likely that it was left unresolved until the Missions were secularized and until the Nieto family was regranted title to Los Nietos lands in 1834.

The case is of considerable interest. First, it is clear that Mission San Juan Capistrano lands extended farther north than has been previously realized. Engelhardt records, in quoting from a letter written by Fr. Payeras in 1821, that representatives of the Nieto family had "presented themselves in person and in a formal petition asked me to take into consideration the damage which the Mission of San Juan Capistrano, adjoining their Rancho of Santa Gertrudes, had done to their cattle." In addition, Mr. Mason's summary of the Gutierrez account records that cattle were driven by the padres "to the river." The implication is clear that Mission San Juan Capistrano lands extended to the north of the Santa Ana River. Secondly, the dispute between Nieto and the Mission provides adequate reason for conflict between the Ontiveros and Nieto families. The possibility of such a dispute is, as demonstrated in the following section, a key to the understanding of the abandonment of the Ontiveros adobe about 1834-1835.

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Ontiveros applied for his discharge in 1809, after about 20 years of service. Soldiers were eligible for a pension after 18 years, and it is not surprising that Ontiveros would apply at this time. His plans were, however, radically altered by the Hidalgo Revolt of 1810. Military pensions were, in fact, suspended in 1811 as a result of the uprising. Ontiveros was placed in the dubious position of being both without a job and without the retirement that he had clearly anticipated.

His appointment as mayordomo of Mission San Juan Capistrano was undoubtedly a welcomed event, for the position was both prestigious and rewarding. The exact date of his appointment is not known. The letter of Alcalde Gutierrez notes that he was the "second mayordomo since 1811," and Engelhardt records that Ontiveros was mayordomo by February 2, 1814. It is clear that at some point between 1811 and February 1814, Ontiveros was appointed mayordomo. It was an old custom for the Fathers to choose from the mission guard a soldier who would act as mayordomo. He would have charge of the work and, in the words of Fr. Serra:

. . . everything else that came up in the duties of the mission and if the soldier conducted himself properly it was usual for him to grow old in that position. This measure is of great importance for the advancement of the temporal affairs of the missions for the Father cannot attend personally to everything, nor would he know how to direct all the manual work that comes up, for at the monastery they did not teach him this.

The appointment is not altogether surprising, for Ontiveros was familiar with both the area and the Mission system through his years spent as a soldier at San Gabriel. As mayordomo his duties would have principally involved the supervision of the Mission cattle. Ontiveros had, in effect, become a member of the privileged class, an event which would have undoubtedly resulted in a marked change in life-style. At this point Ontiveros probably moved to the adobe under investigation. He would have needed a substantial structure befitting his position and duties, and would have the required resources to maintain a structure of this size at this point in his life.

There is precedent at other missions as well for the mayordomo to reside away from the main church quadrangle or compound. There are also suggestions that, particularly in anticipation of secularization, the missions engaged in extraordinary cattle slaughters under contracts to individuals on a half-share basis. Such contracts were reported for San Gabriel and San Luis Rey Missions. In any event, the missions regularly slaughtered for hides and tallow to use in trade, and made jerky of the meat to feed the Indians in the winter.

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The history of the Ontiveros family effort to obtain a grant of land is significant, for it reveals several important features that relate to the adobe. It is clear, for example, that the Ontiveros family had abandoned the property ca. 1834-1835. This contention is supported by information contained in the 1836 census of Los Angeles County. The census notes that all of Juan Pacifico's children were "Naturel del Santa Gertrudes" or born at that place. The youngest child was then one year old. The implication is that the family was living on Santa Gertrudes until 1834-1835, and that after that point they moved to Santa Ana. The census also contains no mention of Patricio Ontiveros, and it must be assumed that he died in 1835-1836.

The above dates are also supported by documents relating to the Nieto family. In 1834 when Governor Figueroa granted the area of Rancho Los Nietos known as Los Coyotes to Juan Jose Nieto, he noted:

Because Mr. Juan Jose Nieto has the lawful right to the testamentary execution of the deceased Manual Nieto and taking into consideration the many years he has peacefully possessed the land known by the name of Los Coyotes contiguous to that of Santa Gertrudes, Los Serritos, Los Alamitos, las Bolsas and el Rancho de Patricio Ontiveros. . . .

The confirmation is significant in that it mentions the ranch of Patricio Ontiveros. In 1839 Juan Jose sold Los Coyotes. The Ontiveros ranch is again mentioned, but the ownership is now credited to Juan Pacifico.

In the City of Los Angeles . . . appeared Juan Jose Nieto native and resident of the Rancho de Santa Gertrudes of this Municipal Government, and said that he, in the name of his sons, heirs, successors . . . sells . . . los Coyotes which is located in this the same municipality and consists of ten sites . . . it is adjacent to the ranches of Santa Gertrudis, los Serritos, los Alamitos, los Bolsas and the ranch of Juan Pacifico Ontiveros.

The change in ownership of the land by 1839 confirms the fact that Patricio had died during the interim.

The history of the Ontiveros family in Southern California is an interesting one. <u>Saddleback Ancestors</u> describes the later period in detail.

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seriously his "Good for nothing," for on 27 July 1857 he bought 1,165 acres of the ranch. Earlier Ontiveros had employed Hansen, a German immigrant and civil engineer from San Francisco, to survey his holdings. Hansen became so enamored with this land that not even the owner's remark that the land "wasn't fit to pasture goats" could dissuade him from his choice.

The full potential of the land was not realized at the time and would not be for some years to come. Hansen's title was confirmed, it was issued in the name of the German colonists who founded the "Mother Colony" which became Anaheim. It is recorded that two dollars per acre (or \$2,330) was paid for the property. This included the privilege of bringing water from the Santa Ana River through the Yorbas' Rancho Santiago de Santa Ana without interference.

In 1851 after California had been admitted to the Union, it was necessary for grantees of the <u>ranchos</u> to prove title to their lands. Much to his dismay, Juan Pacifico found it difficult to prove his claims. First, it was discovered that the grant issued in 1837 for the <u>Rancho San Juan Cajon de Santa Ana</u> failed to delineate adequately its boundaries. It was necessary to present the original petition and maps to validate the grant, but some years earlier Ontiveros had lost his copies of the documents necessary now to prove his claim. A search in the state archives was to no avail; neither the petition nor map could be found. Because of his inability to produce these relevant documents, Ontiveros' claim was rejected.

Undaunted, Ontiveros appealed the decision. Among those appearing in his behalf were surveyor George Hansen, Manuel Duarte, and Bernardo Yorba. In 1856 the United States District Courts reversed the initial decision. Ontiveros felt sure that his title was now clear. Then a government counter-appeal was carried to the Supreme Court. It was subsequently dismissed in December of 1857. The patent to Rancho San Juan Cajon de Santa Ana was finally signed and the case closed in 1876.

Long before the case was cleared, though, Juan Pacifico had deeded some of the land to his son Patricio II. He had bought for himself Rancho Tepusquet located near Santa Maria at the junction of the Sisquoc and Cuyama Rivers. In addition, he had built an adobe home in which he took up residence in 1857. Here he lived until his death at 95. Son Florentino also occupied the Rancho Tepusquet home which became known as the Florentino Ontiveros Adobe. It was later purchased and restored by the G. Allen Hancock family.

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In 1852, Carpenter borrowed \$5,000 from John Gately Downey at 5% interest compounded monthly. From 1852 to 1859, the debt grew to \$104,000, and on November 11, 1859, the sheriff auctioned the property to satisfy the creditors. Rancho Santa Gertrudes was sold to Downey and James McFarland for \$60,000. Prior to the sale, Carpenter had taken his own life. "After Carpenter's death his family continued to occupy the place (adobe only). . . . Downey dismissed a suit to eject Mrs. Carpenter." Downey was elected Lieutenant-Governor of California in the same year.

At the request of the new owner the ranch was surveyed by the U.S. Surveyor General. A Plat map was prepared and drawn October 4, 1862, approved in 1869, and recorded in 1871. Downey and McFarland had conceived of an extensive real estate venture involving the subdivision of Santa Gertrudes and the sale of property to a large number of individual buyers. The first deed of sale was executed on April 22, 1865, to J. H. Burke. "Governor Downey has," noted one rancher-investor, "throughout his whole career proven himself the friend of the poor man, and has helped many to procure good homes on easy terms."

To promote the sale of property, the Santa Gertrudes Land Company was formed. A newspaper article dated February 19, 1867, describes the area at that time:

The township of Los Nietos is situated in the valley of the San Gabriel river, and is supplied for irrigating and domestic purposes by that stream. The principal settlement is upon the Los Nietos or Santa Gertrudes rancho . . . Jno. G. Downey, offers superior facilities for persons wishing to purchase and improve homesteads; and during the past year several hundred persons have availed themselves of the opportunity to purchase fine lands upon reasonable terms, and Los Nietos presents to-day the appearance of a settlement several years old. We observed a number of neat, well-built farm cottages, and large well-filled barns, long rows of live willow fencing, and well and conveniently constructed water canals or zanjas.

Additional investors were attracted by early reports such as this and by 1800, one article declared that "the valley of Los Nietos is one of the richest agricultural sections of the State of California."

The real estate venture and promotional scheme of Downey and the Santa Gertrudes Land Company were largely responsible for the development of the Santa Gertrudes-Los Nietos-Santa Fe Springs area in the latter half of the nineteenth century. When Downey purchased Rancho Santa Gertrudes in 1859, the California period of Los Nietos truly came to an end. The early inhabitants of the area either left, were moved off, or were forgotten. In a comparison of the "old" Los Nietos to the "new" Los Nietos, one article notes:

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At this time Fulton appears to have been an agent of the Santa Gertrudes Land Company. One contemporary account reports, "after inspecting Nietos, I rode over with Dr. J. E. Fulton, the local agent of the Santa Gertrudes Land Company, to inspect that flourishing settlement." The article further describes that "a noticeable feature of this district is Dr. Fulton's artesian well . . . It is Dr. Fulton's intention to erect a sanatarium near this well."

Fulton did indeed build a sanitarium near his well. Known as Fulton Wells, the town that grew up around it would later become Santa Fe Springs.

The place was actually named Fulton Sulphur Springs and Health Resort when it was platted in the mid 1870's, Doctor Fulton had a resort hotel, and passengers en route from Los Angeles to San Diego often stopped for a few days at the mineral springs resort . . . The hotel was surrounded by beautiful park-like grounds. Few of the lots that were platted sold, and the community did not develop until the Santa Fe Railroad came through with its 1886 line and promoted the line as Santa Fe Springs.

Hawkins Purchase

The property was next owned by Harvay H. Hawkins. Information indicates that Hawkins was resident here as early as 1884. He is listed in the Los Angeles County Great Register of 1884 as a farmer living at Los Nietos, a native of Missouri. Hawkins appears to have spent considerable time and money in developing an extensive garden-ranch on the property. Mrs. Slusher, a subsequent owner, once recalled that "the big house and the carriage barn and a conservatory full of rare plants and fine gardens adorned with exotic trees and statuary were developed . . . by Hawkins." The exact date of Hawkins' acquisition is unknown but it seems likely that Fulton would have disposed of the property at or about the time he built his health resort. Fulton built the resort in 1878. The stylistic qualities of the original house and barn indicate that they were built in the late 1870s to the early 1880s. These considerations suggest that Hawkins was on the property before the 1884 reference. The dating of the structures and the time of Hawkins' arrival are therefore estimated as about 1880.

Hawkins disposed of the property about 1890. It was purchased by Walter and Martha Nimocks shortly after their arrival in California from Minneapolis. The relationship of the Nimocks is obscure, but it appears that prior to the sale of the ranch in 1904, Martha Nimocks was in complete possession of the property. One biographer notes:

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The property today consists of various remnants of the Hawkins-Nimocks garden-ranch complex. Sculptural and structural remains date back to the 1880s. The complex is of considerable historical, architectural and botanical interest, and is one of the few remaining examples of its kind in Southern California.




Hawkins-Nimocks Estate and the Ontiveros Adobe

The complex is recommended on the local level of significance under criteria D (the possibility of yielding information on history and prehistory).

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

Dear Mrs. Slusher:

You may perhaps remember that in 1921 Lawrence Holmes and I received permission from you to take a few twigs from an old carob tree near the gate in your Santa Fe Springs place for propagation. These buds were put on trees near kiverside. These trees were destroyed by the aetripolitan mater Dis rict to make room for a storage lake.

In 1950 I returned to get another twig to use in a test in the Rittenhouse carob demonstration orchard near Vista. Mrs. Fred Witman gave the twig to me. He now have two trees in bearing at the orchard. Chemical analysis of this pod showed 47.5 percent sugar. The tree is an hermaphrodite and bears both male and female flowers. When using it in commercial plantings we do not need to waste space planting male trees for pollination as it pollenates itself.

El Molino Mills in Alhambra, which imports several million dollars worth of carob pods from Europe for the manufacture of their candy in as a substitute for chocolate tested a sack of these pods and are anxious to have a commercial plantin on non-irrigated lands in southern California.

I have send bud-wood twigs to South Africa, Australia and Chili as well as ferael for propagation.

While we have other excellent varieties, it occurred to me that you would be intersated to hear that your tree has and is playing an important part in the development of carob culture on dry lands in various parts of the world.

I am sending you a sample package of the carob candy made here in California. It is being sold in all health food stores in California, but is not yet is sufficient volume to be sold in the super-markets. Enclosed is printed matter which shows how many products are now being made from carob.

We will never have enough irrigation water to cover all the good soil in southern "difornia. By growing carobs on such land we will have in time a new and important industry.

Our organization is very pleased to hear that the Hawkins-Nimocks Estate, Santa Fe Springs is being considered for placement on the National Register.

We first became involved with this important site in 1973, when we were invited to assist in the investigation of the "Old Fort" by Mr. Wilson Turner and his art class from Rio Hondo College. This joint venture proved to be less than satisfactory, due to problems regarding proper excavation and recordation procedures, coupled with our lack of authority to affect changes in these areas.

Our brief encounter (one day) with the site did allow us the opportunity to observe evidence of some of the special features it holds. In addition to the readily observable botanical specimens, there were surface indications of prehistoric, Rancho and later historic occupations, a nearly unique combination of features for archaeological sites in Southern California.

It was with great pleasure that we received the news that the City of Santa Fe Springs had contracted with Greenwood and Associates for a proper study of the "Slusher Estate." We concur heartily with their recommendation that the Hawkins-Nimocks (Slusher) property be placed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Hawkins-Nimocks Estate: the Committee felt that the application was well researched and it was agreed unanimously by those present that the Estate more than meets the criteria for designation on the National Register of Historic Places.

Los Angeles City Branch System (24 branches constructed between 1913 and 1930): the Committee does not recommend denial, but the Committee has some concern regarding the sweeping statements about the "blanket acceptance" concept of the application. After considerable discussion, the Committee agreed to recommend designation.

Crossroads of the World: the Committee has no additional comments to make following its last statements. The Committee did not feel it could comment at this time until the application's revisions are available for study.

We are returning your National Register of Historic Places application for the Hawkins-Nimocks estate in the City of Santa Fe Springs. The enclosed material is a Xerox copy of your submission; we have retained the originals in our files. We have enclosed a copy of the comment sheet from the National Register, which we discussed in our recent telephone conversation. We have discovered an additional sheet which details the staff comments of individual reviewers at the National Register. Since this is a handwritten copy and it has already been copied previously, it would probably not reproduce well enough to be legible. The comments of the individual reviewers as they appeared on this additional supplemental sheet are as follows:

- 1. Joe Towner, August 19, 1980. "The integrity of the historic fabric is so seriously compromised that the ability of the complex to convey any associations with Ontiveros or Hawkins, or Nimocks is very doubtful. The only standing structures are an aviary of uncertain date and significance and a much altered water tower. The archeological potential of adobe needs to be clarified. Community preservationists are greatly concerned about getting this Bicentennial project area listed, but my inclination is to reject or return for answers to Carol Ebright's questions."
- 2. C. A. Ebright, August 13, 1980. "Early Hispanic Adobe with dubious connections to a fort and mission and an estate with substantial gardens of botanical interest in neglected and deteriorated condition. The main connection between the properties is former presence on part of same Mexican land grant. Historic estate may be eligible under Criteria C and B, and possibly D, with respect to botanical remains. Archeological potential needs to be developed more fully. Adobe appears eligible under D could clarify early trade patterns and supply routes and domestic versus non-domestic use of certain ceramics."

3. Patrick Andrus, December 30, 1980. "This is an archeological nomination—the historic remains are either in ruins or are of such a secondary nature that their ability to convey the association with Hawkins-Nimocks is severely compromised. If they wish to make the case that the botanic remains are significant, then we will need more information on what was there and what presently remains. The adobe building appears significant but, with the information provided on the estate, I have doubts on its eligibility. The nomination form makes it clear that much of the original botanic layout is no longer in existence and that the remaining layout has not been evaluated by someone knowledgeable in the field. The carob connection needs more investigation."

We have transcribed these comments of the individual reviewers at the Register to provide additional guidance. We have also enclosed new National Register forms for your preparation of the resubmitted National Register application. If we may be of any further assistance at that time, please do not hesitate to contact this office.

This letter will demonstrate our interest and support for the nomination.

At its meeting of October 22, 1981, the Redevelopment Agency of the City of Santa Fe Springs reaffirmed its previous position of support for this nomination.

REPORT OF TELEPHONE CONVERSATION

November 17, 1981 2:30 PM, Ernestine Elster to Stephen D. Mikesell

Ernestine called to report on a telephone conversation earlier today between herself and Roberta Greenwood. Ms. Greenwood was apparently "furious" at the treatment given her nomination for the "Hawkins-Nimocks Estate" at the SHRC meeting of November 14, 1981.. She understood that the word "shoddy" had been used by one of the Commissioner. (Delieve, although I did not say this to Ernestine, that the term was used by the City of Santa Fe Springs; the tape will tell.)

Greenwood is concerned about the way this nomination has been treated by our office. She raised three specific points:

- 1) We have been unresponsive to requests from Washington, DC for additional information, specifically ignoring requests in 1979 and 1980 for the Bente report (?)
- 2) Aaron Gallup told Roger Hatheway the report was "perfect" when it was resubmitted in September, 1981. (This point is probably incorrect, but was mentioned by Greenwood to Elster).
- 3) That "Rondeau" (no first name given, but presumably Mike Rondeau) of our office had called Greenwood about the report. Ernestine could not recall why Greenwood mentioned Rondeau, only to say that she repeated the name several times.

Ernestine felt that Greenwood would sue--somebody, presumably our office of the Commission--for "sullying" her otherwise good name as a constituent.

The above property was recommended for listing on the National Register of Historic Places by the State Historical Resources Commission at its meeting of 11-14-81 We have unfortunately been unable to forward your application to the Keeper of the National Register because of an absence of federal regulations to implement the 1980 Amendments to the National Historic Preservation Act. These regulations were published on November 16, 1981, allowing us to resume the processing of your application. We are required to renotify you in accordance with the new regulations and provide you with the opportunity to comment upon the nomination of your property.

The National Register is the Federal Government's official list of historic properties worthy of preservation. Listing in the National Register provides recognition and assists in preserving our Nation's heritage.

Listing in the National Register provides the following benefits to historic properties:

- - Consideration in the planning for federally assisted projects. Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 provides that the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation be given an opportunity to comment on projects affecting such properties.
- - Eligibility for Federal tax benefits. If a property is listed in the National Register, certain tax provisions may apply. The Tax Reform Act of 1976 as amended by the Revenue Act of 1978 and the Tax Treatment Extension Act of 1980, and the Economic Recovery Tax Act of 1981, contain provisions intended to encourage the preservation of depreciable historic structures by allowing favorable tax treatments for rehabilitation, and to discourage destruction of historic buildings by eliminating certain Federal tax provisions for demolition of historic structures. Beginning January 1, 1982, the Economic Recovery Tax Act replaces the rehabilitation tax incentives available under prior law with a 25% investment tax credit for rehabilitations of certain historic commercial, industrial and residential rental buildings. This can be combined with a 15-year cost recovery period for the adjusted basis of the historic building. Historic buildings with certified rehabilitations receive additional tax savings because they are exempt from any requirement to reduce the basis of the building by the amount of credit. The Tax Treatment Extension Act of 1980 includes provisions regarding charitable contributions for conservation purposes of partial interests in historically important land areas or structures.

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

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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The site area is in the eastern portion of Los Angeles County in the San Gabriel Valley, southwest of the Puente Hills. In earlier times, it was near the eastern bank of the old channel of the San Gabriel River, and just north of Little Lake. Situated on part of a gentle flood plain at an elevation between 120 and 135 feet. it was once passed on the east side by El Camino Real and in later years, by the first routing of Pioneer Boulevard. The two extinct water sources would have supported a variety of plants and animals. Prehistorically, such natural resources were one factor in the location of the Indian rancheria of Sejat (Robinson 1933: 83), suspected to be about 365 meters southwest of this location; the same resources and gentle landscape attracted the attention of Portola and Fr. Juan Crespi in 1769 and influenced the location of Mission San Gabriel. The land was used for grazing and agriculture both by the Mission after 1771, and by the residents of the Los Nietos land grant after 1784. In the 1920s and after, adjacent property was altered by the development of the Santa Fe Springs oil field, but there has not been drilling on the site area and all tanks, sumps, rigs, and other equipment have since been removed. The remains are on a bench above the flood channel, and the surface is presently covered by a mix of native and introduced flora including Caulanthus, filaree, shepherd's purse, fiddleneck, field mustard, black mustard, thistle, rye grasses, oats, barley, fox-tail and wild rhubarb. There are pepper, palm, carob, and other trees.

Contained on the property are two distinct cultural resources, one definitely associated with early Hispanic period colonial settlement and possibly related to both the activities of Mission San Gabriel and to the Battle of the San Gabriel in 1847. The other is an outstanding garden-ranch developed in the 1880s. Each has physical remains existing and will be described separately.

The Ontiveros Adobe - Intact cobble and boulder foundations are present representing a very large three room adobe structure which was 30.1 meters long north-south and 7.0 meters wide east-west. Interior dimensions of the rooms are 8.2 x 5.2 meters, 10.4 x 5.0 meters, and 6.9 x 5.0 meters respectively, from north to south. The foundations average 1.1 meters in width and are up to .8 meter in depth, and include some dressed stones. The walls dividing the rooms are as thick as the exterior foundations and are interlocked with the outer walls at the one joint presently visible, suggesting that they were load-bearing walls and not merely partitions, and that the structure was built all at one time rather than growing by additions. No evidence is now apparent about the nature of the roofing or flooring; however, one fragment each of mission style, black core roof tile and floor tile have been recovered. Portions of the walls and room interiors have been sealed and thus protected by a carriage barn built about 1880, and by a macadam surface dating to approximately 1920.

The only physical investigation done in the past was a non-controlled volunteer, intermittent exposure of parts of the foundation between 1972-1977 by Wilson G. Turner, art historian at Rio Hondo Junior College, and his students. There were no field notes or catalogue maintained, but 167 artifacts have been retrieved from

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three different sources. In 1979, a non-destructive investigation was performed by Greenwood and Associates for the City of Santa Fe Springs which provided for historical research, field surface survey and examination of the foundation, analysis of the previous collection and 15 additional artifacts, identification of ceramics by Ronald V. May, assessment of architecture by Roger E. Hatheway, and the preparation of a detailed report (1979).

Artifacts within the collection which related to the occupation of the adobe include four fragments of Majolica (1 of the Aranama tradition, 1790-1810; 2 of San Elizario Polychrome, 1750-1810; and 1 polychrome tile sherd with lead glaze, atypical of the Spanish-Mexican tradition in its use of red, an exotic style usually used to adorn churches or aristocratic homes in Mexico). Other ceramics include Palomar Brown and San Luis Rey Brown Wares; three sherds of historic aboriginal manufacture which do not belong within any defined types and may represent a local tradition not previously recognized; two sherds which resemble Delft wares; and 10 heavy and dark fragments with ornate applique and salt-like glaze which may represent a Spanish jar. There was also a single fragment of pearlware with a molded floral garland and laterally applied blue rim stripe which is diagnostic of British manufacture between 1800 and 1820. The only faunal remains recovered or saved by the early investigators were bone fragments of large mammal, shattered rather than butchered, and shells of Haliotis sp., Saxidomus nuttalli, Aequipecten sulcatus, and Polinices lewisii.

Only the foundations have been exposed, and there is the potential to discover interior features or exterior elements such as additional walls, wells, hornos, trash dispositions, or other cultural resources.

The Hawkins-Nimocks Estate - A number of buildings, structures, and landscape elements comprise this complex which was developed on the Santa Gertrudes subdivision of the Los Nietos land grant. All of the following features except for the carriage barn, No. 3 below, are contained within a fenced portion of the property which is northeast of the adobe.

- 1. Cottage. The first of the more recent structures after the adobe was probably a board and batten cottage built by J. E. Fulton prior to 1871. There is an extant photo taken about 1900. It was either <u>demolished</u> prior to one of the additions to the main residence, No. 2 below, or destroyed by fire in 1941.
- 2. Main residence. Built by Harvay H. Hawkins about 1880, contemporary accounts call it a "Gem," a country house of ten rooms. Photographs of exterior and interior, and floor plans, remain. Additions were subsequently made by Overton between 1904 and 1915, and by Slusher around 1920. It was destroyed by fire in 1941; the substructure, cellar, and a standing fireplace remain.

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- 3. Carriage house or barn. Constructed on a brick foundation by Hawkins about 1880, it has been described as "the most expensive farm barn in the County, costing not less than \$5000." Portions of it are superimposed over the adobe foundations. It burned in 1969; some of the brick foundations are intact subsurface, although many of the loose bricks exposed by Turner have been scavenged. Photographs exist, and the concrete ramp which led to the entrance is still in place on brick piers, over the adobe foundation.
- 4. Conservatory. An ornate building shown in contemporary photographs, this was also built by Hawkins during his ownership. It contained a fountain and was said to be filled with rare plants. The fountain reservoir and parts of the foundation are present to indicate the location.
- 5. Tank house. Definitely built during the nineteenth century, probably by Hawkins, this is the oldest structure remaining. It is a three-story tower which once supported a windmill, and was an integral part of a very advanced and extensive water system. The windmill has been removed, and the tank house was remodeled in 1920 by Silas Slusher who added a large garage to one side. The shape of some of the window and door openings in the tower and certain pieces of tank house apparatus appear to date from the nineteenth century. It is in deteriorated condition. Drawing from an artesian well, the apparatus supplied water for the houses, barns, yards, and gardens through a pipe system with numerous hydrants.
 - 6. Reservoir and water system. There was a circular brick reservoir before 1900 which was 70 feet in diameter and nearly six feet high inside, and at least four wells. When the windmill was insufficient, water was pumped from this reservoir through a five inch pipe more than 1500 feet to irrigate the garden and orchards. The reservoir has been removed, but much of the piping, stand pipes, and brass hydrant fittings are still present throughout the property.
 - 7. Aviary. Although the date and builder are not known for certain, this also appears to be one of the original buildings originating before the turn of the century. It is a one story structure built of wood and metal, open on all four sides, and screened with old mesh throughout. It is in a good state of preservation, a utilitarian structure adapted to an interesting and unique use.
 - 8. Trellis. This item of garden furniture appears to date from the 1880s, based upon the use of lattice and chamfered wooden framework. It is similar in design and construction to those seen in photographs of the property ca 1900. One trellis is standing in good condition, with seats added; another is partly or wholly dismantled on the ground.

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- 9. Fountains, urns, planters, and birdbath. At least three original fountain reservoirs are present, two in line with the entrance to the main residence, and the third which would have been inside the conservatory. The reservoirs are made of brick with a concrete coating; two are shown in original condition in photographs which illustrate that one was embellished with abalone shells. One retains its cast iron column and lower basin, although upper sculptural elements are gone. The common design motif to all of these pieces is the seashell and cupid. They all appear to date from the 1880s.
- 10. Cottage. A one story, simple wood frame bungalow, designed in the style of modest residential architecture typical of the period of World War I. Its major features include a low pitched roof, eaves with rafter ends exposed, raised and offset porch, and flat window and door openings.
- 11. Cottage. Acresatively modern stucco residence, built in the 1940s. No historical or architectural significance is attached.
- 12. Gardens. At about 1900, the estate contained 3,000 trees equally divided among orange, lemon and olive groves on 35 acres, with five acres in Bartlett pears. On the lower land, the remainder of the property was planted in alfalfa, except for a portion reserved for grazing. Eucalyptus were raised to provide both fuel and shade for the livestock, pigs, and poultry. The more exotic gardens around the residence were developed by Hawkins with rare plants, statuary (figures of deer and dogs show in photographs), and gravel paths, and further enhanced by Martha Nimocks, the next owner. It is not known who planted the carob trees which supplied cuttings for scientific study and commercial propagation in 1921 and 1950; the stock was described as "old" in 1921, but at least two trees are still alive and bearing. Also known to have been raised are the Marcial Niel rose, pepper trees, and palms. Although in neglected condition, the outlines of planting beds and garden paths are still discernible, and a botanist may be able to identify rare or exotic species among the plants, shrubs, and trees.

Other remains include a small concrete reservoir adjacent to the tank house, several items of farm machinery including a hand cranked shelling device, and several watering troughs, sheds, and other small farm buildings. The premises are currently occupied by a resident caretaker and are fenced.

The collection of artifacts related to the estate includes earthenwares typical of the turn of the century, an unusually high percentage of porcelains among the ceramics (18.5 %), and bottle glass indicative of the period from the late 1880s until after the advent of the automatic bottle making machiner, with the majority being machine made after 1906. Marble fragments, figurines, and 25 fragments of decorative tile may be related to Mrs. Slusher's collection of art objects but since the

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assemblage lacks all provenience or context, no interpretations are possible. Found in the area of the carriage house were an iron spur representative of 1870-1890, and a brass lantern typical of those used on carriages.

The boundaries of the site have been drawn to include all of the fenced grounds of the Hawkins-Nimocks estate and the adjacent area to the southwest which includes the foundation of the Ontiveros adobe, the brick foundation of the carriage house, and the flat lands immediately surrounding these remains to provide for the potential to discover subsurface features. The westerly boundary has been drawn roughly parallel to the bank of the slope above the flat lands which have been altered by the drainage channel and oil field activities. The total land holding of 43 acres has been subject to an intensive surface survey, but no other cultural resources were discovered other than those described above.

Further details on the individual buildings are in the attached appendix. The descriptions are taken from a report prepared on the property by a group of archaeologists and preservationists, Greenwood and Associates.

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apparently died between 1834 and 1839, but the structure was apparently continuously occupied by his son Juan Pacific Ontiveros and ultimately by his grandson Pacifico Ontiveros, at least through 1862. It is considered most probable that the building was destroyed above ground by the severe floods which scoured the old bed of the San Gabriel River in 1867, and which are known to have destroyed Nieto's adobe (Greenwood and Associates 1979; Robinson 1933). The date of construction is not precisely known but it could have been about 1806, coincident with Ontiveros' retirement from the military.

Local historical legends have suggested that the adobe was built as "an old Spanish fort," was built as a fortification by J. M. Hijar and thus related to the abortive revolt at Los Angeles in 1835, and that it was occupied by Generals Kearney and Stockton on the eve of the Battle of the San Gabriel in 1847. Recent research has discounted the first two of these interpretations, but it is possible that Stockton's company did camp at or near the adobe. The distance to the river, relation to named fords, and position on what was then the main route from San Diego to Los Angeles are all appropriate for this location. Although it is not likely that so brief an occupation would have left archaeological evidence, it has been reported that 'wheelbarrows of grape shot" and a brass cannon three feet long have been recovered from the site (Morris 1960). Although no documentary evidence has been found to date, there is also the possibility that the adobe was first built as an assistencia, capilla, or visita of Mission San Gabriel. Its unusual size, building plan, and method of construction are similar to known mission buildings, and religious medals have been found at an Indian site 365 meters to the southwest, believed to be the ancestral Gabrielino rancheria of Sejat. Such questions as the initial date of construction, original purpose of the building, person or institution responsible for the construction, and any changes in its function, may be revolved through future archaeological investigation.

A major aspect of the site's archaeological significance concerns certain ceramics which have been identified within the small collection resulting from Turner's excavations in 1972-1977. Majolica of the San Elizario Polychrome and Aranama Traditions, and an exotic Majolica polychrome tile, possibly of European manufacture, have been recovered. Prior to 1834, the Mexican embargo of trade goods to the California colonies restricted the purchase and use of goods other than those supplied from Mexico. Majolica was one of the wares thus supplied, and has been commonly found in mission and presidio sites of the period. It has been assumed that use of these ceramics was restricted to the missions and presidios, but their presence at this residential site suggests that the above interpretation may have been based on biased sampling, since so few domestic colonial sites have ever been excavated. Systematic excavation and contextual deposits may contribute to theories about the distribution and use of Majolica. The collection also included fragments of San

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Luis Rey Brown, a recently identified local tradition within the Mission Series of Tizon Brown Ware, and other sherds of a type not previously known, which may represent another local tradition possibly associated to the neary Sejat rancheria of Mission San Gabriel (May, pers. com.).

The original Los Nietos grant of 1784 was confirmed in five portions to Nieto's heirs in 1834. The Santa Gertrudes rancho, on which this site is located, passed to Josepha Cota Nieto, widow of Antonio Maria Nieto. She sold the property to Lemuel Carpenter in 1843, and it was acquired at a sheriff's sale in settlement of debt by John G. Downey in 1859. Los Nietos was platted in 1862, and the first deed of sale in the Rancho Santa Gertrudes subdivision was executed in 1865 to J. H. Burke. Downy had widely promoted his real estate venture and by 1870, there were an estimated 500 families in Los Nietos. By 1871, the property was owned by J. E. Fulton, who apparently built the first of the buildings within the estate area. His board and batten cottage, typical of the 1870s construction in Southern California, is shown in a turn of the century photograph, but no longer exists. Fulton was the local agent for the Santa Gertrudes Land Company and held the property until he developed Fulton Wells and the Fulton Sulphur Springs and Health Resort in 1878, just to the north of the site; the town which grew up around it was to become Santa Fe Springs.

The next owner was Harvay H. Hawkins who built the main residence, conservatory, and carriage house/barn in the 1880s, and developed the gardens with rare plants, exotic trees, and statuary. Existing photographs of these buildings exhibit the stylistic qualities of the late 1870s to early 1880s. The estate was next owned by Martha and Walter Nimocks between 1890 and 1904; they maintained and added to the ranch buildings and landscape features, and established the plantings of citrus, pears, and alfalfa. The gardens probably reached their prime during this period.

The estate was owned by attorney Eugene Overton from 1904 to 1915-1916. He remodeled several of the buildings and added to the main residence, removed much of the garden statuary, and transplanted some of the old palm to Little Lake Cemetary, south of the property. The final residents were Silas and Margaret Frances Slusher. They operated the ranch as a farm until oil was discovered in the early 1920s. Alterations to the estate included an addition of several rooms to the main residence, addition of a garage to the tank house, and further alteration of the landscape. The main residence burned in 1941, and the carriage house in 1969. Following Mrs. Slusher's death in 1971, the estate has been held in trust by the Shriners Hospitals for Crippled Children and the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

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Although the major buildings of the 1880s have been lost, the foundations of the main residence and conservatory remain, the remodeled tank house is standing, and the aviary, trellis, and many elements of the garden furniture and landscape design are present. The fountain bases, pathways, planting beds, and certain live specimens, together with the remaining structures, combine to create a distinct sense of time and place, an unusual quality which is a valuable cultural and historical resource.

At least two aged carob trees are still alive and bearing. In 1921, twigs were taken from a tree said to be "old" at the time, for propagation near Riverside by the Coit Agricultural Service. More twigs were taken from the property in 1950 for the Rittenhouse carob demonstration orchard near Vista, and budwood was sent to South Africa, Australia, Shile and Israel for propagation. Stock from this estate thus played "an important part in the development of carob culture on dry lands in various parts of the world" (Coit to Slusher, 1959). The donor tree was hermaphroditic, and analysis of the pod showed 47.5 % sugar. Botanical expertise should be able to determine whether the remaining trees are the same as these commercial progenitors, and what other rare plants may represent the original plantings on the estate.

The reservoirs of the fountains are made of brick coated with concrete, with decorative motifs of seashells and cupids representing a very early use of decorative concrete in Southern California in the 1880s. At least one of the fountains shown in an old photograph was further embellished with a ring of abalone shells. The cast iron column and lower basin of one of the fountains in front of the main entrance to the residence is still intact, with the same motifs, although the top sculpture of a figure holding the urn from which the water emerged is missing. The concrete urns/planters illustrate the same techniques and motifs, and are also believed to represent the original installations of the 1880s, along with the trellis or small gazebo.

Considered together, the plants, landscape design and furniture, conservatory and aviary, all combined to produce a garden which was considered as a show place of Los Angeles County at the turn of the century, and of which many elements still remain. The setting is unimpaired and constitutes a visual window into the past. The estate represents an example of one of the earliest and best developed post-California period building activities in its area.

Recent archaeological excavations have identified a wealth of pottery from the period between the Indian/Spanish occupation and the arrival of the Anglos. These discoveries could seriously impact the study of early California history. For this reason, the estate is of state-wide significance to California.

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The southeastern corner of the property is located approximately 1000' (304.8 m) west of Norwalk Boulevard along the Clark Avenue Alley, north side (shown on the U. S. G. S. map as Clark Avenue). Same point is also 1400' (426.7 m) on a bearing South 16 degrees west from a point on the southerly side of Telegraph Road 700' (213.3 m) westerly from its intersection with Norwalk Boulevard.

The aviary (B)
This is a one story structure bouilt of wood posts, corrugated metal sheathing and light screening. The building is designed in a strictly utilitarian manner and is built in a rectangular plan. Architectural features include a pitched roof with gable ventilators, a doorway at either end of the structure, and an open beam roof. The building is in fair condition.

Sheds behind Aviary
The sheds behind the aviary consist of low, one story structures
built in a utilitarian manner. The primary construction material
is wood, with several associated sheet metal and wire pens
as associated structures. These sheds are in a poor state of
preservation.

Several pieces of farm machinery and associated apparatus remain both in and scattered around the sheds. These include a hand sheller, a garden rolleraadd several misc. garden tools.

Tankhouse-Garage (A)
This consists of a three story tower set flush with a one story garage. The tankhouse has been considerably altered from its original condition, and is in a poor state of preservation.
The primary construction material is wood and the building is designed in a utilitarian manner. The garage was added c.1920, and a portion of the original tankhouse was removed. Architectural details include an exterior staircase, sash windows with flat window and door openings, sliding garage doors and narrow clapboard siding. Several associated pieces of irrigation equipment remain in the tankhouse.

The Estate Today

The fenced portion of the property consists of approximate y 4.12 acres with various buildings, structures, and landscape features. The site itself has been considerably altered from its original appearance and condition. The early groves of citrus and pear trees have been removed. The main barn or carriage house (Figure 2) and residence which were originally built about 1880 have since been destroyed by fire, and the majority of sheds and other outbuildings have also been moved or demolished. Fragments of the garden sculpture, structures and water system remain and although modified, they convey a distinct sense of time and place.

There are four major and several minor buildings on the property; the former include two residential structures, the tankhouse and garage, and an aviary.

The tankhouse-garage (Figures 4 and 5) consists of a three story tower set flush with a one story garage built in a rectangular plan. The garage is an addition to the tower with two major entrance bays designed for automobile use. Mr. Hathaway recalls that Silas Slusher remodeled the original tank house and added the garage about 1920. The tank house appears to be the oldest building on the property. Although remodeled, the shape of several of the window and door openings indicates that it was definitely built in the nineteenth century. The tankhouse-garage is in a deteriorated condition. Continued neglect and a fire at the southeast corner of the tower at the second story level have been the primary contributing factors to the poor state of preservation.

The aviary is a one story structure built of wood and metal, open to all four sides, and screened throughout (Figure 3). The building is in a fair state of preservation, and illustrates a utilitarian structure adapted to an interesting and unusual use.

Residence #1 is a one story, simple wood frame bungalow. It is designed in a style common to modest residential housing in the era of World War I. Major architectural features include a low pitched roof, eaves with rafter ends exposed, a raised and offest porch, and flat window and door openings.

Residence #2 consists of a relatively modern stucco building designed in an undistinguished manner. It is not a significant part of the architectural or historical importance of the property.

The minor buildings on the property include a group of sheds and farm outbuildings whose original purposes or functions are not well defined at present. They are designed in a strictly utilitarian manner, built of various combinations of wood frame, wood siding, and metal sheathing. The condition of these buildings varies from good to deteriorated.

There are several building fragments on the property. These include the foundation of a conservatory, the foundation and substructure of the old house built by Hawkins about 1880, and a brick fireplace which was a portion of an addition to the original house. With the exception of the fireplace, the various fragments are of no present architectural significance. The fireplace is interesting, however, in that the legend "Slusher 1875" is cast into the cement mantlepiece. 1875 was the year of Silas Slusher's birth and does not represent the year of construction. The fireplace apparently opened into a billiard room area. With the main house, this addition was destroyed by fire in 1941.

Structural remains consist of various building elements including bases of fountains, planters, urns, a trellis, and a birdbath.

There are three brick and concrete fountain reservoirs on the property, some illustrated in their original condition in the "Fairy-Land" album. Two of these are in line with the location of the main entrance to the original house. The third is located within the foundation walls of the conservatory. With the exception of the fountain shown in Figures 6 and 7, there is nothing remaining above the bases. These fountain reservoirs date from the 1880s and are of architectural as well as historical interest, as they represent an

early use of concrete in Southern California. The fountain illustrated has a portion of the original cast iron decorative base remaining; this is designed with a seashell motif.

The garden trellis (Figure 8) also appears to date from the 1880s, and resembles both in design and construction one which is pictured in early photographs of the estate in its prime. The lattice, for example, is used in the same basic manner and the wooden framework is chamfered in identical fashion. A second similar trellis is in ruins under trees located in the southeast corner of the property.

The urns and planters (Figure 10) and a birdbath (Figure 9) are all of a similar design and construction method. They are made of concrete and employ either a seashell or cupid design motif. The dating is not precise but attributes suggest that these structural features may also have originated about 1880. Like the fountains the planters, urns and birdbath appear to represent a very early use of decorative concrete in Southern California.

A variety of farm associated pieces of machinery and hardware remain on the property. Figure 11 illustrates a hand-cranked apparatus which appears to be a type of sheller. Several water troughs also remain, in addition to some gardening apparatus.

The estate once had an advanced and extensive water system. It has been heavily altered, including the demolition of the large brick reservoir and pumping plant. Remaining, however, are the fountains, various hydrants, the tank house, and a small reservoir near the tank house. Portions of the system, including brass hydrant fittings and tank house apparatus appear to date from the late nineteenth century.

Various plantings, beds, and pathways are visible remains of the former landscape features. Full identification and dating of the botanical specimens will require the expertise of a botanist, but it is obvious that the property was once extensively landscaped. Of particular interest are the aged carob trees located in the northeast section of the estate area. A letter included in the Appendix indicates that cuttings were taken from this estate as early as 1921, and the stock played a prominent role in the world-wide development of the commercial carob industry. The tracks are not distinguishable from other steel, standard gauge, freight railroad tracks: the ballast or gravel bed has concrete or wood "sleeper" ties, laid perpendicular to the rails and set onto the bed. Historical Resources Evaluation Report: 6th Street Viaduct Seismic Improvement Project, and FEIR/FEIS Los Angeles Union Station Run-Through Tracks Project, 2005, presented the findings that although the entire Burlington Northern & Santa Fe Railroad line may be eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places or California Register of Historical Resource as a linear historic resource, the specific segment located in the proposed project area is not eligible for listing due to the lack of integrity as to original materials and workmanship. There are no proposed changes/alterations/physical effects to the BNSF tracks as part of the Westside Subway Extension Project that will alter their ability to convey its historic significance as a linear resource. The specific segment located within the proposed project APE does not appear to meet the criteria or levels of integrity necessary to be considered a significant historic resource. 

Cogstone Resource Management previously evaluated this segment of railroad in 2011 for the *Westside Subway Extension Historic Properties Supplemental Survey Report* and found that the specific segment of track was not eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) or California Register of Historical Resources (CRHR) as a linear historic resource because of lack of integrity to original materials and workmanship.

Evaluation

This form does not record or evaluate the entire BNSF/ATSF, instead, it records and evaluates only the approximately 0.50-mile portion of the line in the city of Los Angles just south of the First Street Bridge north to Aliso Street/US 101 Freeway located in the CEQA Project Area for the report cited in P11 of this form. "The ATSF Railway appears to meet Criterion A for the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) and Criterion 1 for the California Register of Historical Resources (CRHR) because it is closely associated with an important event in 19thcentury California history, namely the coming of a second transcontinental railroad. This event marked the beginning of the end of the Southern Pacific Railway Company's transportation monopoly and contributed directly to the southern California land boom of the 1880s. The rail line is also associated with the emergence of southern California as a favored tourist destination (sic) in the last 19th and early 20th centuries." (Tang et al. 2008.)

This segment was part of the extension of the original ATSF main line from Los Angeles to Orange and on to San Diego. Previous evaluation of the railroad in 2008 found that the physical components, such as tracks, ballast, and signal system, have been periodically upgraded over the past century, as a result of routine maintenance or system improvements. Under Criterion A of the NRHP, the integrity of design, materials, and workmanship is not as important as the integrity of location, setting, feeling, and association to convey the significance of the resource, within the period of significance. Previous documentation and evaluation of this segment of the BNSF established the period of significance as the 1880s—when the majority of the railroad was constructed by a subsidiary of the original ATSF.

Because the tracks are part of an active railroad, survey of the segment was limited to public right of way, which occurred in March 2018. Through review of historic aerials and United States Geological Survey maps, it can be established that while the location and association of this railroad segment appear to remain intact, the segment has lost integrity of setting and feeling. When originally constructed through this part of Los Angeles County, the surrounding countryside was primarily unsettled, and surrounded by cultivated and fallow lands. By the 1950s, housing developments were beginning to pop up along both sides of the San Gabriel River; however, the construction of Interstate 605 and the extension and widening of Pioneer Boulevard to the east substantially changed the surrounding landscape, which included the growth of a commercial area on the east side of the freeway. As a result, the original character of the setting no longer resembles a rural, agricultural late 19th century landscape. Furthermore, the alteration of physical features in the immediate vicinity, in additional to the intrusion of modern railroad equipment, has diminished the integrity of feeling. Previous evaluations of other segments of this railroad (see references below) have indicated that the entire railroad line could be eligible for the NRHP and/or CRHR, as a whole, under this criterion; however, this individual segment lacks the integrity within the historic context to be eligible under NRHP Criterion A or CRHR Criterion 1.

Under NRHP Criterion D or CRHR Criterion 4, the railroad segment is not a significant or likely source of important information regarding history or prehistory. It is unlikely to yield any important data regarding original engineering or architectural designs or techniques that would help us understand the construction practices of the day. Therefore, this segment of the UPRR is not eligible for individual listing on the NRHP/CRHR under Criterion D/4.

Following the review of previous evaluations, additional research, and survey of the segment, ICF concurs with the finding that although the portions of the UPRR alignment could be eligible for the NRHP or the CRHR, the subject segment does not contribute to the larger property and lacks significance for eligibility independently. The segment of the UPRR is not a historic property for the purposes of Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act and is not a historical resource for the purposes of the California Environmental Quality Act. The property was not evaluated for local designation.



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

An update to the DPR record for Burlington Northern Santa Fe Railway (former Atchison Topeka & Santa Fe Railway) (P-19-186804) was recorded by Jessica B. Feldman, ICF, on March 26, 2018. The update was prepared as part of the Historical Resources Evaluation Report (HRER) for the I-605 Corridor Improvement Project (CIP) in Los Angeles County and documented the segment of the linear resource within the Area of Potential Effects (APE) for the project. The recommended status code for the segment was 6Y, 6Z. The HRER was subsequently reviewed by the State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO). In a letter dated July 11, 2019, SHPO did not concur with the determination of ineligibility for the segment and recommended that the Burlington Northern Santa Fe Railway (P-19-186804) as a whole should be assumed eligible for the National Register of Historic Places for purposes of the I-605 Corridor Improvement Project only.

Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Little Lake School District was formed on 14 September 1871 upon petition of W.L. Houghton and 28 others, from a part of the Los Nietos School District.

The property upon which the present Little Lake School Buildings are located was purchased 14 December 1881 from the Santa Gertrudes Land Association for the sum of \$30 "in trust for school purposes". The parcel measured "295 feet square".

The first structure integral to the present site was bult in 1919. A man named Sleen may have been the contractor on this first structure. Following the 1933 earthquake, the basically H-shaped building was declared unsafe and the students were moved into tents.

Remodeling was under the direction of an architect named Wallace. A new wing along an open hallway graced with arches was built out from the southeast corner of the original building. A classroom (1st Grade) was added inside the southeast leg of the "H". This was supported by the Works Progress Administration. Completed in 1936, this single, remodeled structure contained 9 classrooms, teacher's room, nurse's office, administrative offices, cafeteria a gymnasium, and shop. In addition, there was/is a maintenance garage and attached parking shelters at the westerly most edge of the property.

In 1950, a set of two brick buildings with 4 classrooms each was built between the auditorium and the main school building. This addition partially obscures the east wing of the main school building, is inconsistent with and detracts from the basic California Mission style of architecture, and virtually obliterated the landscape of playgrounds and playing fields which were flanked by rows of pepper trees punctuated by benches and bordered with rose gardens. These recent additions would not be considered of either historic or architectural significance and would not be retained in existing preservation plans.

The Little Lake School was for many years bordered by industry (mostly oil refining) to the east, vacant land and the Little Lake Cemetary to the south, and farmland to the west and north. In the last decade or so, the western border has become apartments, and the northern border is a mixture of commercial and industrial properties. Street widenings have considerably reduced the frontage on Florence Avenue and detracted from the overall aspect of the site.

The Little Lake School Auditorium is located on land purchased from George A. and Bessie Koontz on 18 August 1919 for the sum of \$2000. The parcel measured 220 feet wide with frontage along Little Lake Road, now Florence Avenue, and 396 feet deep. The construction of the auditorium has been given variously as 1926, 1929, and 1930. The original plans were drawn by Leslie T. Squiers, architect, and David Bushnell, engineer.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Little Lake School served grades 1-8 from 1919 until 1953 when the last 8th grade class graduated from the existing buildings. The first Kindergarten started in the Fall of 1941. For over three decades, this school was the focal point of the community. The City of Santa Fe Springs did not incorporate until four years after the last 8th Grade had graduated. Norwalk also was unincorporated throughout this period. The school unified the community and supplied it not only with education for its youth, but with recreation, library, entertainment, and forums for the entire community. The Little Lake School District was always multi-racial, with many religious and ethnic backgrounds, as well as diverse economic conditions. The children of migrant workers attended school along side those newly rich with the discovery of oil. A role once held by the church in more homogeneous communities was played by the school in this most heterogeneous community. The school was the center of the community's activities whether social, patriotic, community services, or simply recreation and entertainment. High school attendance was not taken for granted--the high schools were 4-5 miles away--and the community put all its emphasis and support into its elementary school.

For three and one-half decades, Little Lake School housed grades 1-8, and for two and one-half decades it held Kindergarten too. Then shifting patterns of population and later school-age population declines brought about the closing of Little Lake School as an elementary school. But in the last two decades, the buildings have rounded out their educational career in a sense. In Fall 1964, these buildings became the first daytime campus of the Rio Hondo Community College. The College held classes here for two years before moving to its permanent home. Then the Whittier Union High School District leased the buildings to house both Frontier (Continuation) High School and the Whittier Adult School from ?1967-?1976. Thus the Little Lake School and Auditorium have served the educational spectrum from Kindergarten through Junior College and AdCult School.

During the 1940's, a branch of the Los Angeles County Library was housed upstairs in the auditorium.

At least one theater group met at the auditorium during the late 1950's.

Two churches organized and held their meetings in the auditorium. The Church of the Covenant (Presbyterian) organized in 1950 and met there for about one year. Later St. Pius X Catholic Church held its first services in the Little Lake Auditorium.

The Community Coordinating Council organized at the school in 1950. The Little Lake Homeowners, later to become the Santa Fe Springs Homeowners started there. Even meetings to set about the formation of the City of Santa Fe Springs took place at Little Lake School.

David Bushnell has been described as a noted local architect and mecha engineer in the Whittier area. The two major movie theaters and at le one church in Whittier are attributed to him. Whether or not any other examples of Bushnell's school architecture exist other than the Little Lake Auditorium is unknown. Bushnell was also the architect fo the Hathaway home built in the early '30's of concrete block located west of the school at 11901 East Florence Avenue.

No similar examples of either this Spanish Colonial, stucco with red t roof architecture, nor sizeable school auditorium appear to survive in nearby areas.

Following the 1933 earthquake, minor remodeling was done on the audito with R.L. Warren as architect, to bring the building into compliance w Field Act regulations in 1934. There have been no significant changes to the building since that time.
