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MITIGATED NEGATIVE DECLARATION FOR CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT NO. 22-05 (WESTLANDS CHERRY SOLAR PROJECT) – DATED SEPTEMBER 2022 (STATE CLEARINGHOUSE NUMBER: 2022090283)

Dear Ms. Tomlinson:

The Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC) received a Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND) for the Conditional Use Permit No. 22-05 (Westlands Cherry Solar Project) (Project). The Lead Agency is receiving this notice from DTSC because the Project includes one or more of the following: groundbreaking activities, importation of backfill soil, and/or work on or in close proximity to an agricultural or former agricultural site. Additionally, the Project site appears to intersect Lemoore Auxiliary Field #4, an inactive DTSC cleanup site that needs evaluation.

DTSC recommends that the following issues be evaluated in the Hazards and Hazardous Materials section of the MND:

- A State of California environmental regulatory agency such as DTSC or Regional Water Quality Control Board (RWQCB), or a qualified local agency that meets the requirements of <u>Assembly Bill 304 (AB304)</u> should provide regulatory concurrence that newly developed sites are safe for construction and proposed uses.
- 2. The MND should acknowledge the potential for historic or future activities on or near the project site to result in the release of hazardous wastes/substances on the project site. In instances in which releases have occurred or may occur,

further studies should be carried out to delineate the nature and extent of the contamination, and the potential threat to public health and/or the environment should be evaluated. The MND should also identify the mechanism(s) to initiate any required investigation and/or remediation and the government agency who will be responsible for providing appropriate regulatory oversight.

- If any projects initiated as part of the proposed project require the importation of soil to backfill any excavated areas, proper sampling should be conducted to ensure that the imported soil is free of contamination. DTSC recommends the imported materials be characterized according to DTSC's 2001 <u>Information</u> <u>Advisory Clean Imported Fill Material</u>.
- 4. If any sites included as part of the proposed project have been used for agricultural, weed abatement or related activities, proper investigation for organochlorinated pesticides should be discussed in the MND. DTSC recommends the current and former agricultural lands be evaluated in accordance with DTSC's 2008 <u>Interim Guidance for Sampling Agricultural</u> <u>Properties (Third Revision).</u>

DTSC appreciates the opportunity to comment on the MND.
