Description of Nature, Purpose, and Beneficiaries of Project:

The Sierra Nevada Conservancy would provide funding for the Sierra Institute for Community and Environment to partner with Lassen Volcanic National Park (LVNP) to complete approximately 600 acres of forest thinning and construct about five miles of fire line in wilderness lands to enable reintroduction of prescribed fire to approximately 1,800 acres. All work will be done by hand, with a wilderness sawyer crew equipped with traditional non-mechanized tools. The Project is in the wilderness headwaters of Battle Creek and the Pit River and is the next phase in a strategic landscape-scale fuels management strategy to restore low- to moderate-severity fire regimes throughout LVNP. Preparation of these fire management units in the Project area, and the following introduction of fire, will provide park managers with a critical buffer around Manzanita Lake and park infrastructure in one of the highest visitor use areas, and increase the resilience of California Spotted Owl habitat. The project will also reduce the risk of wildfire spreading from the wilderness to adjacent rural communities of Shasta County, including Shingletown, Old Station, and others along the Highway 44 corridor.

CEQA does not apply to prescribed fire, reforestation, habitat restoration, thinning, or fuel-reduction projects, or to related activities included in the project description, undertaken, in whole or in part, on federal lands to reduce the risk of high-severity wildfire that have been reviewed under the federal National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 if the primary role of a state or local agency is providing funding or staffing for those projects. The Sierra Nevada Conservancy would provide funding to conduct fuel reduction activities on federal lands in LVNP to enable the reintroduction of prescribed fire to protect infrastructure, water sources, and habitat from severe wildfire. The proposed activities were reviewed in their entirety under NEPA by LVNP. The Project is part of the May 2022 Lassen Volcanic National Park Wildland Fire Management Plan, accompanied by the Fire Management Plan – Environmental Assessment. In 2022, LVNP conducted a NEPA review and confirmed that the current NEPA was adequate for the Project's preparation for future prescribed fire.
